# Board of Trustees actions at April 26 meeting told

The Board of Trustees took the following actions at its April 26, 2007 meeting. Items are listed in the order in which they were discussed.

- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B4** — Authorization to Award a Contract for Certified Inspection Services to MRK Consulting & Inspection for the John Adams Campus Modernization and Seismic Upgrade Project for a Total Cost Not to Exceed \$272,600.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B6** — Authorization to Modify a Contract for Wellness Center Certified Inspection Services to Eagle Enterprises at an Additional Cost of \$211,000 for a Total Contract Amount Not to Exceed \$647,965. The extension was due to weather and other unforeseen field conditions extending the project beyond the original projected schedule.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B8** — Authorization to Modify Existing Contracts/ Grants:
  - A) Extend term of homeland security training contract with San Francisco International Airport to June 30, 2007 at no change in the original amount of \$150,000;
  - B) Extend term of specialized services contract with Safety and Security Instruction (SSI) for providing homeland security training to the San Francisco International Airport to June 30, 2007 at no change in the original amount of \$135,000;
  - C) [1] Adjustment to Wrap-Around Services Contract with Private Industry Council for the 2nd cycle of the Trade Adjustment Act (TAA) Garment Worker Training Program, with the term of the contract extended to January 30, 2008 at a reduction of \$62,756 for a new total not to exceed of \$685,871, and
  - C)[2] a New Contract for Wrap-Around Services provided to 50 laid off TAA-eligible Monster Cable Products, Inc., workers for the term April 1, 2007-November 30, 2008 at no increase from the original total not to exceed \$352,023;

- D) [1] Adjustment of sub-contractor contract with Chinese Progressive Association (CPA) for additional services for the 2nd cycle TAA training at an increase of \$574 to a new total not to exceed \$131,314, and
- D) [2] New sub-contractor contract for providing services for 50 laid off Monster Cable workers at no increase from the original total not to exceed \$62,590;
- E) [1] Adjustment of sub-contractor contract with San Francisco Labor Council STEP for additional services provided for the 2nd Cycle TAA training, decreasing the amount by \$2,426 to a new total not to exceed of \$187,051, and
- E [2] New subcontractor contract for providing services for 50 laid off Monster Cable workers for the term April 1, 2007 to November 30, 2008 at no increase in the original amount not to exceed \$95,259;
- F) Increase the amount of the contract awarded to the People’s Fuel Cooperative in support of a grant from the US Environmental Protection Agency by the amount of \$14,000 for a new total not to exceed \$84,000 for the period February 1, 2007 to December 31, 2008;
- G) Increase Contract with State Chancellor’s Office/Jewish Vocational Services (JVS) by \$122,000 and extend until June 30, 2008 for a new total not to exceed \$198,000 to provide case management services to students in the Registered Nursing Department.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B9** — Authorization to Contract with the California Department of Education for continuation of the California Early Childhood Mentor Program and to sub-contract with 95 California Community Colleges in the amount not to exceed \$3,011,059. City College of San Francisco is the fiscal agent.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B10** — Authorization to Contract with Various Interpreters for the Deaf with an aggregate cost not to exceed \$500,000. This resolution increases the total annual

authorization level to \$500,000, the limit for individual contractors to \$75,000, and the limit for contracting agencies to \$120,000. All expenditures for these services are to be paid out of the Disabled Students Program and Services restricted funds.

- **Approved Resolutions Nos. 070426-C1–N1** — **C1:** Procurement of Equipment, Supplies and Services in individual amounts of less than \$3,000; **C2:** Procurement of Supplies and Services in individual amounts of more than \$3,000; **G1–6:** Academic Employees (Faculty) Credit Program/Noncredit Program, District Funded; **H1–2:** Academic Employees (Faculty) Credit Program/Noncredit Program, Categorically Funded; **N1:** Academic Employees (Faculty) Community Services Classes.
- **Withdrew Resolution No. 070426-B7** — Authorization to Award Construction Manager at Risk Contract – Phases 1 and 2 for the Balboa Reservoir Development Projects.
- **Withdrew Resolution No. 070426-B11** — Authorization to Contract with Butler Enterprises at a Cost Not to Exceed \$70,000 for the period beginning May 1, 2007 and ending no later than April 30, 2008 for services related to the administration of the College’s SLBE and SBE programs.
- **Withdrew Resolution No. 070426-B12** — Authorization to Contract with Mason Tillman Associates, Ltd., at a Cost No to Exceed \$180,000 for the period beginning April 30, 2007 and ending no later than May 1, 2009 for services related to the administration of the College’s SLBE and SBE programs.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-S2** — Authorization for the District to Join the California Health Care Coalition in Association with the American Federation of Teachers Local 2121 (AFT) and to Expend \$5,000 Annually for the District’s Share of Membership Dues.

Letter to the Editor:

On Friday, April 6, the *Chronicle* published a front page attack on the integrity of Chancellor **Philip Day** and one of his administrators. Unfortunately, this was not an exemplary piece of investigative reporting. Its tone and shaky factual basis lead one to suspect that the source of the article was politically motivated with the simple purpose of wounding a hardworking public official.

- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B1** — Authorizing and Approving the Borrowing of Funds for Fiscal Year 2007–2008; the Issuance and Sale of a 2007–2008 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note Therefor, and Participation in the community College League of California Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes Program.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B2** — Authorizing an Independent Performance Audit for the District Bond Funds. The Board of Trustees will make the final selection of the winning bid after reviewing the received bids and the recommendations.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B3** — Authorization for two (2) Contract Modifications totaling \$207,832 for Special Services Contracts and Construction Contracts: **A)** Increase contract with Construction Management West, Inc., for New Mission Campus Scheduling Oversight by \$7,832 to a new contract amount of \$103,832 for additional services for monitoring construction schedule; **B)** Increase contract with Paul Roberts and Partners Architects for John Adams Campus Modernization Architectural and Engineering Services

by \$200,000 to a new contract amount of \$2,200,000 for additional services for DSA review due to reduction in scope caused by construction inflation and fees for construction administration services.

- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-B5** — Authorization to Award Special Services contract to Alex Garza and Carlos Valenzuela of Public Artists for an Aztec Calendar Ceramic Tile Mural for the New Mission Campus in an Amount Not to Exceed \$150,000.
- **Approved Resolution No. 070426-S1** — Approval of Noncredit Career Development and College Preparation Certificates to take advantage of enhanced funding under Senate Bill (SB 361), Community College Funding Formula Reform. Noncredit courses in the Career Development and College Preparation Program will be funded at a rate of \$3,092 per FTES –versus \$2,626 per FTES for noncredit courses not eligible for enhanced funding. The following certificate programs will be submitted to the State Chancellor's Office for enhanced funding: Fashion Department, Textile and Fabric Design; Business Department, Basic Business Skills/Medical Office, and Small Business.

# International Education Advisory Subcommittee

Minutes of Monday, March 19, 2007

*Editor's Note: On March 28, 2007 the International Education Subcommittee approved the March 28, 2007 minutes.*

The meeting was commenced at 2:10 by the chair, Leslie Pahl.

1. Ms. Pahl commented that various members had sent their regrets about not being able to attend. Program and library faculty and staff have orientations, hiring committee interviews, etc. The chair then noted that one of the most difficult aspects of being a committee chair is scheduling the meeting to optimize attendance. Ann Fontanella then asked what the status was of her reappointment to the committee. She had not to date heard any response. Ms. Pahl said she

would follow up on this question. *(Chair's note: Fred Chavaria will look into this matter.)*

2. Paul Wong of International Student Counseling gave a program update: according to his tally, total student enrollment is at 871 for Spring 2007 vs. 838 in Spring 2006. New student enrollment for Spring 07 stands at 179, up from 152 from Spring 06. Paul Wong commented that he had attended the Northern District Conference Roundtable for Community College, at which he learned that Diablo Valley College (DVC) has an enrollment of 880 international students. He noted that DVC does not base its acceptance of international students solely on the basis

of the TOEFL (computer/written), but also uses the IPL (Internet Proficiency in Language test from Boston University, which is also a TOEFL test. Additionally, DVC accepts its own placement test, thus expanding the opportunities for accepting international students. Paul's main question here was, could CCSF also use its own test, in addition to TOEFL, for placement? He also raised the question: Is the threshold of 150 on the CCSF test too high? Should it be lowered to 140? He asked to make a motion to take a vote on this, at which point Dean Lindy McKnight stated that it would be best to have more input, particularly from the others in the International Education Counseling Program. The best approach would be to revisit this at the May 7 meeting, with data in hand that would highlight how many students place into the credit program at the ESL 150 score. She would also like to know, of the new admissions, how many students place at ESL130, 140, 150. Dean McKnight also mentioned an interactive Excel spreadsheet put together by Steve Spurling in the Research Department that tracks successful completion of general education courses ("C or better") to the English or ESL level of the student the previous semester. We could possibly get some statistics about how well students placing in ESL 140 do.

It was agreed that Dean McKnight will:  
a) Contact Dean Low re data to correlate TOEFL scores with subsequent ESL placement and b) investigate the correlation between ESL 140 and 150 in terms of subsequent successful completion of general education classes by contacting Steve Spurling or using his database. *(Chair's note: any change in the ESL placement score would also affect the Conditional Admission policy that was recommended by IEAC last year and passed by the Academic Senate in May of 06. The*

Furthermore the committee discussed Section 15 and 16 which was revised by the ITPC per the request of the CAC. The committee accepted these changes with some amendments. The CIPR also made additional changes to the document. The committee unanimously approved these changes and forwarded its recommendation to the CAC for its March 29 meeting.

3. Jill Heffron, Study Abroad Coordinator, gave a program update. The first news was that the Summer 07 program in South Africa has unfortunately had to be postponed to summer 08, due to travel contractor issues. However, 3 programs scheduled for this summer are proceeding as planned: Guatemala, China and Mongolia, and Beijing. Ms. Heffron and her student assistants have been very involved in promoting the programs to the various language classes at the Ocean and James Lick campuses, among others. There will also be an article in an upcoming *Guardian*. Other upcoming programs will be Winter Semester 07-08 with the Diego Rivera Muralists (w/Dr. Greg Landau), and a Laos/Vietnam program with Dr. Chuong J. Chung..

#### **Addendum to Minutes of 3/19/07:**

Dean Low was unable to attend the meeting due to other commitments; however, she sent to me the following text, which she was going to present to the committee:

"Reorganization for International Education has not officially moved forward since the last meeting. At that time I reported that two positions, Immigration Specialist and Admissions Coordinator, had been approved by the Classified Allocation Committee. The positions have not been posted because we are still waiting for approval from Civil Service.

The plan to increase efficiency, to provide consistent information, and to promote a public friendly process and environment by bringing the International Student Admissions Office up into Cloud Hall is on hold. My information indicates that the project is not on an approved list of upcoming projects."

Dean Low went on to state that keeping the personnel and process in its current location would not lead to the above-stated goals. It is reported that potential students are bounced to as many as 5 phone numbers before someone successfully answers a student's query. She also reported the difficulty that staff members have to provide appropriate answers when files are not readily accessible.

# Teacher Prep Center Receives New Grant

The Teacher Prep Center at City College of San Francisco which was established in 1999 with funding and support from the California Community College Chancellor's Office and has been supported by both the California Post-Secondary Commission and the Wells

Fargo Foundation has just been awarded another grant from the Chancellor's Office for the recruitment, support and training of future teachers interested in teaching in Career and Technical Education fields.

Because the center provides recruitment and outreach activities, resources, curriculum development, counseling and advising for those interested in becoming teachers, CTE teacher development was a natural progression. CCSF was one of eight funded community colleges out of a field of 20 applicants. The \$350,000 grant is for one year, with a second year extension offer pending continued state funding.

Both the California State Dept. of Education and the CCCCO have received an increase in funding to support the expansion of career and technical training. Formerly known as "vocational education," CTE areas include at least 15 key technical industries with growth potential in California, ranging from biotechnology, to the automotive industry, to the construction trades, to agriculture, and to computer technologies. These industries will need a trained and educated workforce and there are shortages of qualified workers in a number of CTE fields currently. Both SFUSD and CCSF have received additional funds to increase CTE training capacity, purchase equipment and enhance vocational offerings locally.

A key and often overlooked component though, of providing additional training opportunities is the preparation and recruitment of the teachers providing the training. CTE teachers working for K-12 school districts or community colleges must possess teaching credentials or Master's Degrees in related subject areas, such as a Biology Credential in K-12 or a Biology MA degree in Community College for a Biotech Pathway teacher, however, in some industries the pathway to becoming a teacher is less clear cut.

Adult Education and ROP teachers often do not need full credentials and can provide training with a combination of education and experience. At CCSF for instance, in fields where a Master's Degree is not available or required, such as welding, automotive technologies or a large number of other fields, instructors in CTE pathway courses may, for example, be hired with an AA or a BA and five or two years of industry experience, respectively. To further complicate the issue, high school students often attend community college classes in CTE areas where advanced training and more sophisticated equipment may be available, so CTE pathway teachers often teach both high school and adult students in a variety of settings. This new grant therefore, expands the Teacher Preparation efforts of the Center from Early Childhood through Grade 12 to preparation for future teachers through grade 14 (or community college).

As a complement to the recently formed "Grow Your Own," effort at CCSF, where CCSF students are encouraged and supported to return to CCSF to teach, the CTE Teacher Prep grant will allow for targeted outreach to current and former CCSF students in the CTE Pathways and professions to encourage them to become teachers.

The broad range of teacher preparation requirements and pathways for both CTE and traditional areas mean that ongoing counseling and support are needed for anyone interested in teaching so that the range of qualifications and requirements needed are understood and translated. Because a fundamental goal of the center is to recruit students who reflect the diversity of the college by offering career support, coursework, direct classroom experiences, paid internships and work-study positions and transfer assistance for those exploring the teaching profession, the Teacher Prep Center provides these services to CCSF students and

## Rosenberg Library fall discussion series to explore 'Jewish Literature'

City College of San Francisco's Rosenberg Library will host a free five-part reading and discussion series called "Let's Talk About It: Jewish Literature – Identity and Imagination."

The series will explore Jewish literature and culture through scholar-led discussions of contemporary and classic books on a common theme, which for CCSF will be the theme of "Modern Marvels: Jewish Adventures in the Graphic Novel." The five graphic novels illustrating this theme reveal how Jewish artists experiment with words and pictures to tell stories of childhood, war, and desire, to conjure up lost worlds, both real and imaginary, and to contemplate history, myth, and the individual psyche.

CCSF is one of 95 libraries nationwide in 2007 that has been awarded a \$2500 grant from Nextbook and the American Library Association to offer this scholar-led, book discussion series. "We are delighted to have been chosen to host this unique series that will allow the college and broader community a chance to discuss a wide variety of themes in Jewish graphic novels with the help of a local scholar," said **Bonnie Gratch Lindauer**, project director. CCSF is partnering with San Francisco Public Library, Bureau of Jewish Education's Community Library and the San Francisco State University Jewish Studies program.

Dr. **Craig Kleinman**, English Department, is the project scholar, and he will introduce each book and facilitate discussion. The program begins next fall with these titles:
