The campus police coordinate responses with Student Health Services and also ensure that EMS personnel are escorted to the location of the emergency. Ocean Campus encompasses 54 acres and dozens of buildings, and EMS responders may not know the layout of the campus. The campus police provide an escort to EMS to make sure they reach the scene of the incident in a timely manner.

The festivities took place in the Pierre Coste Room, with students, teachers, homestay hosts, peer mentors, and conversation partners in attendance. A special appearance was made by Chancellor **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, and **Sachiyo Kashihara**, Advisor for Educational Affairs of the Consulate of Japan.

In addition to food and drinks (non-alcoholic, of course), a traditional fishermen's dance was performed by some of the Japanese students. **Michele Zimmerman**, Activities Coordinator at IIS, put together one of the highlights of the evening: a DVD containing well wishes from the families of the Japanese students.

Of course, no birthday party would be complete without a birthday cake and birthday presents, so, they were delighted with receiving both. The birthday students, from Kyoto, Japan, are on their Semester Abroad Program at IIS.

This Coming of Age festival is celebrated on the second Monday. All young people who turn twenty years old in that year celebrate on Seijin No Hi. Twenty is the age considered as the beginning of adulthood. It is also the minimum legal age for voting, drinking, and smoking. Celebrations are held nationwide in every town with most of the people turning 20 participating in formal dresses.

Seijin No Hi is a national holiday. It is a day of tradition, but also of fun. In addition, it is a day of advice and wise words and a day to begin exercising the rights of adulthood.

## Nutrition clinics at Student Health Center, PE Department

Students, faculty, classified and administrators can start healthy behaviors now and sign up for a free nutrition check-up and diet analysis. Individual nutrition counseling will be available this spring from mid-March to May.

Funding for the Nutrition Clinics is provided by the Carl D. Perkins Vocational & Technical Education Act (VTEA), a collaborative project among the Consumer Education Department's Nutrition Assistant Program, Student Health Center, and the Department of Physical Education.

How much does it cost? The service is free for CCSF students, faculty, and staff

The nutrition counselors are Nutrition Assistant Program students, supervised by faculty Registered Dietitians

Participants must sign-up for a set of two appointments (1-hour interview and 1-hour follow-up). Only a limited number of appointments are available.

## I. Call to Order

The Academic Senate Executive Council meeting came to order at 2:36 P.M.

## II. Adoption of Agenda

Council adopted the agenda.

## III. Approval of October 25, 2006 Minutes

Council approved the minutes.

## IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Teti distributed a written report listing various issues, events, and announcements. He drew attention to (1) the Chancellor's response to the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Offices report which includes two new associate deans for which care will be taken to ensure that policy is followed as regards retreat rights; and (2) the Chancellor's new draft of the Proposal for a Dean of Diversity and Student Equity.

B. 1st Vice President Fred Chavaria discussed the methods by which the information regarding committee membership, composition, and effectiveness was gathered and expanded. He presented the 2006-07 Goal Group intentions to the Board of Trustees at their last meeting.

C. Teti presented a special report on his attendance at the ASCCC Fall 2006 Plenary Session. He detailed the critical voting results in addition to presentations and breakout sessions he attended. Council discussed anticipated problems if the ASCCC successfully seeks Title 5

changes to (1) require one-level-below-English 1A as a pre-requisite for all transfer-level courses and (2) disallow students to satisfy major requirements with CSU G.E. and IGETC.

## V. Committee Appointments

### Resolution 2006.11.08.01: Shared Governance Committee Appointments

**Resolved**, that the Academic Senate Executive Council approve the shared governance committee appointments, as recommended by the Committee on Committees.

Moved: Fred Chavaria; seconded: Monica Bosson; motion carried unanimously.

### A. Goal Groups

#### 1. G.E. Graduation Requirements

Loren Bell is organizing a meeting schedule for members.

#### 2. Enhancing Faculty Diversity

Rodolfo Padilla has arranged a schedule for meetings and collected articles to inspire and focus discussion.

#### 3. Effective Senate Communication

Teti is moderating an email discussion among members.

### B. Update: Senate Shared Governance Appointment Policy

### Resolution 2006.11.08.02: Senate Shared Governance Appointment Policy

**Resolved**, persons who do not fulfill the definition of faculty for the purpose of Governance appointments be allowed to serve as resource persons on unlimited shared governance committees.

Moved: Francine Podenski; seconded: Fred Chavaria; motion carried unanimously.

### C. Second Reading: Resolution on Faculty Notification of Meetings

Discussion focused on including language to ensure that that scheduling of

open meetings not be at times inaccessible to faculty, on providing immediate faculty response to college issues of concern, on the details of reasonable notification and on avoiding conflict vis a vis a typical faculty schedule.

### D. Update: Student Learning Outcomes Task Force

Teti presented the SLO Task Force draft goals; Council suggested an addition to address the concerns of faculty regarding perceived negative effects of required SLOs.

## VII. New Business

### A. First Reading: Academic Freedom Statement in the Catalog

The Academic Policies Committee recommends that the Academic Freedom policy statement from the San Francisco Community College District Policy Manual, with legal authority based on sections of the California Education Code and of Title 5, be printed in its entirety in the CCSF Catalog. Concern was expressed regarding the vagaries of certain language in the statement. Council asked Teti to return the statement to the Academic Policies Committee for revision consistent with the intentions of the statement.

### B. Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs (VCAA): Draft Job Announcement and Search Committee

The announcement requires that the applicant have at least three years of teaching experience; it no longer includes the phrase "or the equivalent." Council approved the job announcement. Council discussed Chancellor Day's request that the VCAA search committee consist of a different complement of faculty, classified, and administration (and include a student) than that required by the Administrator Hiring Procedures Agreement. Whereas some members were in favor of students serving on the
