- **Cota Yabut** will speak about *Philippine History* on **Monday, October 29** from 12 NOON to 1 P.M. in the APASS Center, Batmale Hall, 2nd floor. Yabut will use the diorama on display in the APASS Center to illustrate the talk.

CCSF geologist Roberto Anima to discuss August 15th Peru earthquake

City College Earth Sciences Department geologist **Roberto Anima** will discuss his recent trip to Peru to study the effects of the August 15th magnitude 8.0 earthquake near Lima. His talk will be held on **Wednesday, October 24**, from 5 to 6 P.M. in Science Hall Room 45. Professor Anima has worked for the U.S. Geological Survey for more than 25 years. He was part of an international team of scientists that visited Peru in September to assess the effects of this large earthquake. He will discuss the geologic setting of the earthquake, the damage he observed, and some of the long-term consequences of the quake for people living in rural Peru.

Shared Governance Update Communication Committee

Minutes of the September 4, 2007 meeting

1. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

2. OLD BUSINESS

A. REPORT FROM WEB ADVISORY SUBCOMMITTEE

Beth Cataldo summarized the subcommittee accomplishments over the summer. The RFP process for the website redesign and portal implementation included: review of proposals received from vendors; in-person presentations; and reference checks. Of the 10 vendor proposals, four vendors were asked to give presentations. Three were able to come and present. The subcommittee conducted reference checks on the top two vendors. Each of these two top vendors had different strengths. Neither vendor had the portal experience that CCSF needs. The subcommittee concluded the search for a single vendor to complete both the redesign and the portal implementation did not have the outcome anticipated. The subcommittee agreed the solution was to hire two vendors: one to tackle the website redesign and the other the portal implementation. The subcommittee would make this recommendation to the CAC and the Board of Trustees. Tom Blair made a motion to support the web advisory subcommittee's recommendation. Andrea Niosi seconded the motion.

The committee continued reviewing the draft of the "Executive Summary: Website Redesign and Portal Implementation Plan."

Café Musée to explore 'German Expressionism'

Café Musée will present a program on German Expressionism Saturday, October 27 from 9:30 A.M. to 12:30 P.M. in Visual Arts Room 114 on the Ocean Campus. Titled *Between Distortion and Abstraction: German Expressionism*, the discussion will be conducted in French and will be accompanied by a slide show. Brunch will also be served.

According to publicity for the event, "The word 'expressionism' first cropped up in the art literature around 1911, initially as a blanket term for avant-garde art in Europe around the turn of the 20th Century. It then characterized the work of artists such as van Gogh or Gauguin. But shortly afterward, this stylistic category was applied to a notorious vanguard group at the 'First German Autumn Salon' of 1913 in Munich, the 'Blue Rider [Der Blaue Reiter]'. The term 'expressionism' then became almost synonymous with the German contribution to international developments in art."

"What characterizes 'German Expressionism?'" the publicity continues, noting, "A feverish relentlessness, an emphasis on the painting process, urban anxiety, metaphysical foundations, and a tendency to mysticism — all elements traditionally associated with the German Romanticism and the 'German psyche.' Expressionist artists (Franz Marc, Ernst Ludwig Kirchner, Max Beckmann, Wassily Kandinsky, Otto Dix, etc.) were formative rather than imitative minds: they 'created' reality by dint of their visionary powers.
