Transfer Articulation Bridge eases transition to SFSU

The Transfer Articulation Bridge (TAB) is a joint program between City College of San Francisco's (CCSF) Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) and San Francisco State University (SFSU) College of Education. The TAB program, which is coordinated by **Raymond Fong** (CCSF-EOPS counselor) and **Paul Mendez** (SFSU-College of Education), gives EOPS and CCSF students who are first generation, low-income, and underrepresented college students the opportunity to concurrently enroll in SFSU courses while still attending CCSF.

The goals of the TAB program are twofold: 1) to prepare EOPS and CCSF students who are economically and educationally disadvantaged to confidently transfer to SFSU, and 2) to give EOPS and CCSF students who are interested in pursuing teaching as a profession an opportunity to take upper division SFSU courses in education.

• **ISED 201-Introduction to SFSU:** Recognizing that the pursuit of higher education and transfer can be an overwhelming challenge for first generation and low-income students, ISED 201 serves as a bridge for students who are planning to transfer from CCSF to SFSU. ISED 201 orients the TAB students to SFSU, introduces them to SFSU faculty, student support services and programs, and prepares students to move towards transfer to the university. ISED 201, which is taught and facilitated by the SFSU TAB coordinator, **Paul Mendez**, is a three-unit course and is conducted at SFSU every semester.

Randall Coard, a former TAB participant who transferred to SFSU this semester, commented: "The TAB class was the most valuable class I've ever taken. If I did not participate in the TAB program, I'd be lost right now at State!"

EOPS and CCSF students who are interested in pursuing teaching as a profession are offered the opportunity to take two upper division, three-unit SFSU courses in education. Both of these courses, which fulfill the requirements for the minor in Education at SFSU, are taught by EOPS Counselor **Raymond Fong**.

• **Education 600-Foundations in Education:** is offered during the fall semesters at CCSF. This course covers educational theory and practice, critical

pedagogy, and the historical development of education in the U.S.

• **Interdisciplinary Studies in Education 585-Cross Cultural Education:** is offered during the spring semesters at CCSF. The "multicultural classroom" and culturally pluralistic models of education are introduced.

Victoria Araiza, who is currently enrolled in Education 600, stated: "As a future teacher, this class plays a very important purpose for me: it is teaching me how to become empowered as a student, but also showing me how to become an empowering educator with my future students and in my community!"

In addition to the course offerings, TAB students receive comprehensive support services including: academic advising and counseling from the TAB coordinators, and tutorial assistance through SFSU's Community Access and Retention. Furthermore, TAB students are considered SFSU students during the semester(s) that they are concurrently enrolled, receive an SFSU student I.D. card, and have access to all SFSU services including the library, computer labs, tutorial services, etc.

In order to participate in the TAB program, students must be enrolled in at least nine CCSF units during the semester that they take a TAB class. The TAB courses are tuition free.

Contribute to Classified Sick Leave Bank

Clara Starr, Dean of Human Resources, has announced the following Open Call/Request for Contributions to a new Classified Sick Leave Bank. The period to make contributions is **October 9 through November 17**.

Starr writes in a memo to be distributed to all Classified employees of the San Francisco Community College District (City College of San Francisco), "As outlined in Article 40 of the SEIU Local 790 Collective Bargaining Agreement, classified employees may transfer accrued sick leave, vacation credits, as well as RWW to another employee of the District who has been determined to have sustained a life threatening illness or injury and who has exhausted his/her vacation allowance, sick leave and compensatory time off."

Starr notes that this is the District's official first open call/request for the Classified Voluntary Sick Leave Bank.

"Basically, contributing to the sick leave bank gives an employee an assurance that he/she can avail himself/herself of the bank in the event of a life threatening illness or injury, and it is also a way to support your fellow classified workers who may experience a life threatening illness or injury," Starr points out.

"It is very important that you read the materials carefully," adds Starr. "If you do not contribute during this first official call/request, and to subsequent calls/requests you will not be eligible for benefits." Included with Starr's memo — and reproduced on Page 5 of this issue of *City Currents* — is the Voluntary Contribution Procedures and Contribution Form.

The Academic Senate Executive Council meeting came to order at 2:39 P.M.

IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Teti distributed a written report listing various issues, events, and announcements, some of which are Unfinished and New Business items. He also announced that the Accreditation Committee has faculty openings and specified the full name of a course: LALS 15/LBCS 15.

B. 1st Vice President Fred Chavaria reported that he attended the Campus Change Network (CCN) presentation at which suggestions for increasing diversity and student equity on campus were discussed.

C. 2nd Vice President Suzanne Lo reminded Council to attend the Senate Retreat. Lo also attended the CCN presentation, at which a four-student panel shared experiences regarding challenges and suggestions regarding support.
