Dr. Alice Murillo begins duties as new Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs

Dr. Alice Murillo, who began her duties August 1 as Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs, is most impressed with how “City College of San Francisco really understands the meaning of community.” She sees the strength of the College coming from “excellent working relations with faculty and classified” and that that sense of community extends to “nonprofit organizations outside the District.”

Dr. Murillo believes that the source of her leadership is her ability to “get everybody on board. I count on everything that’s here as a resource. I’m currently meeting with all of the Deans to get a full review of what they are doing and the direction they’re taking. I’m particularly interested in how services are offered and how programs are developed.

“I want to make sure that we make a quality education available to all students here and those to come,” said Dr. Murillo.

The new Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs also looks forward to strengthening the path leading from K-12 to enrollment at City College through an enhanced relationship with the San Francisco Unified School District because of a new administration there.

“City College of San Francisco is indeed fortunate that Dr. Murillo has accepted the position of Vice Chancellor of Academic Affairs,” said Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., Chancellor of City College. “Dr. Murillo brings to her position 27 years of experience as a community college faculty member and administrator. Her leadership in statewide organizations such as the California Mathematics Project of the University of California,

Office of the President, the California Community Colleges Chief Instructional Officers Executive Board, the Academic Senate Educational Policy Committee, and on the California Community College System Strategic Plan Implementation Oversight Committee, will greatly enhance her role as City College’s chief instructional officer,” Dr. Day continued.

Dr. Murillo, a New York native, started her higher education work experience as an instructional assistant in an English as a Second Language program in Puerto Rico. She has nearly 27 years experience as a community college faculty member and administrator in Puerto Rico, Florida and for the last 19 years in California.

She has taught mathematics as a full-time faculty member at the Ponce campus of the University of Puerto Rico, Tallahassee Community College in Florida and Hartnell College in Salinas, California. She has also been a graduate lecturer for Golden Gate University, Monterey, and California State University, Sacramento.

Her management titles included institutional researcher at the University of Puerto Rico, Ponce and the University of South Florida, Tampa; Dean of Science, Mathematics and Engineering at Sacramento City College; Vice President of Instruction at Colombia College; and most recently Vice President of Academic Affairs at Diablo Valley College.

She was awarded the Karl Pister Administrator Award for her work with the community college Math, Engineering & Science Achievement (MESA) program.

Dr. Murillo has been an active community member serving on several chamber, education and leadership development committees, school site councils for elementary and junior high schools, and K-12 district advisory committees.

Dr. Murillo earned her doctorate in Research Design & Statistics from Florida State University in Tallahassee. She received her master’s degree in mathematics from the University of Florida, Gainesville, and her bachelor’s degree in mathematics from Catholic University of Puerto Rico, Ponce. She also holds a certificate in Management & Leadership in Education (MLE) from the Harvard University Institute.

Title III Project Delivers

As we approach the conclusion of our five-year Title III project focused on student success we are assessing the results. Last spring, a large group of CCSF faculty, staff, and administrators met to review those accomplishments and develop recommendations to continue to build on them into the future.

Through a highly collaborative effort, effective leadership, and a \$1.7 million dollar federal investment, the accomplishments of the Title III project include:

- development and refinement of electronic assessment tools and labs for English, ESL, and mathematics with locally developed career and college success inventories;
- creation of three new student learning labs for English, ESL, and mathematics;
- refinement of curricula in English, ESL and mathematics to integrate instructional lab activities with the classroom;
- design and implementation of an electronic educational plan for counselor and student use;
- development of early alert and academic progress review systems for basic skills students;
- design and launch of a basic skills resource website for instructors, counselors, and librarians.

With the goal of increasing student achievement, persistence and retention, the impact of the project on the expansion of our enrollment systems and developmental learning environment has been significant. It is this legacy that the recommendations developed seek to build upon as we continue to work to increase student success.

Henry Leff passes away

City College Professor Emeritus Henry Leff passed away on August 13, 2007. Mr. Leff had retired from City College in June, 1983, having served as the longtime chair of Broadcast Electronic Media Arts.

Hundreds of first semester BEMA students continue to learn how to edit sound using an exercise featuring Henry Leff's voice recorded in the College's sound recording studio in 1981. In the late 1960s he was responsible for initiating City College's original video infrastructure which allowed instructional video materials to be distributed directly to all City College classrooms. This system was renamed Broadcast Media Services in the 1990s and continues operation from the Broadcast Electronic Media Arts Department in the Creative Arts Extension Building, providing the San Francisco Community College District with over 40,000 hours of video distribution, video playback, satellite downlinks, and video production services annually.

Professor Emeritus Henry Leff is survived by his wife Sylvia Leff, a former academic dean at City College, his son Mark and daughter Judy.

Information competency skills workshops set

Please inform your students that the Library can help them to succeed with course assignments requiring information resources and with the College's information competency requirement through a variety of research skills workshops taught in the instructional lab in R414 by library faculty. Students usually do not develop proficiency with these information research, technology and evaluation skills, unless faculty in most all academic and vocational programs also help students gain these academic and workplace skills. They do this by designing assignments that require students to use a variety of information resources and learn how to critically evaluate and select appropriate sources and cite without plagiarizing their sources.

In addition to the following drop-in workshops at the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center, librarians at all campuses offer customized workshops for classes and individual consultations for faculty who want to develop research-based assignments and learn more about the Library's online and print resources, such as e-books, full-text scholarly and magazine article databases, evaluated, credible Web resources, audio-visual resources, and hard-copy books, periodicals and campus archival information. Currently, only the "A" workshop is available online, but others are in development. Online faculty and faculty at campuses without a library can contact James Lim, Distance Learning/Electronic Services librarian for class presentations or ideas for online course assignments. Recognition of Achievement

Sam Browne explains computer hacking course to DEFCON convention attendees

Sam Browne of the Computer Networking and Information Technology Department, talked about his new City College course “Ethical Hacking and Network Defense” at the recent DEFCON convention in Las Vegas. DEFCON defines itself as the largest underground hacking event in the world (6,000+ attendees). “My DEFCON talk was a hit, far more than I expected,” says Browne, adding, “The room was packed and people loved it — there must have been at least 600 or 1,000 people there. I am still answering all the responses I got. *Security Focus* published a favorable article about it.”

Browne told the audience there were legal, ethical and practical concerns and that the College took precautions to protect the students from one another and others from them. The course was a success, said fellow CNIT faculty member Pierre Thiry, noting that “the topic is important and exciting for the students, and reinforces their security knowledge.”

Raymond Gamba, Students present at Psychology Association meeting

Raymond J. Gamba, Ph.D., Behavioral Sciences Department Chair and Psychology Instructor, presented a poster at the American Psychological Association’s annual meeting in San Francisco August 17. Two of Gamba’s former students — Maria Carolina Morales and David Q. Nguyen (both alumni of City College) co-presented. The title of the presentation was: “Acculturation, Individualism/Collectivism, and Religious Beliefs as Predictors of Environmental Concern.” Maria recently graduated from UC Berkeley and David graduated from UC Santa Cruz with degrees in psychology. Both are planning to attend graduate school in psychology.

Yolanda van Ecke, Ph.D., of the Behavioral Sciences faculty, has had two of her research articles published:

1. “Attachment Style and Dysfunctional Career Thoughts: How Attachment Style Can Affect the Career Counseling,” *Career Development Quarterly* Vol 55, Number 4, June 2007. The *Career Development Quarterly* is the peer-reviewed flagship journal of the National Career Development Counseling Association.
2. “Unresolved Attachment Among Immigrants: An Analysis Using the Adult Attachment Projective,” *The Journal of Genetic Psychology*, Volume 167, Number 4, December 2006. *The Journal of Genetic Psychology* was started in 1891 by G. Stanley Hall and is also a peer-reviewed scientific journal.

“These publications were part of my doctoral dissertation in clinical psychology on ‘Attachment and Immigrants’ for the University of Amsterdam,” said van Ecke, who received her Ph.D. in June 2007. Van Ecke worked as a full-time City College CalWorks Counselor from 1998-2000, and since then a part-time psychology instructor at City College.

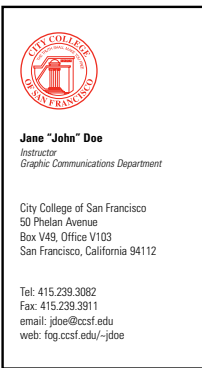
