Board of Trustees actions at November 21, 2006 meeting told

The Board of Trustees took the following actions at its November 21 meeting held at 33 Gough St. Items are listed in the order in which they were discussed.

- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-B2** — Authorization for two (2) Contract Modifications totaling \$49,058 for Special Services Contracts and Construction Contracts: A) Royston Hanamoto Alley & Abey (Landscape Architect/Planner), increase by \$12,425 to \$127,425 for additional services to develop a cost estimate for various site planning options for the Performing Arts Complex, Joint Use Facility and Adv. Tech. Building Projects as part of the Site Planning for Reservoir Site Projects; B) KMD/K2A (Architectural & Engineering Services), increase by \$36,633 to \$6,067,271 for additional value engineering for upper terrace, site lighting, natatorium lighting, communication system/natatorium lighting coordination, power of sump pump pit and alarm panel for Wellness Center.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-B3** — Authorization to approve a training contract with San Francisco International Airport for an amount not to exceed \$67,500; and authorization to enter into a Specialized Services Contract with **Ashour Badal**, Ph.D., to provide Middle Eastern Cross-Cultural Awareness training to SFIA police officers for an amount not to exceed \$30,000 for the term November 16, 2006 to June 30, 2007.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-C1** — Procurement of Equipment, Supplies, Services, Etc., less than \$3,000.

- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-C2** — Procurement of Equipment, Supplies, Services, Etc., more than \$3,000.
- **Approved Resolutions No. 061121-G1-H3** — G1-G4: Academic Employees (Faculty), Credit Program/Noncredit Program, District Funded; H1-3: Academic Employees (Faculty), Credit Program/Noncredit Program Categorically Funded.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-S2** — Presenting the Initial Proposals of the Service Employees International Union, Local 790, and of the San Francisco Community College District for a Successor Collective Bargaining Agreement, and Placing a Special Order of Business on the Agenda for the Public Board of Trustees Meeting in December 2006 for Public Response to the Initial Proposals.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-S3** — Authorization to Withdraw from Membership on the Schools Excess Liability Fund JPA.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-S4** — Authorizing an increase from \$10,000 to \$60,000 in the amount that the Chancellor or his designees are authorized to execute on behalf of the District for contracts for personal services and/or rental of facilities agreements where District is the lessee, subject to applicable provisions of law.
- **Approved Resolution No. 061121-W1** — Authorization to execute a Master

Agreement by and between the San Francisco Community College District and the San Francisco Department of Health to formalize the relationship for collaboration in an event of a major disaster.

• **Approved Resolution No. 061121-W2** — Authorization to Contract with Crumbs Unlimited to offer foodservice at the Southeast Campus. It will start with the spring semester and will be a pilot program for six months. If successful, the District will have the ability to extend the contract for two single year extensions upon mutual agreement for an acceptable daily rent that will accrue to the Southeast Campus Student Council.

• **Approved Resolution No. 061121-B1** — Authorization to Award Special Service Contract for Architectural & Engineering Services for the Classroom/Laboratory Complex for Theatre, Music, Film / Media Arts Programs and Performing Arts Center to LMN Architects / Tom Eliot Fisch Architects (A Joint Venture) [Tom Eliot Fisch Architects is a Small Local Business Enterprise (SLBE)] for a Total contract Award Not to Exceed \$9,000,000.

• **Tabled until the January 2007 Board Meeting Resolution No. 061121-P1** — Notice of Intention to Amend the SFCCD Policy Manual Section 1.05 – Meetings. The proposed change to the Board's policy on meetings would move public comments on topics not on the agenda to the beginning of the Board meeting. Currently, such speakers must wait until the end of the meeting.

• **Approved Resolution No. 061121-S1** — Presenting the Initial Proposals of the American Federation of Teachers, Local 2121, and the San Francisco Community College District for a Successor Collective Bargaining Agreement, and Placing a Special Order of Business on the Agenda for a Public Board of Trustees Meeting in December 2006 for Public Response to the Initial Proposals.

Image consulting students study 'Suitology 101' at Mens' Wearhouse



CCSF Image Consulting students asked lots of questions during a tour of Men's Wearhouse recently to gain insights into the men's fashion industry. The Men's Wearhouse Inc. operates as a specialty retailer of menswear in the U.S. and Canada.

Students in Kelly Armstrong's Image Consulting class, Fashion 45, held their annual field trip at the Mens' Wearhouse located at 601 Market Street in San Francisco. The enrollment of male students increased considerably this year so the venue was the perfect place to learn about men's clothing.

Fashion 45, Image Consulting prepares students to become image consultants, either working independently or for a retailer. It incorporates the techniques of color, wardrobe selection, figure analysis and business development.

The students were taken to the third floor, away from shopping customers. Manager Charles Wallis, who has 20 years with the company, led the evening off by welcoming the students and sharing his business background. The discussion flowed beautifully as Wallis told the students how he started in the business interning as a tailor, then opening his own tailoring shop and being courted by Men's Wearhouse Owner George Zimmer to operate the tailoring department. Wallis told the students, "If you do good work and stick with it you will get positive results from it, if it's a true labor of love."

Wallis also explained and demonstrated the construction, detailing, and tailoring process that goes into making a suit. He pointed out that when you see a suit jacket and the sleeve lining is different from the rest of the jacket that shows the quality of the garment. He also explained that four buttons on a suit jacket's sleeve also conveys another standard of quality in custom tailoring. "When the Q&A session started, I didn't think the students would ever stop asking questions, wonderful and thought provoking questions. I was even more impressed when they asked about employment opportunities and received an open invitation to apply from Mr. Wallis," says Armstrong. Current student Jorge Kobe said, "The field trip really opened my eyes. As many times as I have been at that location, I never knew there were other floors. Plus, I didn't realize it was such a huge corporation where you could move up and work in different states. Charles was great and I enjoyed all the information he gave us."

Disability awareness fair gives insight

City College of San Francisco's first annual Disability Awareness Fair was held recently in conjunction with the national observance of Disability Awareness Month. The lunchtime fairs took place at the Student Lounge on the Downtown Campus, Taste Buds on the Ocean Campus, the Student Lounge at the Mission Campus and the Lobby of the Southeast Campus.

Faculty, staff, curious students both with and without disabilities, and students who are parents or relatives of people with disabilities came by the tables staffed by local nonprofit agencies and members of the Disabled Student Programs and Services (DSPS). Those who came to the Downtown Campus had an opportunity to learn a few signs from American Sign Language (ASL) instructor **Jane Lampe** or learn about the services the San Francisco Public Library has for deaf and disabled patrons. Library bookmarks with ASL finger spelling letters and numbers on them were a hit.

On the Ocean Campus, two walls of the Taste Buds cafeteria were lined with tables featuring representatives from Golden Gate Regional Center, Deaf Counseling and Referral Agency/ Employment Development Department (DCARA/EDD), California State Department of Rehabilitation, the Rose Resnick Lighthouse for the Blind, San Francisco City and County Department of Human Services, Community Vocational Enterprises, San Francisco Public Library, the Independent Living Resource Center, and the Deaf and Disabled Telecommunications Program (DDTP). **Casey Kho** from DDTP demonstrated phones with large buttons for visually impaired people and TTYs for people with hearing impairments. DSPS Accommodations Specialist **Muriel Parenteau** demonstrated some of the equipment DSPS has available for student use: a talking calculator, a magnifying half-glove, the Franklin speller, and

an Alpha Smart, a portable device with large keyboard and display useful for students who lack fine motor skills, and a chapter of a book in Braille. Learning Disabilities Specialist **Ellen Conaway** spoke with participants about how to determine if someone has a learning disability. DSPS High Tech Center Instructor **Vivien Mun** had a continuously running PowerPoint presentation about adaptive computer equipment and software.

At the Mission Campus interested people in contact with agencies who have specific Spanish-language services for people with disabilities. Representatives there were from Community Vocational Enterprises (CVE), Proyecto Vision, and the Independent Living Resource Center. **Judi Kaplan**, a DSPS speech and language instructor, brought a graphic and pictorial board in Spanish and English

outlining critical issues in hearing conversation, information very useful for anyone who regularly listens to loud music or works in loud environments.

At Southeast, several students watched "The Power of 504," an engaging, exciting video made by **Dan Veltri**, an independent producer, and DSPS Counselor **Kathleen Duffy** chronicling the culture-transforming events of the sit-in at San Francisco City HEW building by people with disabilities for more than three weeks in 1977.

DSPS Counselors **Karen Rachels**, **Terence Chuck** and **Carol Amend** as well as Alternate Media Specialist **Tom Hetherington**, Speech and Language Specialist **Joyce Foreman**, Instructor **Robert Fitch** and Learning Disabilities Specialist **Dorothy Blanchard** also added their expertise to the several fairs.

Parking and Transportation Subcommittee

Minutes of September 12, 2006

Editor's Note: On November 16, 2006 the approved minutes of the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee's September 12, 2006 and October 10, 2006 approved minutes

Old Business:

Carl Koehler reported that he went to a neighborhood meeting and Supervisor **Sean Elsbernd** assured the neighborhood association that all involved would have to okay any bike path on Phelan.

Sam Fielding from Municipal Transportation Agency (MTA) planning left a voice mail message regarding the proposed plan of one lane north and 2 lanes south. MTA will be doing a presentation to the next Facilities Review Committee (FRC) meeting on Oct 18, 2006. FRC committee has rejected previous proposed bike paths on Phelan because it interferes with traffic flow. MTA still talking about a light at the bookstore but no funding or time line has been assured.

James Keenan noted that the committee needs to consider the long term need of a walking overpass for both the bookstore annex and to the reservoir area as buildings are built.

Carl Koehler will also be exploring a white passenger loading zone adjacent to Cloud Circle entry on Phelan and a KEEP CLEAR signage on the road outside the entry to Cloud Circle on Phelan. Location for 14 bike rack hoops to be added to the Ocean Campus - 50% funding approved by the District/ 50% funding to be voted on soon. Tentative date for completion of installation is November 2006.

James Keenan reported that he will get quotes of preparing location at 700 bungalows for free standing rack

New Business

First three weeks of the semester was very

busy with an abundance of reports to Campus police. The committee discussed changing the current policy of the first three weeks with no parking enforcement to something shorter.

Carl Koehler reports that a fight occurred between two drivers on Ocean Avenue. One driver was seriously injured and with the other driver facing possible felony charges.

Winifred Kwofie reports that Facilities and Planning are working with Human Resources to produce a job announcement for the Parking Coordinator/ Environmental Sustainability Assistant.

Muriel Parenteau reports that the Request for Proposal (RFP) process for a Car Share program for CCSF has been completed and the announcement of the vendor chosen has will occur after approval by the Board of Trustees.

Committee discussed the need for crossing guards at the bookstore to be paid for with the increase in parking fees. The committee voted to propose to the (FRC) the hiring of 2 crossing guards five hours a day /five days a week with benefits – Classification 8300

Committee discussed exploration for limited time visitor parking spaces in Lot A. **Carl Koehler** will explore use of parking meters and coloring of curb.

Shawn Yee enquired about the solar powered flashing stop sign in Cloud Circle proposed last semester. **Carl Koehler** will check in with **Steve Herman** about payment to the vendor.

Carl Koehler also wants to place “Your speed is...” warning signs in Cloud Circle to remind people to go 10 MPH. He will get quotes for equipment and present at the next Parking and Transportation meeting.

IV. Unfinished Business

A. Continued Discussion of the CCSF Associate Degrees

1. Advanced Placement credit for Option A

Articulation Officer **Deanna Abma** generously agreed to maintain and update the list of Advanced Placement courses that have been departmentally approved for CCSF degree credit. The Committee was not yet ready to support having the list published in the Catalog.

2. Using Upper Division credits toward a CCSF degree

Dean **Brian Ellison** presented a proposal outlining how students could use both lower- and upper-division transfer credit toward a CCSF degree. Committee members voiced various concerns, including the effect on the residency requirement, the distinction between G.E., major, and elective credit, “double-dipping”, the

effect on the Option B degree, the manner equivalency is determined, and the A&R evaluators' workload. Ellison will return with a second draft of his proposal.

The Committee will return to other associate degree issues at future meetings.

B. Continued Discussion of Academic Freedom Statement for the Catalog

Dean Ellison presented a proposed Academic Freedom statement for the Catalog. The proposed statement was a slightly condensed version of Board Policy 6.06A (Academic Freedom: General Principles). The Committee recommended that this section be quoted in its entirety.

2006–10–23–01 That the Academic Policies Committee recommend to the Senate that Board Policy 6.06A (Academic Freedom: General Principles) be published in the Catalog.

V. New Business

A. Language Modification in the *International Students Conditional Admission Policy*.

The International Education Advisory Subcommittee has decided to add a footnote to the Conditional Admission Policy. Dean **Larry Klein** explained that the footnote does not change the policy, but merely clarifies when and why students must provide a transcript of previous work. The Committee noted one typo (the visa type is I-20, not 1-20). We were advised that Dean **Joanne Low** is working to change the phrase "foreign students" to "international students".

2006–10–23–02 That the Academic Policies Committee ratify the decision to add the footnote.
