Talita Machado's entry selected for Chancellor Day's holiday card

City College of San Francisco Chancellor Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, has announced the winning entries in the 2006 Holiday Card Competition.

Talita Machado's entry was named the first place winner. "This piece uses words to create a fun layout in the shape of San Francisco architecture. The words themselves convey hope, education, the holiday season and community. The letters 'CCSF' give more life to the illustration and represent the school in a subtle way. The colors are happy and playful, contrasting with the black background," said Machado of her work.

Second place was the work of **Karen Wood**: "The combination of nature with an outstretched hand conveys the idea of new growth toward the future. The hand is also reaching upward into the sky, symbolizing hope and reaching for the new year," Wood says.

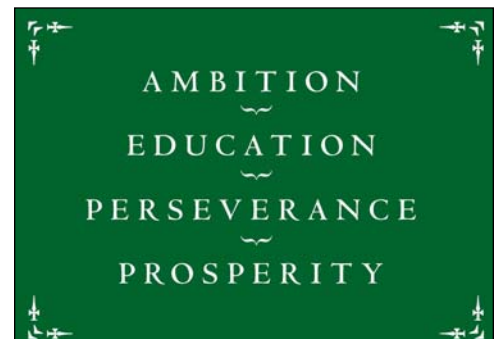
Joel Wheeler took third prize with his entry. "The four words denote a sequence: a path that begins with an ambition and leads to education - through perseverance, prosperity is achieved. The message is that an education at CCSF can be one piece of a prosperous life," says Wheeler.

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**Shared governance update
Facilities Review Committee**

Minutes, September 20, 2006

Editor's Note: On October 18, 2006 the Facilities Review Committee approved the September 20, 2006 minutes.

Review of the DRAFT Sustainability Plan

Madeline Mueller has documented typographical and grammatical errors which she will get to **Winnie Kwofie**. She suggested that the document would be easier to read if requirements for old/existing buildings would be completely separated from the requirements for new buildings; just change the layout of the information.

Parking

The language needs to specifically refer to what is to be provided for students, what is to be provided for employees. Is 50% of future parking planned to be underground? Clarification needed.

Recycling

The language describes how recycling should work, not how it is now. The program, run largely by students, has always been very under-funded. A new full time position is in process, class 5638, Environmental Assistant; this person will have responsibilities for transportation and recycling.

E-Resource Recycling: It was suggested that the Board form used for removal of equipment from the CCSF inventory be modified so multiple serial numbers can be entered on one page; the current form requires one piece of paper for each individual piece of equipment.

Existing Building LEED Certification: Concern was expressed about the financial reality of implementing a LEED rating of 33 points for many of the older buildings in the District.

New Building Certification: The achievement of LEED certification may require some trade offs: long term sustainability vs. space and functionality needs. Example, a new building might have to be reduced by a few classrooms to achieve the desired sustainability results for the long haul.

As a strategy, the College should attempt to anticipate the life of planned new buildings – 50 years? 100 years?

Timeline: changes and suggestions to Winnie Kwofie by October 18; revised draft to FRC for Nov. 1 meeting; to Board of Trustees by end of the semester.

Subcommittee Reports

Works of Art

Howard Whales. Julia Bergman is working with the San Francisco Art Commission (S.F.A.C.) to get the piece stabilized, out of the warehouse, and to the Ocean Campus by the end of the semester. Funds need to be raised to realize this goal. A photo montage of the whales placed on the plinth in front of the Science Building was distributed to the group. Dr. Robert Gabriner earns social justice award from Benjamin L. Hooks Institute

City College's **Robert Gabriner**, Vice Chancellor for Institutional Advancement, recently received the Social Justice Award from the Benjamin L. Hooks Institute for Social Change at the University of Memphis for his work in Fayette County, Tennessee, 40 years ago. The Hooks Institute award to Dr. Gabriner was "in recognition of the outstanding courage shown, the challenges faced, the obstacles overcome and the personal sacrifices made in dedicating yourself to the struggle for the advancement of civil rights in Fayette County, Tennessee." Dr. Gabriner spent three years working with local county people from Fayette and three other West Tennessee cotton counties from 1964 through 1966 on voter rights issues.

individuals in several departments to re-landscape the large area around the plinth. If the location near Phelan Avenue is approved by the S.F.A.C., the anti-violence work by **Bufano**, which needs restoration, will be re-located to another appropriate CCSF location.

Grant. Prismatic Glass. Contact has been made with the family of the deceased artist and discussions are underway about possible options. An attempt should also be made to try to locate another non-CCSF home for the piece.

VandenBerge. Ceramic bas relief. The Project Director for the Child Development Center project has the image and all of the specs. It is hoped that the mural will be placed on an exterior wall of the new center.

John Adams Mural. A party will be held Wednesday, Oct. 11, 12 noon, to celebrate the restoration/creation of the third version of the mural. Refreshments will be provided by the John Adams Associated Students. A brochure/key will be created to identify the many people and images in the mural.

Fall Library exhibitions

The three exhibitions in the Louise and Claude Rosenberg Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center are accompanied by bibliographies of library resources. Pick them up at each of the exhibition sites in the Library's atrium. We're presenting two exhibitions on Iran and one on the Día de los Muertos Holiday. The shows run through **Friday, December 8**.

At a time when our federal administration has Iran in its sights, we hope these two exhibitions reveal a side of Iran that isn't represented in the national mainstream media. Audio Visual Librarian **Sirous Monajami**, a valued college resource, has made both these exhibitions possible.

"Write, Read: Contemporary Iranian American Calligraphic Art" presents the work of two artists, **Seyed Alavi** and **Ali Dadgar**, both Bay Area residents. Each artist invites us to consider the physical form of the Farsi language which uses the Arabic alphabet. Alavi's large digital drawings use the words of **Rumi**, **Hafez** and other poets to create abstracted images and a collection of portraits called "Zikr." Dadgar's multimedia works use Farsi as well as Hebrew, Turkish and English. Iranian literary figures form part of the artist's visual vocabulary, they are represented in their own hand or with their image. The exhibition acknowledges the many written languages used by members of the City College Community. A comment book next to the exhibition on the second floor invites responses to the exhibition in any language, any alphabet.

"Look at Iran: Her People, Culture and History" explores Iranian and Iranian American visual culture, cinema and Norouz, Iranian New Year. Co-curated by Iranian American Librarian **Sirous Monajami** who has curated an Iranian film festival every Spring here at CCSF for the last five years, the exhibition also represents the Iranian American experience and includes the work of CCSF photography instructor **Nadereh Degani**. It is located on the third floor.

"The Political Side of Día de los Muertos," co-curated with **María Pinedo** of the John Adams Campus Library, explores the holiday as a project of the Chicano Arts Movement. Featuring world famous posters and familiar images such as "Sun Mad" by **Ester Hernandez** and "Frida," designed by **Rupert Garcia** for the Galería de la Raza's groundbreaking 1977 exhibition honoring **Frida Kahlo**. The posters are from the collection of Pinedo and from artists affiliated with Mission Gráfica. The exhibition is dedicated to **Ralph Maradiaga**, co-founder of the Galería. Two of Ralph's prints are on display. The exhibition is a collaboration with Mission Gráfica at the Mission Cultural Center for Latino Arts. It is on the fourth floor.

Reception: Come meet artists from all three exhibitions at a closing reception, **Thursday, December 7** from 5 to 7 P.M. on the second floor of the library in Madeline Haas Russell Gallery.

Beautiful Free Things: The Graphic Communications Department designed a full color poster, email kconnell@ccsf.edu for one to hang in your classroom or office. A set of six bookmarks was designed for Iranian exhibitions by graphics student **Daniel Bahmani** working with **Lorraine Leber** and **Colin Hall** of Graphic Communications, you can pick them up near the comment book in the second floor exhibition.

Free bibliographies are available next to each exhibition. Come by the Library!

I. Call to Order

The Academic Senate Executive Council meeting came to order at 2:34 P.M.

II. Adoption of Agenda

Council adopted the agenda.

III. Approval of October 11, 2006 Minutes

Council approved the minutes.

IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Teti distributed a written report listing various issues, events, and announcements. He drew attention to the limited function of certain committees.

B. 1st Vice President Fred Chavaria commended the article on guidelines for committee chairs in the October 23 issue of *City Currents*.

C. Suzanne Lo reminded us that the applications for the Hayward Award ("for community college faculty members who demonstrate the highest level of commitment to their students, college, and profession") are due on December 1. She reported that Chancellor Day continues to rework the org chart for Dean of Diversity and Student Equity, and will present it to the Diversity Committee.

V. Committee Appointments

Resolution 2006.10.25.01: Shared Governance Committee Appointments

Resolved, that the Academic Senate Executive Council approve the shared governance committee appointments, as recommended by the Committee on Committees.

Moved: Fred Chavaria; seconded: Melinda Weil; motion carried unanimously.

VI. Unfinished Business

A. Goal Groups

The Council members charged with initiating communications within the G.E. Graduation Requirements, Enhancing Faculty Diversity, and Effective Senate Communication working groups were reminded to begin initiating.

B. Review of Senate Shared Governance Appointment Policy

Council reviewed the three criteria for a faculty appointment to shared governance committees. Discussion focused on possible exceptions to these criteria, restrictions imposed by the definition, the history of changes to the policy, and retaining balanced representation on committees.

C. Resolution on Courses Offered at Alternative Locations

Resolution 2006.10.25.02: Courses at Alternative Locations

Whereas outreach to community is important to City College of San Francisco; and

Whereas chairs of many departments are requested to offer laboratory or other courses requiring significant expenditures on educational resources and personnel at alternative locations; and

Whereas courses in alternative locations are not replacements for established courses; and

Whereas the development of educational programs is the purview of faculty,

Be It Resolved that the Academic Senate support the primacy of department chairs (in consultation with department members when appropriate) to determine the efficacy of offering supplementary course sections at alternative locations in response to demonstrated student demand and increased department class hours, and with respect to the costs and maintenance of current personnel, equipment, supplies, facilities and other educational resources.

Be It Further Resolved that the Academic Senate support protection for departments for three semesters as regards costs and class hours in order to allow a testing and marketing period for courses at alternative locations.

Moved: Melinda Weil; seconded: Rosemary Brinson; motion carried unanimously.

VII. New Business

A. Items from the State Academic Senate (ASCCC)

1. Teti attended the Area B Meeting.

2. Council discussed certain resolutions proposed for vote at the ASCCC Fall 2006 Plenary Session. Council decided to support retaining the word "transfer" in degree titles, discussed the difficulty in solidifying the distinction between the "associate of arts" and "associate of science" degrees, and considered whether to require a minimum grade of C in all courses required in the area of emphasis/major.

B. Union Presentation

AFT 2121 President Ed Murray presented possibilities for faculty to involve themselves in the upcoming state election and in ongoing efforts to advance educational goals at both the college and state level.
