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City of San Francisco awards \$120,000 to the Mission Science Workshop

The San Francisco Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families has given a grant of \$120,000 to the Mission Science Workshop to support its work during the 2006/2007 school year. Mission Science Workshop is a collaborative project of City College of San Francisco, San Francisco Unified School District and San Francisco State University. It was founded in 1991 at City College's Mission Campus by CCSF Engineering Department member **Daniel Sudran**, who began the program in his garage in the inner Mission. In 2005 the bilingual program was moved to the old auto shop at Mission High School, 3750 18th St., and currently serves 14 elementary, middle, and high schools in the Mission District. The Mission Science Workshop works with children and their teachers during the school day, when classes are brought over by their teachers for two-hour science enrichment workshops. There is also an after school program every day after school and a six-week summer program. City College of San Francisco supported the summer program this year by placing Child Development Department students in the summer program. The Mission Science Workshop encourages City College faculty, students, and staff to join the fun and volunteer in one of the Workshops programs. Teacher Prep Center helps Mission Science Workshop

The Mission Science Workshop has partnered with the Teacher Prep Center which is part of the Child Development and Family Studies Department at CCSF in a number of ways. During the past several years, more than 150 students in CDEV supervised field-work courses have visited Mission Science Workshop and received a guided tour and science experience. MSW staffer **Vee Garcillano** introduced the wonders of sharing hands-on science with children as a part of the collaborative over the span of seven semesters. More than 40 students interested in becoming teachers worked or volunteered at the workshop to further their understanding of how children learn science and what curriculum activities support learning. Supported by grant funds from the California Post-secondary Education Commission, the Wells Fargo Foundation and the California Community College Chancellor's Office, the Teacher Prep Center was able to pay students to assist MSW staff on the floor as they hosted SFUSD classroom field trips and provided after-school and summer enrichment activities. The shortage of qualified math and science teachers in California provides a natural focus at the Teacher Prep Center for the development of future teachers in those specific content areas. Choose "Projects", then "Mock Job Fair" and "Folk Tales" to see some creative and successful ESL projects. **Linda Reichman** demonstrated a music pro-

gram called JukeBox that she uses to teach language through song and inspire her non-credit ESL students. **Cora Chen** (ESL) showed "free web tools we can use to spice up our traditional classroom". Also from ESL, **Venette Cook** showcased a video project she created on DVD.

Rochelle Gatlin (History) showed the use of her instructional website created with Contribute. She posts weekly updates of course handouts and study guides, while **Craig Kleinman** (English) demonstrated his department's Cyberia project. Finally, **Diane Reppun** (PE & Dance) showed some innovative uses of the GroupWise Calendar to schedule facilities for her department.
