## ADA duties clarification

As many of you know, **Leilani (Lani) Battiste** has been hired as the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Compliance Director for the San Francisco Community College District (City College of San Francisco). She will focus on facilities access issues, meaning that she will be working with access compliance issues and the removal of physical barriers for students with physical disabilities.

**Linda Jackson** in the Office of Affirmative Action will continue to provide ADA compliance with respect to employee and applicant reasonable accommodation issues, and assist Disabled Students Program and Services (DSP&S) with student reasonable accommodation issues. DSP&S will continue to assess and facilitate reasonable accommodations for students.

## National American Indian Heritage Month celebrated

In honor of National American Indian Heritage Month, the Native American Study Organization (NASO) is hosting a Powwow on **Tuesday, November 28** from 12 NOON to 1:30 P.M. in Ram Plaza on the Ocean Campus. It will feature noncompetitive drumming and dancing to present the public with the culture of the American Indian tribes. Black American Indian Association's **Don Littlecloud** will speak on the rich history of Black American Indians. "People can take part in American Indian culture and have some American Indian food," said **Alvin Jenkins**, advisor of NASO. "It will be a rather comprehensive event." The entire City College community as well as the public is encouraged to attend. Also during the month-long observance, American Indian art will be exhibited in the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center and the City Art Gallery, both on the Ocean Campus. "We are a disenfranchised population," said **Christopher Gomora**, Treasurer of NASO. "One goal of our organization is to create a space for indigenous people." NASO is also working on food booths as a fundraising campaign with their "Taco Tuesdays" and forthcoming "Fry Bread Fridays," both in Ram Plaza on the Ocean Campus. The planned events seek to raise awareness and representation for indigenous people. According to NASO the indigenous population may be one of the smallest ethno-populations in the United States. NASO, an Associated Student recognized club, is a student council of American Indian people that is an Inter-Tribal group of Indigenous First Nation Individuals. **Parking and Transportation Subcommittee**

*Editor's Note: On November 16, 2006 the approved minutes of the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee's September 12, 2006 and October 10, 2006 approved minutes*

**Old Business:**

**Carl Koehler** reported that he went to a neighborhood meeting and Supervisor **Sean Elsbernd** assured the neighborhood association that all involved would have to okay any bike path on Phelan.

**Sam Fielding** from Municipal Transportation Agency (MTA) planning left a voice mail message regarding the proposed plan of one lane north and two lanes south. MTA will be doing a presentation to the next Facilities Review Committee (FRC) meeting on Oct. 18, 2006. FRC committee has rejected previous proposed bike paths on Phelan because it interferes with traffic flow. MTA still talking about a light at the bookstore but no funding or time line has been assured.

**James Keenan** noted that the committee needs to consider the long term need of a walking overpass for both the bookstore annex and to the reservoir area as buildings are built.

Carl Koehler will also be exploring a white passenger loading zone adjacent to Cloud Circle entry on Phelan and a KEEP CLEAR signage on the road outside the entry to Cloud Circle on Phelan

Location for 14 bike rack hoops to be added to the Ocean campus - 50% fund-

ing approved by the District/ 50% funding to be voted on soon. Tentative date for completion of installation is Nov 2006.

James Keenan reported that he will get quotes of preparing location at 700 bungalows for free standing rack

**New Business**

First three weeks of the semester was very busy with an abundance of reports to Campus police. The committee discussed changing the current policy of the first three weeks with no parking enforcement to something shorter.

Carl Koehler reports that a fight occurred between two drivers on Ocean Avenue. One driver was seriously injured and with the other driver facing possible felony charges.

**Winifred Kwofie** reports that Facilities and Planning are working with Human Resources to produce a job announcement for the Parking Coordinator/ Environmental Sustainability Assistant.

**Muriel Parenteau** reports that the Request for Proposal (RFP) process for a Car Share program for CCSF has been completed and the announcement of the vendor chosen has will occur after approval by the Board of Trustees.

Committee discussed the need for crossing guards at the bookstore to be paid for with the increase in parking fees. The committee voted to propose to the (FRC)

## Parking and Transportation Committee

October 10, 2006

### Old Business

The money for new bicycle rack around campus has been approved by the College and Associated Students. A final approval is needed from Purchasing to move forward with the acquisition. Locations have been discussed and will be finalized with Building & Grounds prior to installation.

The request for a "Passenger Loading Zone" on Phelan Avenue, and "Keep Clear" street markings at the Cloud Circle entry area on Phelan Avenue will be discussed with representatives from the Municipal Transportation Agency (MTA) on October 18th.

The acquisition of a flashing red "Stop" sign and radar sensitive speed limit signs for on-campus were discussed. The Chief of Police is looking for a local vendor to obtain a price quote.

Car Share has been chosen to make vehicles available at certain City College campuses. Two car share pods will be located at Ocean Campus adjacent to the bookstore annex, and one will be located at the district office at 33 Gough St., final location to be determined. The program should be in place by November 1st. Students, faculty, and staff will receive discounts from the Car Share program.

### New Business

John Adams will be moving some classes from Hayes Street to D'Avila School on Waller Street @ Masonic due to seismic retrofitting. The white passenger zone adjacent to the school has been repainted and marked to facilitate passenger unloading.

The committee discussed the hiring of four part-time crossing guards to manage pedestrian traffic at the Bookstore Annex crossing and the Riordan High School crossing during peak hours. The discussion and subsequent proposal have been approved by the Facility Review Committee (FRC). The question was raised as to what the appropriate next step was. **Carl Koehler** would contact Human Resources.

Interviews have been held for a part-time parking coordinator, who will also supervise the recycling program on campus. Applicants have been interviewed, and the position should soon be filled.

Issues were discussed regarding the transportation of Students with disabilities and the City's paratransit (MUNI) program. The committee discussed towing unattended cars from white zones.

## 'The Guardsman,' staffers earn 25 awards at Nor-Cal confab

City College journalism students and *The Guardsman* won 25 awards on October 14 at this year's Journalism Association of Community Colleges Northern California conference at San Jose State University. *The Guardsman* earned its seventh general excellence award since entering competition in 1996.

"It's extremely gratifying to see that year-in, year-out, our staff can compete both on a state and a regional level and do very well," said **Juan Gonzales**, Journalism Department Chair.

The event featured a keynote address by **Lance Williams**, the *San Francisco Chronicle* investigative reporter who co-authored a series of stories with **Mark Fainaru-Wada** which exposed **Barry Bonds'** – and other athletes' – abuse of steroids.

A team of eight students and two teachers attended the conference, participated in on-the-spot competitions and attended a variety of workshops about journalism

taught by teachers and professionals in the field.

About 300 journalism students and instructors from 22 community colleges attended, according to **Rubina Gulati**, vice president of the Nor-Cal JACC.

Highlights of the day included first place in the on-the-spot copy-editing contest by **T.J. Johnston**, *The Guardsman* copy

editor; two general excellence awards in investigative reporting awarded to **Chris Albon**, news editor, and **Elizabeth Pfeffer**, former news editor; first place in bring-in, stand-alone feature photography for photojournalism student **Peter Scales**; and two honorable mention awards for Managing Editor **Miles Harwell**.

## Laurie Wu McClain publishes articles

**Laurie Wu McClain** of the Asian Studies and Social Sciences Department collaborated with scholar **Him Mark Lai** in writing and editing 'A Wen Family Saga: From the United States to China' for publication in *Chinese America: History and Perspectives 2005*. This work tells of an actual Chinese American family which ran a lumber company in San Francisco at the turn of the twentieth century, when two members — brother **Wen Xiongfei** and sister **Wen Zhengde** — drawn by a fervent sense of nationalism, go to China. The brother joined **Sun Yatsen's** movement, and the sister eventually became a supporter of the Communist Party. Their saga traces the family's history through the sister's return to the United States in 1982.

McClain's article 'From Victims to Victors: A Chinese Contribution to American Law' was re-published in China this year in a book on Civil Rights decisions handed down by the United States Supreme Court.

## Steven Kessler to start class in BioEthics

**Steven Kessler** will teach a new course at City College of San Francisco Bio 55, Bioethics, which will examine hot topics such as cloning, stem cells, genetic engineering, and human reproductive technologies. Many new biological technologies are emerging and are being discussed in the media. The goal of this course is to provide a background into the science behind these technologies and to introduce different ways of thinking about how they might impact our society. Possible impacts can be on race, the economy, human health, and the environment. "This should be an exciting new course that ties together many important issues that are relevant to today's world," Kessler says. # Psychology career seminar December 4

The semester's final seminar on Career Exploration in Psychology will be held **Monday, December 4**, from 6 to 9:30 P.M. in Batmale 513. The event will be both a graduation celebration for Fall '06 interns as well as an orientation for all students interested in taking the Psych 61-62-63 internship classes. The evening will begin with appetizers generously donated by Citizen Thai restaurant in North Beach.

Students will then have an opportunity to meet this semester's interns, network with their supervisors and get a head start on selecting an internship for the Spring '07 semester.

In Psych 61-62-63 students earn 1-3 units while volunteering in a campus or community psychology placement for 5-15 hours each week. Community agencies have included New Leaf, Girls Justice Initiative, Woman, Inc., Tenderloin Health, Haight Ashbury Clinic, Institute on Aging, and SF CASA. On-campus placements have included the African American Scholastic Program with Dr **Robert Clark**, Re-entry Student Counseling with Dr. **Roni Owens**, and Project Survive with Dr. **Leslie Simon**.

This is an ideal program for a student wishing to explore, through a field placement, the reality of being a psych major. It also provides excellent experience for a student who eventually wishes to apply for a Bachelors or Graduate program in psychology, counseling, or social work. Such programs are often impacted and field placement experiences are powerful additions to a student's application package. In addition they help a student clarify their strengths, interests and career path. To compliment their field placement, students will meet on eight Monday evenings for the Psych 61-62-63 seminar with Behavioral Science instructor **Aliyah Stein**. The prerequisite for the

Attorneys **Dan Siegal** and **David Green** of the First Amendment Project will talk about Wolf, who is a freelance videographer and the target of federal government efforts to obtain his video footage of an anarchist-sponsored demonstration in 2005 that led to physical attacks on police officers. Wolf has refused to give up his tapes, so he was found in contempt of court and is currently imprisoned at a federal facility in Dublin.
