German, U.S. diplomats to speak here

Karsten Voigt, Coordinator of German-North American Cooperation at the German Foreign Office, will speak at City College of San Francisco **Tuesday, April 10** at 7 P.M. in the Diego Rivera Theatre as part of the CCSF series of "compelling conversations" with individuals making a difference in our world. Voigt will appear in conversation with **Stephan Johnson**, Ph.D., a member of the City College political science faculty.

Voigt's topic will be "Germany, Europe and the United States: Commonalities and Differences," but his experience, service and expertise is so wide-ranging that the possibilities for this conversation are endless. A question and answer period will follow the initial presentation.

The Consul General of the Federal Republic of Germany for San Francisco, **Rolf Schütte**, has graciously facilitated Voigt's presentation at City College. Other co-sponsors include the Concert and Lecture Series, the Foreign Language Department and the Social Sciences Department.

Leslie McVee, former American Consul General in Marseille, France, will speak at CCSF on **Tuesday, April 24** at 11:10 A.M. in Arts 315 about his career in diplomacy. The presentation will be in French. McVee is currently diplomat in residence at UC Berkeley. The presentation is organized by the CCSF French Club.

Both programs are free and the public is invited.

Minutes of the February 4, 2007 Meeting

The meeting was called to order at 2:10 P.M.

The minutes of the December 2006 meeting, were approved as amended.

Old Business:

1. Revision of Ed Tech Plan

Janet Willett passed out a **Progress Report of Strategic Objective 7.1: Strengthen and expand educational technology programs** (the pink sheet).

Discussion of the progress report led to the following suggestions:

- That "Activity B" be renamed "Two-way Interactive Distance Learning between Campuses" in order to be able to include new and currently unknown technologies.
- That "Activity C" be continued in the new strategic plan (see below).
- TLTR will ask Francine Podenski to give an update on "Activity E – EATV evaluation of staff, programming and technology".
- Janet Willett will draft a paragraph for the new strategic plan on the accomplishments of the old strategic plan, based on the list of completed items on the "pink sheet".

Janet Willett also passed out a list of "Potential Items for Discussion and Inclusion" for the Revision of the Ed Tech Plan. It was decided that ETO staff will take a look at the items and categorize them using the 3 main goals of the strategic plan. The 3 goals were considered seen to be general enough and inclusive enough to continue to be used for the next Strategic Plan. The 3 goals are:

- **Goal 1:** Physical infrastructure and technical support for academic use of technology.
- **Goal 2:** Increase and promote opportunities for faculty and students to use education technology.
- **Goal 3:** Maintain and improve a system for continued planning for, evaluation of, and ongoing funding for education technology.

Discussion of the "Potential Items for Discussion and Inclusion" (the white sheet) included:

- "Smart Classrooms" – Rita Jones volunteered to bring a list of "Smart classroom" components distributed by a library professional organization to help define what a "Smart Classroom" means today.
- Student Portals: a study group was formed to investigate various options for a CCSF portal. They will study standards, purposes of portals, and how it will integrate with existing systems (e.g. Banner). Consensus was that integration was extremely important in choosing a portal for the college. Tom Boegel, Christine Beard, John Kennedy, and Peter Wood comprise the Portal Study Group.
- It was decided to maintain Activity 7.1 C in the new strategic plan and to add "Maintain and improve existing facilities for Faculty/Staff training".
- Discussion of whether or not "Activity J" was still a goal. (Distance education for the GED). It was noted that two new ESL courses were being developed and that the Transitional Studies Dept. is in dis-

cussion concerning future online courses. Christine Beard will report at the next meeting on any plans Transitional Studies has for online courses.

Christine Beard noted that often students are frustrated with the slowness of faculty to adopt new technologies. Podcasts were mentioned in particular. CCSF has an agreement with iTunes University, but there is no staff to help people create the podcasts. Rita Jones suggested that TLTR include in the strategic plan enough money in order to facilitate delivering information and instruction in formats students want. It was also suggested that the effectiveness of new technologies be studied when considering adopting them.

It was decided that the "Potential Items for Discussion and Inclusion" on the "white sheet" be organized using the goals from original master plan as a rubric. Mamie How suggested that ETO staff could work on this for the next meeting so that the larger group would have a clear starting point.

John Kennedy asked whether or not the College had plans to adopt Vista (Microsoft's new operating system). It was reported that there is a subcommittee in ITS studying the issue.

New Business:

1. James Lim from the Library gave a report on new tools used by the library. He demonstrated the new reference online chat utility. Using "Meebo" (www.meebo.com), students using any of the four most popular chat clients can communicate with a librarian to ask questions. "Meebo" provides single sign-in for all instant messaging accounts.

Also new is the CCSF Library Blog, where patrons can suggest improvements to and ask questions about Library services. The library has made eBooks available online to the CCSF community inside of the college intranet. Students may also create a user account which will allow them

access from home computers. One user at a time may access an eBook, as is the case with a regular book. However, the eBook allows all campuses to share the same item without having to transport it between many CCSF locations. James Lim agreed to present these new innovations to faculty and staff through the TLC. (His presentation has since been scheduled for April 24, 12-1. The tentative location is Batmale 313.)

2. WebCT Report: Janet Willett and Mamie How announced that the migration to the new version, "Blackboard CE 6" (Blackboard bought WebCT last year) would begin this spring with all faculty migrating by Spring, 2008. The new version requires two servers, an oracle database is resides on one server, the application on the other server. All courses are currently being offered on the old system. New developers are being trained on CE6. When the servers are ready, faculty will begin training.

The TMI has identified a pilot group that will test the server and application beginning as early as March, 2007. Training (3 weeks online, one day face-to-face) will be provided by a professional trainer, JJ Johnson, who has done many WebCT trainings for @ONE.

In April/May, training will open up for all online faculty, with subsequent trainings held in June and in Sept. "Techenhanced" users of WebCT/Blackboard may participate in the trainings after the onliners have been served. Approximately 125 individuals will need to migrate courses to the new version. In September, 2007, both servers will be running and faculty may choose which platform they wish to use. By spring, 2008, all faculty will be using CE 6.

Next meeting: It was suggested that the TLTR continue working on the new master plan at the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:03 P.M.

Facilities Review Committee

February 2, 2007 — Revised Minutes

Editor's Note: On March 21, 2007 the Facilities Review Committee approved the February 2, 2007 minutes.

1. Balboa Reservoir Development Plans > 2010

David Liggett presented a rendering of the proposed development of the West Campus. The Board of Trustees approved the location of Performing Arts at their January 25, 2007 meeting. It will be on the mid-north end of the reservoir. The foundation for the Performing Arts complex will be built up from the bottom of the reservoir with millions of cubic feet of dirt. Timothy Pflueger's circular drive in front of the Science Building will be continued across Phelan to create a looped entrance for the complex.

South of the Performing Arts complex will be the three-story Joint Use building, a project that is being developed with faculty from San Francisco State University. The building will house programs that have a high transfer rate to SFSU such as Teacher Prep and Child Development.

The present Bookstore Annex will be replaced with a larger, comprehensive Bookstore on the first floor and office space on the second floor, possibly leased to the unions, 790 and 2121, and a community room which could also be rented to generate revenue.

All development on the West Campus will be linked to a mechanical plant that will supply geothermal heat and air conditioning to the buildings.

Parking will shift as needed to accommodate the construction of the West Campus. When the EIR for the Balboa Park Station Plan is published in the next month or so it is critical that comments regarding the importance of the Lee Street extension into the west side of the reservoir be forwarded to the City planners. The Lee Street entrance will reduce traffic congestion on Phelan during construction, and will provide access to student parking.

When the West Campus is fully developed, 975 parking spaces in the reservoir will be lost; however, over the long term of development for this campus, including the construction of a parking garage, the number of parking spaces available will be nearly equal to the number available today.

When the Health & Wellness Center opens, de-construction of the gyms can begin, to be replaced, for the time being, with surface parking. The B600 bungalows will need to be moved; location TBD.

The Kragen site will be developed as a mixed use project, commercial and residential. There are no plans to develop the Muni Loop.

It was **m**sp by consensus to approve the location of the Performing Arts Complex as approved by the Board of Trustees.

2. Batmale Hall Loading Dock and Fiber Infrastructure

Glen Van Lehn, ITS, presented a diagram of the location of manholes providing access to fiber conduit on the Ocean Campus. He specifically emphasized the critical portion of the infrastructure located under the Loading Dock behind Batmale Hall. It is important that the proposed replacement of the Playing Field behind Batmale does not encroach on that area. Jim Blomquist drew a line across the diagram of the loading dock area parallel to the building and east of the driveway saying, "We will not go west of this line – we will protect the conduits." This project might begin in late fall 2007; it could also be postponed to provide temporary parking during construction in the reservoir.

The space opened by the de-construction of the 300 bungalows will be used as a staging area for the Child Care/Development Center. The last row of the B300 buildings will be torn down during the summer.

3. Sustainability Report

It was **m**sp by consensus to create a new FRC subcommittee on sustainability; it will have open membership.

A.S. representative Virginie Corominas summarized the goals of the new subcommittee: to develop and implement policies, programs and projects aimed at improving the environment. It will be important to develop measurable goals, such as # of gallons of water used in year one versus # of gallons of water used in year two.

4. Subcommittee Reports

Works of Art—Julia Bergman

a. Student Union Mural — During Winter Break, Julia Bergman and A.S. rep Dave Whitaker met with Susan Cervantes of Precita Eyes to evaluate the condition of the mural. Susan cleaned up the graffiti on the portrait of Dolores Huerta on the spot. She has submitted a \$1,000 proposal to clean and touch up the mural; this project will be jointly funded by the A.S. & W/A.

b. Batmale Hall Plaza — Julia has been in contact with artist Jacques Overhoff regarding the restoration of the plaza. The S.F. Art Commission will be contacted for referrals to appropriate conservators who can work with concrete. Some of the restoration work can be performed by CCSF Buildings and Grounds staff. Overhoff will be in S.F. in March to work on a new project; it is hoped that this can be a W/A project this spring.

c. *Pacifica* — Sal De Guarda will cast, on site, a 5-7' replica of Ralph Stackpole's original 80' statue from the GGIE. The work will be done towards the end of this semester in Frida's garden. W/A funds will be used to install and secure the statue.

d. Whales — The tarp-covered whales are sitting on the north side of the Ocean

Parking and Transportation Subcommittee

Minutes of February 13, 2007 — 2:30 – 4 P.M., R-518

Editor's Note: On March 13, 2007, the Parking and Transportation Subcommittee approved the minutes from February 13, 2007.

1. Acceptance of the minutes from 12/12/06

2. Old Business

a) MTA bike lane update: Carl Koehler reported that MTA will be returning to a future FRC meeting with a new plan for modifying Phelan Ave to incorporate bike lanes. The original plan was rejected by both Parking and Transportation and Facilities Review Committees.

b) Carl Koehler reported that "What is your speed" signs cost \$4,000 each, so they're too expensive to install on Cloud Circle.

c) Jim Keenan reported Concrete Pad to be poured tomorrow for flashing stop sign on Cloud Circle, should be completed within 2 weeks.

d) Carl Koehler reported that Peter Goldstein has not indicated when we'll move forward on hiring crossing guards for Phelan Ave

e) Possible re-stripe of the Mission Campus Garage? With no complaints on file – the issue was dropped for now.

f) Jim Keenan reported that unmarked parking area behind library next to loading dock isn't big enough to stripe for 3 spots, even though 3 cars can often fit there. So no striping is to be done. (Situation will change when construction is completed.)

g) Carl Koehler reported that new parking space for CCSFPD vehicle in South Science will be marked soon

h) Julia Waters was not present to report on idea for "Thank you for not driving" signs. It is tabled until the March meeting.

i) City Car Share cars have been very popular at 33 Gough St., and moderately

popular at Ocean campus (about 31 reservations/month). No news on when car will be available at John Adams campus.

j) Pavement to BART overpass is done.

3. New Business

a) Haight /Ashbury Neighborhood meeting in February 2007. Only 2 persons from the neighborhood present. Only comment was that some neighbors had observed low shuttle ridership at off-peak times.

b) White Zone at De Avila (Waller and Masonic); discussion of possible movement of white zone.

c) Mid-block access ramp at De Avila enforcement will continue.

d) Shuttle bus between De Avila and John Adams is busy at peak times (90 people one Monday), but slow at others. The district is still publicizing the shuttle's presence. The District plans to change to a smaller shuttle.

e) Muriel Parenteau reported being interviewed for article in new issue of *The Guardsman* about bike racks.

f) CCSF student expressed his frustration/confusion over the parking regulations in the first week of the semester that resulted in his receiving a citation. Carl Koehler clarified that only permit enforcement is suspended that first week, as CCSFPD had to ensure traffic /fire lanes were not blocked.

g) Carl Koehler explained the College's policy of free student parking for the first week of the semester – as requested by the Chancellor's Office. Committee discussed the advantages and disadvantages of this policy, including its contribution to parking problems and the policy's tendency to encourage students to drive.

h) "No parking" sign to go up at Ram Plaza next to student union where students occasionally park (next to barbecue door).

i) There has been a request for Disabled Person parking stalls at the Castro/Valencia campus. The Castro/Valencia campus has student/staff parking on the playground, so there is no striping, and no designated disabled person parking. Muriel Parenteau suggested CCSF count the number of total parking spaces and designate an appropriate number of blue zones, via cones and mobile signs.

Campus. Julia is working with the S.F. Art Commission to secure a graduate student intern who can work on developing the website to raise money for this project. Several people have expressed their desire to see the piece restored in its original form as a fountain. A windy location in front of the Science Building might not be ideal for the piece so alternative locations need to be considered, possibly a site near the new Student Health Center, or near the future Child Care/Development Center.

e. *Jungle Scene* — this ceramic mural will be installed in the new Child Care/Development Center

f. *Olmec Head* — a structural engineer has provided pro bono services to design the infrastructure needed to permanently stabilize the head. W/A funds will be used for this project.

g. *Aztec calendar* — the W/A declined to make a recommendation about the material to be used for this work, planned for the new Mission Campus.

h. *Sargent Johnson* — these bas reliefs, above the entrances to the gyms, need to be preserved. Discussion about how they might be "cut off" the wall without shattering or cracking them led to a recom-
