City College constituencies meet to discuss emergency preparedness

Editor's Note: Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., Chancellor, emailed the following memo to the College Community on April 20, 2007.

As planned, over 25 representatives of the leadership of Shared Governance, the Collective Bargaining units, and the administration met in my conference room to discuss the issue of City College's level of preparedness to deal with situations like the Virginia Tech Tragedy from both a prevention and response perspective. As unusual as it might be for us to even think that something like that could happen at City College, we need to be ready and able to take the necessary steps to insure the safety of our students, faculty, and staff (Classified and Administrators).

Accordingly, the meeting did focus on a number of issues. There was unanimity in our assessment that, despite our best efforts to plan ahead for emergencies, we are vulnerable. For example, in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, the college moved quickly to develop an Emergency Response Action Plan (ERAP) that focused on "natural" disasters. First, the effort that went into development of the "draft" (which is under review by the Committee on Public Safety) has to be reignited; and, most importantly, needs to be expanded to reflect the additional areas of concern related to disasters of this sort. A special team of individuals led by Chief **Carl Koehler** will take responsibility for reviewing and developing a "new draft" Action Plan.

Additionally, the following areas and priority considerations were discussed and

highlighted as strategies and needs that must be pursued. (Please note that some of these issues will ultimately be "folded into" the above-referenced action plan):

- 1) The need to explore and develop a Community Emergency Alert System which takes full advantage of our existing technology tools (e.g., email and voice mail) but also carefully researches emerging and new technology that could help us achieve this objective at the highest levels. This could include building on our existing networks and computer systems to allow for emergency/instant phone mail/text messaging capability; the use of wireless technology associated with Building-based public address systems similar to the Rosenberg Library and Downtown Campus; telephones in classrooms; selective use of video security cameras; request cell phone numbers on a voluntary basis from all students, faculty and staff who would want immediate updates related to college/campus emergencies, etc.
- 2) The need to explore fully the above but not at the expense of identifying more basic strategies of communications such as identifying Building Managers and Floor Managers for each facility throughout the District and establishing an appropriate line of responsibility and protocols for implementation and follow-up;
- 3) Review the status of all existing and new facilities to insure that the operations of doors, windows, exits, etc., are operational;

Emergency responders handle incident with aplomb

Editor's note: Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., Chancellor, sent this email April 24, 2007 to give details of an incident on the Ocean Campus.

This morning at approximately 9:01 A.M., a CCSF student dressed in camo gear went into a Science Hall classroom and made threatening comments. He was arrested at 9:11 A.M. by the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) and remains in their custody. The SFPD will be conducting the investigation and we will be working closely with them. Authorities are not releasing the student's name at this time. A weapon was not found on the student. I promise to keep you posted as more information is confirmed. I have been working with members of the press to ensure that the public has up-to-date information as well. I also appreciate your patience as I am sure you have been hearing various reports in the media and from colleagues at the College.

I want to applaud the quick work of the staff, faculty and administrators who made sure that the situation was handled expedi-

tiously and with the safety of all in mind. In particular, I want to commend the work of the College's Public Safety Office, under the leadership of Chief Carl Koehler, the incredibly quick response of the SFPD and the behavior of their officers, and finally our own faculty and staff in the Science Building who took on a "how can we help" attitude and assisted in the lockdown and kept students and staff members calm. Given the tragedy of the Virginia Tech situation and our on-campus discussions about our readiness and preparedness for these types of emergencies, we were certainly ready for what unfolded this morning. However, we can never take for granted that this "can't happen here" because it did. We now need to insure that we do move forward, follow-up, and make sure that we put the necessary safeguards and precautionary measures in place. It is best to plan for something like this happening again and we need to be ready and get through the situation as well as we did (April 24).

4) Discuss with student leadership (and students in general) their ideas for enhanced college security;

5) Address the need to enhance the capacity of all of our faculty, staff and administrators to assess student behavior and to understand appropriate parameters for intervention (legal, health/medical,) and the process for referral; and;

6) Expand our commitment to In-Service Training on issues related to How to Handle Disruptive/Troubled Students: Reporting and Referral Procedures; the Reality associated with the Legal parameters within which we operate.

These are just some of the ideas that were reviewed. An additional item that was discussed is the need to create a simple one-page briefing document for faculty and staff on Handling Disruptive/Troubled Students: What to Do; Who to Call and When; and What Resources are Available. Dr. **Mark Robinson** working in concert with **Rod Santos**, **Sunny Clark** and **Lindy McKnight** will develop a draft for review by others and dissemination

district-wide. This is a start*. We will be following-up on items 1-6. If you have any additional ideas or concerns about what we may have missed please contact

my office directly. Thank you and I will do my best to keep you informed of any and all related developments.

MIP is a professional development program at CCSF that provides faculty with resources, training and incentives to transform their practice so that it is increasingly informed by multicultural pedagogy. The project focuses on helping faculty infuse multicultural content and perspectives into their practice. Furthermore, MIP supports the expansion of strategies that seek to meet the needs of CCSF's diverse student population and increase equity throughout the College.

Four cohorts—a total of over 100 faculty— have already passed through MIP, many of whom are still actively involved. Past participants from Business, Chemistry, Continuing Student Counseling, English, English as a Second Language, Graphic

NY Times article details CCSF's educational excellence

City College of San Francisco was the only California community college mentioned in a *New York Times* story titled "For Achievers, A New Destination: Two Year Colleges You May Want To Attend And Leave," written by **Beth Frerking**. Frerking's story was about a trend among well-prepared undergraduates to get their initial courses at a community college before transferring to a four-year institution. The story was illustrated with photographs, including a cover shot of a student in CCSF's Biotechnology Program. Frerking surveyed numerous colleges for this story. The profile of City College of San Francisco was initiated with a telephone survey to the Office of Marketing and Public Information. The reporter next interviewed Chancellor **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, as well as Dr. **Robert A. Gabriner**, Vice Chancellor, Institutional Advancement. The article talks about CCSF's 8,651 full time students; and 34,604 part-time students per semester. According to the article, transfer favorites are San Francisco State University and the University of California at Berkeley and Davis.

A complete profile follows.

"Urban community colleges typically have more part-time than full-time students, and City College has a lot of them. Since the convenience factor is critical, eight satellite campuses are scattered throughout the city, one for English language instruction alone. The college must also satisfy a daunting range of interests, from fashion to astronomy to biotechnology. The national headquarters for Bio-Link, a program devoted to improving biotechnology education, is situated on the main campus.

"City College reflects its hometown both in racial composition (40 percent Asian) and culture (programs include Philippine studies; gay, lesbian and bisexual studies; and culinary and hospitality studies). The Institute of International Education consistently ranks City College among the top 10 community colleges in sending students to study abroad. Students can spend next fall and spring studying language and art history in Paris, Florence or Madrid. Foreign study credits are either all or partly transferable to California's two state systems.

"The rock-bottom line: \$20 a credit hour, or \$600 for two semesters. And there's an impressive rate of return: 75 percent of full-time students return for the second year.

"AND Courses are built around Diego Rivera's "Pan-American Unity" at the Diego Rivera Theatre on campus. The mural was commissioned for a 1939 international exposition and subsequently given to the college. The public can view the painting while student docents discuss its history and meaning."

1. The State Academic Senate (the ASCCC) is recommending several Title 5 changes to the Board of Governors. Several of these give control of key educational decisions to the CCC System. The ASCCC may support mandated statewide common assessment of matriculants and creating separate basic skills departments.

2. Faculty can send Susan Lopez comments on the 2005 - 06 College Performance Indicators report.

3. The officers continue to monitor composition of administrator search committees.

4. The Shared Governance Office and personnel are being moved to Conlan Hall.

Intermediate Algebra prerequisite. Of a list of 64 community colleges, none of them require such a prerequisite. Our guests presented detailed documentation explaining the importance of resisting this requirement. Council considered a resolution directed at the ASCCC for affirming student access to educational opportunities by supporting the autonomy of the CCCs.

Resolution 2007.03.28.03: Resolution Affirming Support for Student Access to Educational Opportunities, for Autonomy of the CCCs and of the CC Colleges Themselves

The CCSF Academic Senate authorizes President Teti to bring the following resolution, in a form to be finalized in process, to the Academic Senate for the California Community Colleges:

Whereas, the State of California has established three segments of public postsecondary education—the University of California, the California State University, and the California Community Colleges (CCCs)—with the goal of providing educational opportunity and success to the broadest possible range of Californians, especially those historically and currently underrepresented in high school graduation rates and in enrollment at California higher educational institutions, and

Whereas, the State of California has clearly stated goals that educational equity is achieved not only through a diverse and representative student body and faculty, but also by affording all persons, regardless of race, gender, age, disability, or economic circumstances an opportunity to fully develop their potential, and

Whereas, each segment of California public post-secondary education has its own distinct mission and responsibility and the CCCs (per Ed Code §76000) must admit any California resident with a high school diploma or the equivalent or over the age of 18 who is capable of profiting from instruction, and

Whereas, the CCC Board of Governors and the local Boards of Trustees rely primarily on academic senate recommendations in all CCC curricular matters, therefore be it

Resolved, that the Academic Senate of California Community Colleges pursue and continue to support policies that continue to preserve the autonomy of the California Community College system and of the colleges themselves (per Ed Code §70901(a) and §70902(b)) to develop their own curriculum in order to provide students with equal access to educational opportunity, the broadest educational experience, and the services necessary to optimize their chances for success, and further be it

Resolved that the Academic Senate of the California community colleges pursue and continue to support policies that provide educational opportunities to all Californians with the fewest impediments, including unnecessary pre- or co-requisites, assessments, or placements that will subject the student to undue delay in attaining his or her educational goal.
