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BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Board of Trustees actions at September 28 meeting told

The Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco took the following actions at its September 28, 2006 meeting. Items are listed in the order they were discussed.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B1** — New Contract with PeopleAdmin, Inc., at a cost not to exceed \$40,000 for fiscal year 2006-2007. PeopleAdmin will provide the CCSF Human Resources Department with customized software and database applications to reduce paperwork, data-entry and manual processing.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B7** — Authorization for two (2) Contract Modifications totaling \$31,024 for Special Services Contracts and Construction Contracts with Bay Area Pressure Wash (contractor), increase by \$2,500 to \$17,500 to provide additional services to include power washing all walkways around Creative Arts Extension Building to remove construction dust and dirt in conjunction with building the new Student Health Center; and Cumiskey Construction, Inc., increase by \$28,524 to \$126,520 for emergency fire alarm work and smoke detectors for coverage of equipment and irreplaceable records as part of the Gough Street Fire Alarm System Upgrade.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B8** — Authorization to modify a contract for New Mission Campus Special Testing and Material Inspection Services to Coverall Engineering Laboratories at a cost of \$200,000 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$770,000. The money will cover

overtime costs for additional manpower due to accelerated structural steel and concrete inspection services.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B9** — Authorization to Award Special Services Contract for Preliminary Site Planning Services for Reservoir Site Projects — Performing Arts Complex, Joint Use Facility and Advanced Technology Building — to Royston Hanamoto Alley & Abbey, Landscape Architects and Planners at a Cost Not to Exceed \$115,000.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B10** — Authorization to Contract with Berkeley City College of Berkeley (BCC) for the amount not to exceed \$80,500. CCSF has been awarded funds through the State Chancellor's Office Job Development Incentive Fund (JDIF) grant program. CCSF and BCC will partner to provide essential training and skills upgrades in the rapidly expanding community health and social service fields. The contract covers the period September 12, 2006 through August 31, 2007.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B11** — Authorization to Modify Existing Contract. Extends from December 31, 2006 to December 31, 2007, the existing contract with JavaJazz, Inc., then sub-leased to the Bean Scene, with the same terms for the lower level of the Student Union and the Press Box. This is to give the District time to do a comprehensive food feasibility study for Ocean Campus and to develop the appropriate RFP based on the results of that study.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-S1** — Authorization to align District wage rates with wage rates utilized by comparable employers: Classifications 5320 Illustrator and Art Designer – Library Department, and 5638 Environmental Assistant for Facilities Department.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-W2** — Authorization to Contract with City CarShare to place cars at the Ocean Campus and Gough Street as a pilot program to see if there is enough business to sustain an ongoing car share program at the two sites and perhaps other campuses throughout the District.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B2** — Adoption of the annual budget for 2006-2007 with projected revenue and resources totaling \$178,896,763 and expenditures of \$179,644,442 which continues operational expenditures from the prior fiscal year, and will be reduced by charging \$747,679 to either Basic Skills or Matriculation funding. The 2006-2007 Budget is balanced.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B3** — 1) Amending the FY 2005-06 Adopted Revenue and Resources Budget; 2) Transferring funds out to (A) fund deficits in Restricted Programs funds and (B) fund self-insurance funds based on actual costs; and 3) reallocating available expenditure budget funds to fund FY 2005-06 Estimated Final Expenditures for the General Fund Unrestricted; and 4) authorization to transfer up to \$256,000 from the Board Designated reserve to maintain a balanced budget for fiscal year 2005-06.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B4** — Acceptance of Proposed Child Development Center Final Design, based on a schematic design by K2A Architects, and re-designed by MK Think Architects in close consultation with the Child Development Department staff, Facilities Planning and the Associate Vice Chancellor of Facilities Management that includes a living roof, abundant access to natural light and sun shades to reduce heat gain.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B5** — Authorization to Modify Architectural and Engineering Services Contract with EHDD/Barcelon and Jang for the New Chinatown/North Beach Campus Project at a Cost of \$3,218,000 for a Total Contract Amount Not to Exceed \$9,618,000.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B6** — Authorization to Modify Architectural and Engineering Services Contract with Cervantes Design Associates/Kendall Young Associates, a Joint Venture, for the New Mission Campus at a Cost of \$1,600,000 for a Total Contract Amount Not to Exceed \$6,832,796.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-B9a** — Authorization to Award Construction Services Contract to Alde Construction for Bernal Heights Childcare Relocation Project for the Base Bid Amount of \$98,600.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-S2** — Authorization for Trustee Dr. Anita Grier to attend the ACCT Conference in Orlando, FL, October 11-14, 2006. Dr. Grier serves on the ACCT's Diversity Committee and has been nominated to an ACCT-At-Large Director position.

• **Approved Resolution No. 060928-S3** — Acceptance of Proposed Performing Arts Center Program Document, dated September 7, 2006, which details the size, use, and special features of each room in the building, along with each room's relationship with other rooms based upon the educational specifications stipulated by the faculty and Design Review Team of the College.

Shared governance update

Minutes of the Academic Policies Committee

Editor's note: On September 25, 2006, the Academic Policies Committee approved the May 15, 2006, minutes.

Minutes, May 15, 2006

I. Adoption of Agenda

The Committee adopted the agenda.

II. Approval of Minutes

The Committee approved the minutes of 2006 April 24 as corrected.

III. Member Reports/Announcements

A. AFT 2121 has asked the Academic Senate to revisit the section of the Faculty Hiring Procedures that specify the Equivalency Committee's report. The Senate often refers equivalency issues to Academic Policies (A.P.), so this may come to us in the Fall.

B. The Senate will reconsider the Costa Rica/Nicaragua Study Abroad program, this time associated with LALS 15, as A.P. originally recommended.

C. The VTEA allocation group distributed ~\$900K this year. A written report detailing the allocation should be forthcoming.

D. Teti spoke at Consultation Council on Thursday, May 11, in opposition to the proposed Title 5 changes in graduation requirements. The Council voted to forward the recommendation to the Board of Governors.

IV. Unfinished Business

A. Discussion of the CCSF Associate Degrees, Option B, Advanced Placement

Bruce Smith circulated a modification to the original language defining the Option B degree. Most significantly, he proposed adding explicitly that the degree is for "...any student who completes the CSU General Education pattern with full eligibility for upper division transfer as established by CSU..." This helps clarify not only the Advanced Placement issue but also other sources of confusion.

2006-05-15-01 That we approve the new language describing eligibility for the Option B degree, and that we authorize Dean Bruce Smith to work with the Office of Instruction to draft Catalog language reflecting the change.

Smith and Teti will inform the Bipartite Committee on Graduation Requirements of this clarification.

V. New Business

A. Election of 2006-2007 Chair

A.P. elected Fred Teti as chair for 2006-2007.

B. Selection of Fall 2006 Meeting Dates

A.P. selected as meeting dates 9/25, 10/23, 11/20, and 12/11.

C. Conditional Admission to the International Education Program

Larry Klein presented the reasons behind the Conditional Admission proposal, and emphasized that a conditional admission process would be much easier on our prospective foreign students. There was some concern in the International Education Advisory Subcommittee about how well a TOEFL score 475 matched ESL 150; the subcommittee may discuss that in future.

2006-05-15-02 That we recommend the Foreign Student Conditional Admission Program for consideration by the Academic Senate.

D. CSU G.E. and IGETC Notations on Transcripts

Articulation Officer Deanna Abma explained that CCSF had wanted to report CSU G.E. and IGETC information on transcripts in the past (a valuable aid for counselors doing degree audits) but it was not feasible to do so using technology available at that time. It may be possible to do so using the new Banner versions. We will expect to hear a report in the Fall.

E. Proposal to Change "CR/NC" to "P/NP"

Teti explained that the Grading Policies Subcommittee wished to recommend that the College change the "CR/NC" nomenclature to "P/NP". "CR/NC" causes confusion with noncredit courses.

Committee members and guests agreed that the confusion needs attention, but they feared that the proposed change would bring about a new set of problems. Teti will bring the results of this discussion to the Grading Policies Chair.

F. Proposed New Final Exam Schedule

Dean Terry Hall explained that the current Final exam schedule has been problematic. One major drawback is that classes may have finals on weekdays they don't ordinarily meet. Hall has drafted a new schedule that significantly reduces how often that would happen. A.P. favored the proposed new schedule, although we noted that the time slots for 7 A.M. classes needed some attention.

2006-05-15-03 That we recommend the proposed new final exam schedule (with corrections to the time slots for 7 A.M. classes to be provided by Dean Hall) for consideration by the Academic Senate.

VI. Subcommittee Report

A. Contract and Continuing Education Advisory Committees

Dean Judy Teng presented the report, attended by Kit Dai. Teng gave status reports on the various programs conducted by the Office of Contract Education, including Title 4E foster care provider training, hotel partnerships, the Workplace Learning Resource Center, the Center for Excellence, and City and County of S.F. employee training.

Dai explained the Dislocated Garment Workers training program, a joint venture with the Office of Vocational education, for which she does case management. Participants receive 15 months of training for new jobs and support services from community agencies.

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Academic Policies

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Teng explained that she decided to pull out from the latest plan to partner with U.C. Berkeley in Beijing because of difficulties with the financier. She hopes to launch a program at another, newer school in Beijing, with articulation agreements with U.C. Santa Cruz. She is seeking a financier.

The program offered at Fort Mason by the Office of Continuing Education may be impacted by the plan to charge for parking. The College for Teens will be offered this year at Abraham Lincoln school. While recruiting high school students on April 29 for the College for Teens, Teng's office allowed students to take advantage of Concurrent Enrollment in 46 CCSF courses, identified as suitable for high school students. (Students may still do Concurrent Enrollment in any course with the regular program offered by the New Student Counseling Department.)

Carlota del Portillo named to Hispanic Leaders in the Bay Area

Dr. **Carlota del Portillo**, Dean of CCSF's Mission Campus, has been recognized by The Hispanic Chamber of Commerce as one of the most influential Hispanic Leaders in the Bay Area. The award – in recognition of her contribution to education in the Mission Community — was given September 27 at the Chamber's special celebration. More than 400 people in attendance heard del Portillo's voice brim with enthusiasm and joy as she referred to the new permanent home of the Mission Campus as "a community's dream come true" and her "life's work." The endeavors, del Portillo explained, began more than 30 years ago with a group of Latino educators who have come to be known as "keepers of the dream" for their persistence. The dream, she said, encountered a number of hurdles along the way; she credits the leadership of City College's Chancellor, Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, with making the dream a reality. The new campus, scheduled to open its doors in the fall of 2007, will offer general education credit courses and the existing noncredit program. Of special interest is the state-of-the-art library and the five multi-purpose rooms, all of which will be available to the community. "The new campus will be a beacon in the community and has numerous naming opportunities," said del Portillo. "It is truly a dream come true."

Rose Mary Johnson named Empire Professional of the Year

Rose Mary Herbert Johnson, personal and career counselor at City College's Southeast Campus, has been selected as the 2006-2007 Empire Professional of the Year representing Education: Career and Education Counseling. Rose Mary is a member of the African and African American Historical and Cultural Society, the American Association of University Women, the national Association for University Women and many other community organizations. She earned her Masters Degree in Adult Education from the University of San Francisco and her Masters Degree in Counseling from San Francisco State University.

Greg Landau's CD goes gold, nominated for Latin Grammy

Dr. **Greg Landau**, professor in the Latin American and Latino/a Studies Department at CCSF, produced the CD *Peru Blue* for Peruvian singer **Pamela** which was just nominated as Best New Artist in the 2006 Latin Grammy Awards. This record reached gold status and outsold any other CD for nine weeks in Peru. Landau is currently working with the Mexican rock band Maldita Vecindad on their new CD. Several of these Mexican rockers visited his class at the Mission Campus to share their stories with CCSF students.

Laura Melgarejo earns Chicana/Latina scholarship

Congratulations to **Laura Melgarejo**, winner of the 2005 – 2006 Chicana/Latina Foundation scholarship for community college students. Her award of \$1,500 will be presented at the Foundation's annual scholarship dinner on **Friday, October 27** at the South San Francisco Conference Center, 225 South Airport Blvd., South San Francisco. Telephone (650) 373-1083 for details. The Chicana/Latina Foundation Scholarship Fund assists Latina students in completing their undergraduate and graduate college education. These scholarships are available on a competitive basis to continuing undergraduate and graduate female college students of Latino background. The Chicana/Latina Foundation began convening focus groups on key issues pertinent to their community in 1998. The four areas they concentrated on examined the status of Latinas in business and economic development, education, health and public policy.

Also the Puente Program continues to receive great recognition both locally and at the state level. NUMMI donates a Toyota Corolla to Evans Campus auto department

Students in the Driveability Class taught by Joe Gumina (center above) at CCSF's Evans Campus will have the opportunity to work on a new 2006 Toyota Corolla with all the latest technology. This will give them the hands-on experience they will need to find work in modern auto repair facilities. The car is on loan from New United Motor Manufacturing, Inc. (NUMMI), the joint venture of Toyota and General Motors which builds the Toyota Corolla, the Toyota Tacoma and the Pontiac Vibe in Fremont. Gumina's class took a field trip to the NUMMI plant and asked Marika Curtin, community relations specialist of NUMMI, about getting a new vehicle to work on at the campus. Curtin then arranged the donation. Students actually made a second trip to the plant — with a tow truck to pick up the donated car. Once the students are finished with the vehicle, perhaps five or ten years from now, it must be returned to NUMMI.

English Eligibility Essay Exams set
