## Yarns of Rebellion exhibit: Women Needling History

The Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center and the Women's Studies Department have collaborated to produce *Yarns of Rebellion: Women Needling History*, a mixed media exhibition on the second floor of the Library through May 18.

The exhibition focuses on “subversive sewing,” and knitting, comparing the needle with the pen and representing the articulate way in which the needle can be used by women artists to respond to personal and political issues. CCSF students and staff, as well as local artists, have contributed work to the exhibition.

“Yarns” includes quilts that read as political posters, a knitted installation of tiny

red sweaters, each one representing a U.S. servicewoman who has died in the war in Iraq, projects from students in the CCSF Fashion Department's Flat Pattern class at the Evans Campus, t-shirts embroidered with portraits of **Edwidge Danticat** and **Emily Dickinson** and a pair of puppets designed for a production on indigenous fishing rights. Several pieces are work made by mothers for their daughters, including a wardrobe that humanized an early Barbie doll and handmade books used to teach one young girl about the world.

The Labor Archive and Research Center at San Francisco State University has contributed a section of the exhibition on the labor history of garment workers. That display case focuses on the Dollar Store garment workers' strike in Chinatown in

the 1930s and the Triangle Shirtwaist factory organizing efforts and deadly fire in New York City in the early twentieth century. Handwritten bilingual outreach materials developed by the striking Dollar Store workers, in Chinese and English, are on display.

The exhibition runs **through May 18**. A bibliography on women's history and women in the arts is available by the exhibition on the second floor. Bookmarks with selected images of the artists' work will soon be produced by the Graphics 68 class (taught by **Lorraine Leber** and **John Seckman**, with production coordinated by **Colin Hall**). # Karl Mauzey GLBT educator of year

Dr. **Karl P. Mauzey**, Instructor in the Computer Networking and Information Technology Department, was named the 2007 GLBT Educator of the Year by the National Organization of Gay and Lesbian Scientists and Technical Professionals (NOGLSTP). "The award is reserved for recognizing an GLBTA Educator who has enabled significant growth for GLBTA students in science or technology through teaching, counseling, advocacy and as a role model," said **Steven Jacquier** of the NOGLSTP Board of Directors in making the presentation. NOGLSTP is a subgroup of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Jacquier also pointed out that Mauzey developed and taught CCSF's first Human Sexuality course – Mauzey began his professional career in biological sciences — was a founding member of the Bay Area Gays & Lesbians in

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## *Alumni talk of their career paths to current students*

### Chandrakant Patel speaks of HP

City College Alumnus and Hewlett Packard Fellow and Birnbaum Scholar **Chandrakant Patel** came home to CCSF on February 23, to a standing room only lecture on Global Engineering for the engineering students and the Foundation Auxiliary, which raises scholarship money for CCSF.

Before the lecture he was treated to a lunch prepared and beautifully served by **Tannis Reinhertz** and the Culinary and Hospitality Studies students.

Chandrakant began his lecture by briefly telling the story of his coming from India, working in an Oregon pulp mill, moving to San Francisco on January 19, 1979, and taking the #12 bus from the Tenderloin to City College where his counselor helped him to start class the next day. He said it was confusing for him to know the correct matriculation path to Berkeley but that a number of textbooks (which he still has) and instructors including Prof. **Reoult**, Prof. **Hoskins**, Prof. **Schneider**, Prof. **Jelinek**, and Prof. **Virginia McClam**, directed him on his way.

Chandrakant challenged the engineering students to think of themselves as glamorous Global Engineers, competing with the international best. He pointed out the

importance of knowledge of the fundamentals, and an intrinsic respect for teachers and a community college system which allows and encourages people to succeed who would not be given a second chance in any other nation in the world.

Then he got into the science of the HP “Cool Team,” which is trying to come up with better ways to deal with heating issues in corporate data centers and power-efficient computer networks. Using pictures and graphs, he pointed out that technology should be flexible, providing only the power needed for a task, but able to offer more in the event more energy is needed.

Chandrakant said his views on this scientific problem were shaped by his experience as a new immigrant in America, making do with limited resources and aspiring only for things he truly needed. He suggested that the students try to travel and observe the manufacturing and development that is, unfortunately, now occurring in India, China and Mexico. Dr. **Kathleen Sullivan Alioto** reminded the students that if they were Osher Fellows, they were eligible to win \$5,000 summer study internships abroad.

After the lecture, Chandrakant spent time talking with and advising students. The Birnbaum Prize, named for a former director of HP Labs, is awarded annually to a member of HP Labs for contributions to HP or HP Labs that demonstrate extraordinary vision, perseverance, innovation and creativity. It characterizes Chandrakant.

Science and Math Dean **Wing Tsao**, Foundation Dean Alioto, Engineering and Technology Professor **Keith Mueller**, and Auxiliary President **Debra Dooley** were thrilled to see the impact that City College had had on Chandrakant and hope to get him back. Patel has already invited the Engineering students to come as a class to visit him at HP.

### Catherine Lacayo starts at Stanford

**Catherine Lacayo**, Ph.D., a postdoctoral fellow at Stanford University, discussed her research on cell migration with 40 CCSF students and faculty on February 27 during the Chemistry 85 seminar. After emigrating from Panama, Lacayo took both noncredit and credit courses at City College from 1994 to 1997. While at CCSF she participated in summer research sponsored by the National Institutes of Health Bridges Scholars Program. She earned her Bachelors degree from UC Berkeley, and in 2006 she completed her Ph.D. in biochemistry at Stanford. The Bridges Program is directed by **Ronald Drucker** of the CCSF Chemistry Dept. and **Steve Weinstein** of the SF State Biology Dept. **Megume Fuse** of the SFSU Biology Dept. is a guest lecturer for Chemistry 85. The Latina/o Services Center, directed by Dr. **Rose Marie Roberson**, co-sponsored the talk and the reception afterward. Dr. Lacayo is the second Bridges participant to complete a Ph.D.; two others are finishing their Ph.D.'s, and a fifth will start a Ph.D. program in the fall. Other participants have earned Masters degrees or have finished programs in medicine, dentistry and pharmacy.

# Parking and Transportation Subcommittee

## Minutes of December 12, 2006

*Editor's Note: On March 3, 2007 the Office of Shared Governance received the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee's Minutes from December 12, 2006.*

1. Acceptance of the minutes from 11/14/06

2. Lani Battiste has been added to replace Skip Fotch's administrator position on the committee. Julia Waters is in process of being added as a student representative to the committee.

### 3. Old Business

a) Carl Koehler will contact Sam Fielding at MTA regarding a passenger loading zone and "Keep Clear" on Phelan Avenue near the entry to Cloud Circle

b) Carl Koehler found a vendor for the "your speed is" radar equipment for Cloud Circle and the flashing lights to add to the stop sign in front of Phelan and is moving forward with Purchasing Dept.

c) Carl Koehler is in communication with Peter Goldstein regarding the hiring of 4 Crossing Guards. This process must go through the vacancy review committee. If approved the entire process could take 6 to 8 months.

d) Muriel Parenteau discussed the importance of a consistent enforcement of Blue Zone parking spaces across the District.

e) Currently Mission campus parking is no longer controlled by a motorized gate. Muriel Parenteau noted that in the CCSF Mission parking garage, motorists are "creating" unique parking spaces as well as parking in the hatch marks of Blue Zones. Lani Battiste and Carl Koehler will investigate options such as restriping the lot and fixing the gate. The landlord needs to be contacted.

f) Muriel Parenteau suggested to Jim Keenan to look at the spaces in lot C behind the library and in one area see if two spaces can be converted to 3 spaces.

g) Lani Battiste reported that Jim

Blomquist of Facilities Planning is working on repaving the ADA path of travel through lot H to the foot bridge to the BART station

h) Muriel Parenteau and Lani Battiste reported on the Haight Ashbury Neighborhood meeting on 11/30/06. Several neighborhood residents were upset about the CCSF move to DeAvila, citing several things including the influx of cars taking parking away, and their disbelief that faculty and students will use a shuttle. The chancellor assured folks that a shuttle would be in place by Spring 07. An announcement was made that there would be a Public Hearing on the request for a 75 ft white zone currently a Bus Zone to be converted to a passenger loading zone with time restrictions – on Dec. 8, 2006 – 10 A.M.

i) Muriel Parenteau and Lani Battiste went to the Public Hearing on Dec. 8, 2006 and the request was granted.

j) Muriel Parenteau reported that at the next Board meeting Dec. 14, 2006 the Board was to vote on funding the services of a shuttle company to drive CCSF faculty, staff and students from JAD to DeAvila and a 3rd location during the upgrade of JAD.

k) Lani Battiste reported that she contacted Supervisor Sean Elsbernd's office regarding the discussion of installing a signal light on Phelan at the bookstore. The request was routed through the Mayor's Office on Disability. Lani Battiste will follow-up.

### 4. New Business

a) SB reported that parking decals sold on line is selling briskly and going well.

b) SY reported on the 12/4 meeting with MUNI/MTA regarding a possible young adult (ages 18-24) discounted Fast Pass. MTA concern is that they will lose revenue. SF Supervisors are continuing the discussion with MTA in lowering the price. Jorge Bell has also agreed to send

out a survey to determine how many students use Fast Passes.

c) Craig Persiko reported that bicycle coalition meeting of 12/5/06 was well attended. The discussion at that meeting of any suggestions for alternate bike routes to the campus other than Phelan yielded no responses. Carl Koehler suggested a path through the campus rather than on Phelan. There is currently an injunction placed on the MTA plan to add bike lanes on Phelan

d) Carl Koehler reported that the CCSF-PD now has another vehicle (unmarked). CCSFPD currently has three designated parking spots. He suggests that another spot in South Science Lot be dedicated for Police vehicles only. The committee voted and agreed to the request. Carl Koehler will check with Peter Goldstein before putting up a sign. Lani Battiste adds that the current CCSFPD parking spots create a possible blockage of the ADA path of travel. Carl Koehler and Lani Battiste will work together to rectify the situation.

e) Muriel Parenteau noted that there is no "NO PARKING ANYTIME" sign on the West external wall of the SU building facing Ram Plaza. Cars often park there on Ram Plaza. There is flammable material in that storage closet. Committee voted and agreed that the NO PARKING ANYTIME should be reposted on that wall of the SU building. There will be allowances for loading and unloading only and then the vehicle must move.

f) Lani Battiste noted that several cars without CCSF stickers are in Lot A before 5:00 PM. Carl Koehler reported that currently CCSFPD has had to relocate officers to DeAvila so there are fewer officers to monitor the lots. Carl Koehler will look into reallocation of forces to monitor lots.

City Car Share has installed pods at Ocean & Gough. One is planned for JAD

A parking space behind Batmale (Lot K) near 300 Bungalows has been repainted to clarify a possible confusion of what is and is not a parking space.

Passenger loading white zone at John Adams (Ashbury and Grove) now has posted time restrictions

Passenger loading white zone at De Avila (1250 Waller and Masonic) has been approved and the signs showing time restrictions will be installed in about 2-3 weeks by MTA.

meetings as amended. Fred Chavaria discussed the Bipartite Committee meeting which he felt had improved both in ambience and in action. He noted that future Bipartite decisions may change to reflect the recommendations from the G.E. Graduation Requirements goal group.

## IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Teti distributed a written report listing various issues, events, and announcements.

1. The entire language of the Education Code section addressing the prohibitions to electronic recording in classrooms will be included in the 2007-08 Catalog. Council asked that this be announced to all faculty.

2. In response to an unofficial query from the Academic Policies Committee, Council expressed interest in the Catalog explicitly stating where a student may use a D to satisfy a G.E. requirement.

3. The Board has asked that we amend the Administrator Hiring Procedures Agreement so that the search committee for the new Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs may send between two and five top candidates to the Chancellor. (Dr. Day asked only for a one-time exception.) In previous practice, the Search Committee has interpreted the Agreement to mean that more than three can be sent forward if the candidates are statistically tied. We expect that this interpretation will satisfy the present Search Committee, Chancellor Day, and the Board.

4. Council expressed much concern that this request for changes came in mid-process, and was phrased with the perception that deliberation in shared governance is obstructive. The officers reminded Council about our Resolution 2006.11.08.03 regarding the Administrator Hiring Procedures Agreement, in which we reaffirmed that

further emendations be brought forward as proposed modifications to the Agreement, not as singular exceptions.

B. 1st Vice President Fred Chavaria attended the last Board of Trustees' meeting. He noted that the alignments and interactions amongst the Trustees have shifted in such a way as to evoke interest. He suggested that Council members attend a meeting if possible for their own edification.

## V. Committee Appointments

Chavaria noted that the Committee and Subcommittee vacancies have been well-advertised, and that faculty have begun responding. Francine Podenski explained the history, duties and responsibilities of the Web Advisory Subcommittee.

### Resolution 2007.02.28.01: Shared Governance Committee Appointments

Resolved, that the Academic Senate Executive Council approve the shared governance committee appointments, as recommended by the Committee on Committees.

Moved: Fred Chavaria; seconded: Melinda Weil; motion carried.

## VI. New Business

A. Update: SB361 and Noncredit Apportionment

Associate Vice Chancellor Leslie Smith presented Power Point slides. She showed the 2006 – 07 apportionment of monies: \$4367 per credit FTES, \$2626 per non-credit FTES, but enhanced for Career Development and College Preparation to \$3092 per noncredit FTES. She discussed the history of SB361, the method of apportionment, and the methods of defining and the definitions of career development and college preparation courses. Smith outlined a proposal and strategy to clean up SB361. She explained accountability establishment and reporting. She presented data regarding the

importance and efficacy of noncredit with respect to student success in earning degrees and transferring.

### B. Presentation: New Sexual Assault Policy and Procedure

Lisa Romano and Chief of Police Carl Koehler explained that, whereas the College has a sexual harassment policy, it is now legally required to have a sexual assault policy. They presented a draft policy. Podenski suggested that a summary brochure be created, preferably by students; she also suggested that information be presented about how faculty and staff should respond to a student who asks for help with a sexual assault incident. Further comments on the document should be directed to Sunny Clark.

### C. Approval: Executive Council Election Materials

Former Senate President and Election Commissioner David Yee presented the Schedule for the 2007 Elections, including the extension dates. The status of present Council Members was given. Council adopted the Election Schedule.

D. Approval: Draft Policy Proposal for Electronic Communication and Information Technology

Information Technology Policies Committee Chair David Yee explained the document, which includes several italicized, struck out, and underlined changes. He especially noted issues regarding District utilization of aggregate faculty computer usage data for research and reporting. Both a struck-out restrictive sentence and a new, less restrictive sentence were discussed. Council members expressed concern about the likelihood of any research-quality data being produced within the network, and for the fuzziness of the words "professional standards."

### Resolution 2007.02.28.02: Draft Policy Proposal for Electronic Communication and Information Technology

**Resolved**, that the Academic Senate Executive Council support the original language of the Draft Policy Proposal for Electronic Communication and Information Technology stating, "However, the District will not utilize the above mentioned information to make aggregate conclusions about faculty computing usage."

Moved: Rosemary Brinson; seconded: Joao Barretto; motion carried.

### VII. Committee Reports

David Lisker presented a Staff Development report. He especially noted that CCSF has a one-time AB1725 fund of \$156,000 available for faculty travel. In addition, each department may receive \$5000 to use for special programs and conference travel; applications are available from Human Resources.

### VIII. Adjournment
