## Rosenberg Foundation donates \$100,000 to enhance library services

The Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Foundation has granted City College of San Francisco an additional \$100,000 to supplement the budget of the Ocean Campus Library which is the name sake of the Rosenbergs.

**Rita W. Jones**, Dean, Library and Learning Resources, said, "Library and Learning Resources staff and our over 100,000 students are grateful for the generous donation from **Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr.**, for their continued financial support for our extremely successful programs that support student success at City College of San Francisco. Thank you very much."

"I want to reiterate City College's profound appreciation for the support that Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., have given to our institution. The excellence of our libraries is due in great part to the generous commitments of the Rosenbergs," says Dr. **Robert Gabriner**, Vice Chancellor, Institutional Advancement.

Dr. Gabriner points out that during the past several years, CCSF's LLR has undergone a significant transformation to become a focused and proactive library with collections and services on five campuses and an increasing online presence to the entire CCSF College community. In order to accomplish the many challenges, the faculty and staff of CCSF's LLR have galvanized themselves into an effective team to ensure easy access to information resources and services that produce student success.

After reviewing the current status of library programming with the Dean of Libraries, the chair of the librarians' department and the Chancellor, Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, the following plan was proposed to the Rosenbergs' Foundation.

- **Expand library services to students on weekends.** Funds will be used to extend regular weekday services to weekends to accommodate students who cannot get access on weekdays due to work and family commitments. Rosenberg funds have been utilized for this purpose in prior years and have enabled thousands of students to utilize the direct services of librarians and other staff.
- **Extend library information literacy workshops.** The library will expand its successful hands-on workshops in information literacy held at the Ocean Campus to other CCSF campuses. These workshops provide

students with the opportunity to learn how to use the library's online catalog, the periodical databases, basic Internet concepts and searching techniques, advanced Internet searching and evaluation of web pages, and using the library to research term papers.

- **Support library exhibitions program.** Funds will support the Rosenberg Library's award-winning exhibitions program series integrating theme-based visual exhibits with links to library resources that explain and extend students' knowledge about the issues contained in the exhibits.

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# BOARD OF TRUSTEES

## Board of Trustees actions at October 26, 2006 meeting told

The Board of Trustees took the following actions at its October 26 meeting held at 33 Gough St. Items are listed in the order in which they were discussed.

### • Approved Resolution No. 061026-B2 —

Authorization to Award Construction Services Contract to Geco, Inc., for the Ocean Campus Bungalow 300s Deconstruction Project for the Base Bid Amount of \$66,000. This contract is funded with 2005 Proposition A General Obligation Bond funds.

### • Approved Resolution No. 061026-B3 —

Authorization for two (2) Contract Modifications totaling \$55,000 for Special Services Contracts and Construction Contracts: A) William M. Koenig Consulting & Inspection Services (Inspector), increase contract by \$15,000 to \$185,280 for extended duration of inspection services on new Student Health Center; B) Carey & Company, Inc., (Preservation Architect), increase by \$40,000 to \$206,370 for additional services required to revise construction documents and include structural work for Chinatown/North Beach Campus.

### • Approved Resolution No. 061026-B4 —

Authorization to Award Construction Services Contract to Yamas Controls, Inc., for the Downtown Campus Mechanical System Project in the Amount of \$45,000. The Project includes all labor and materials required to provide a mechanical unit with heating and cooling capacity for the Café at the Downtown Campus to save energy costs and extend the life of the

mechanical systems. This contract is funded with 2005 Proposition A General Obligation Bond funds.

### • Approved Resolution No. 061026-B5 —

Authorization to enter into a contract with The McMullen Company for special services and advice related to the development of emergency evacuation plans for disabled students at a total cost not to exceed \$83,400. To comply with the terms of the settlement of the ADA lawsuit commonly known as "the Cherry case" these plans covering all District owned campuses must be completed no later than December 31, 2006. James McMullen of the McMullen Company, is a former state Fire Marshall. This contract was not competitively bid due to the multiple tasks needed for complying with the settlement agreement, the lack of a dedicated staff person for this project and the upcoming deadline for this component of the agreement.

### • Approved Resolution No. 061026-B6 —

Authorization to modify existing Contracts/Grants: A) Private Industry Council, increase by \$343,825 to a total of \$748,627 for modification of the Wrap Around Contract for the Trade Adjustment Act (TAA) garment worker program to include participants' transportation cost and the 2nd cycle training of an additional 50 participants; then decrease the contract by \$62,756 to a total of \$685,871 for adjustment of 2nd cycle training cost in services and transporta-

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tion, and to exclude \$50,000 childcare reimbursement for program participants, plus extend the term of contract from July 31, 2007 to a new date of December 31, 2007; B) Strategic Education Services, extend contract to November 30, 2007 with option to renew for an additional year based upon assessment of progress and outcomes. Include State Cola. This extends contract for special services and advice related to monitoring State and local legislation.

- **Approved Resolution No. 061026-B7** — Authorization to contract with Jewish Vocational Services in the amount not to exceed \$76,000. JVS's services will provide each student with assistance in coping with personal issues interfering with CCSF Registered nursing students' academic success, including securing childcare, managing transportation and negotiating employment obligations. In addition, case managers will help to provide follow-up services to students who have graduated the CCSF RN program, including additional career planning and counseling and referral to support services in the area.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061026-C1** — Procurement of Equipment, Supplies, Services, Etc., less than \$3,000.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061026-C3** — Acceptance of cash gifts from a number of donors during August and September.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061026-C4** — Disposal of Personal Property with Insufficient Sales Value.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061026-F1** — Exempt, Non-Educational Administrative Appointment of **Leilani F. Battiste** as ADA Compliance Director (Office of the Vice Chancellor, Finance Administration) effective October 30, 2006.
- **Approved Resolutions No. G1–G4** — Academic Employees (Faculty) Credit Program/Noncredit Program District Funded.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061026-H1–H3** — Academic Employees (Faculty)

Credit Program/Noncredit Program Categorically Funded.

# International Education Advisory Subcommittee

## Minutes: September 18, 2006

1. **Leslie Pahl** welcomed the committee to another academic year and reviewed the committee's mission statement, which is that it "recommends policies and discusses issues related to international education." She then welcomed a newly-appointed member, **Lindy McKnight**, Dean of Student Support Services.

2. **Jill Heffron**, Study Abroad Programs Coordinator, gave an update of what is currently happening in the Study Abroad Programs Office: Upcoming programs include: Cambodia and Vietnam and Costa Rica and Nicaragua during Winter Break 2006-2007; Florence and Madrid during Spring 2007; China and Mongolia, Oaxaca, and South Africa during Summer 2007. Jill also noted that a Chinese language program is being investigated for Summer 2007 at the ICEC Language School, which is part of the Beijing University of Posts and Telecommunications. This program would be a month long intensive Chinese (Mandarin) program. Further information will hopefully be available in time for our next meeting.

**Paul Wong**, counselor in International Student Counseling, gave a program update: new student enrollment is at 206 vs. 172 in the Spring vs. 189 in Fall of 2005. Thus, there is an upward trend. He then raised two concerns relevant to international students and counseling: one is that if more I-20s are sent to students, then more students will come to CCSF; he sees a direct correlation between I-20 issuance and international student enrollment (note however: it was pointed out that issuing an I-20 does not guarantee a visa, though Paul noted that of 264 I-20s issued, 80% were used by incoming students).

Specific concerns: A) If counseling had an "immigration specialist," he or she would be helpful to "out of status" students in terms of clarification and would

work directly with students once they were referred to him or her. Dean **Joanne Low** commented that the immigration specialist (a classified position) is being revived. B) Paul Wong also thought it would be helpful if a counselor were a DSO (Designated School Official). Lindy McKnight noted that the administration's stance on this is that counselors should not be DSO's. The hope is that the immigration specialist can fill that function.

**Joan Vitorelo** asked if the position of Director of International Education is being pursued. She also suggested that the IEAC be informed about the restructuring that is going on in International Education. Dean Low requested that the chair put down as an agenda item for the next meeting an update on the restructuring of International Education.

**Louise Louie**, coordinator of the Institute for International Students, gave a program update: There are a total of 84 international students in the Intensive English Program, 10 students of which are from Kyoto, Japan; they are all on homestays here and will have a session of business English integrated into the language program at the end of the semester.

Louie then distributed copies of the text recommended by the committee at the 4/15/06 meeting re: Foreign Student Conditional Admissions Program. It was passed by the Academic Senate at its May meeting. However, Joan Vitorelo noted the words "diploma and" were dropped from the recommended text. Louie informed the committee that it had been taken out at the request of **Robert Balestreri**. It was speculated that this was so because a copy of the diploma is not required by the Admissions Office.

However, at issue here is that a copy of the high school diploma document IS necessary for transcript evaluation and, further down the road, determining possible college credit toward the AA based on previous work. Since students are

concerned with having their documents evaluated as soon as possible, it is in the best interest of the students, counselors, etc. that they come to CCSF with the necessary documents so as not to lose valuable time. Having to request a diploma from the home country could be very time-consuming and frustrating for the students.

The committee was in general agreement that language requiring or highly recommending that students include their high school diploma as part of their documentation should be reinserted into the conditional admissions program text. The chair was charged with finding out if a diploma is required of international students by the Admissions Office and, based on the response, the committee would formulate wording for a new bullet point or an asterisk point on the third bullet point to the effect that the diploma is required for evaluation of transcripts and AA credit.)

(Note: The Chair, Leslie Pahl, contacted the Admissions and Registration Office on 9/20 and spoke with **Wilbur Wu**, who contacted the Department of Foreign Students within the Admissions Dept., which confirmed that the diploma as document was not required for admission, just the high school transcripts. Robert Balestreri has informed the committee that the diploma and official transcripts are required if the students wishes to have academic work evaluated for purposes of CCSF graduation or major requirements. Next step: The Chair will leave it to Dean Low, Louise Louie, and international counselors to work together to formulate the appropriate language to append to the conditional admissions program language to reflect the document requirements. Since time is of the essence, and since the committee had originally approved the word "diploma" in the language, it was agreed that the modified bullet point could be circulated
