## George Rush celebrates 250 career wins

Head Football Coach George Rush has succeeded in surpassing 250 wins in his 31 seasons at the helm of the football program at City College of San Francisco. The milestone occurred on September 29 in a win against Chabot College. The CCSF Rams have since gone on to provide Coach Rush with a career record of 253 wins, 80 losses, and 4 ties.

Rush attributes his success to the talent and motivation of the team members, noting, “The players are first. The program is for the players playing in it. As a coach I keep their focus on their education and their dreams.”

Looking around the office he will be vacating soon for new digs in the Community Health and Wellness Center currently under construction, Coach Rush mused, “My whole career has been in this building (South Gym). It has tradition and history. However, it’s time for a change and we’ll change with it.” He paused to point out a particular photo or

two, remembering the people pictured there and what the occasion was about. “I look at the great people I had a chance to work with: students, faculty, classified staff and administrators. And the Board of Trustees knows well the value of inter-collegiate athletics. It’s great to be with these people.”

Rush, who was born and raised in San Francisco, began his association with City College playing corner back on the 1966 and 1967 teams. Then, it was on to San Fernando Valley State (now CSU Northridge) for two years. He became a graduate assistant at Wake Forest University in North Carolina where he “learned about football and coaching.” Rush also coached at College of the Canyons in Valencia, California, before returning to City College in 1972 as an assistant secondary coach. Rush became a full time faculty member in fall 1975 and took over as Head Football Coach in fall 1977. “The best day of my life was when I went to City College,” said Rush.

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# Board of Trustees actions at October 25 meeting

The Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District (City College of San Francisco) took the following actions at its October 25, 2007 meeting.

- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-B1** — Increase contract with Strata Information Group by \$30,000 to a new contract total of \$175,000 to provide technical assistance for emergency database support during the absence of the database administrator.
- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-B4** — Authorization To Award Special Services Contract for ADA Upgrade Services for Ocean Campus Rosenberg Library to Tyco/Simplex-Grinnell at a Cost Not To Exceed \$19,000.
- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-B5** — Authorization To Award Construction Contract to Cumiskey Construction for Assembly of Pre-Fabricated Structure To Serve as New Arts Storage Facility for the Visual Arts Department, Total Cost Not To Exceed \$43,000.
- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-B6** — Authorization for four (4) Contract Modification(s) totaling \$234,440 for Special Services Contracts and Construction Contracts: A) Increase contract with PLUM Architects by \$13,440 to a new total of \$244,568 for additional services for the design of ADA access improvements at the Alemany Campus building; B) Increase contract with Construction Management West, Inc., by \$20,000 to a new total of \$180,000 for additional scheduling oversight and construction administration services for the New Mission Campus through October 31, 2007; C) Increase contract with B.B. & K Capital Corp./Alabama Street Partners by \$131,000 to a new total of \$5,224,408 for the negotiated final closeout of lease, space deconstruction and common area maintenance expenses at New Mission Campus Temporary Space Lease; and D) Increase contract with Inspection Services, Inc. by \$70,000 to a new total of \$836,595 for additional special testing and material inspection services due to unforeseen field conditions at Wellness Project.
- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-B8** — A) Increase contract with U.S. Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Prisons, by \$58,032 to a new total of \$113,832 because the Bureau of Prisons has elected to exercise its first year option, under the 5-year vocational training agreement with CCSF whereby CCSF will continue to provide the "Adobe Photoshop" and "Adobe After Effects" training classes at the Federal Correctional Institution in Dublin, California; B) Decrease contract with San Francisco Labor Council Support Training Employment Program (STEP) by \$16,000 to a new total of \$79,000 because of budget adjustment by SF Ed Fund and decrease in anticipated enrollment resulted in reduced sub-contractor contract for the Hotel Project Career Ladder Training Program. Contracted services still will include student outreach and recruitment, job placement and development, and wraparound services.
- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-C1-2** — C1) Procurement of Equipment, Supplies, Services, etc., in individual amounts of less than \$3,000; C2) Procurement of Equipment, Supplies, Services, etc., in individual amounts of more than \$3,000.
- **Approved Resolution No. 071025-F1** — Accepting the resignation of Dr. Brian Ellison from his employment as Dean of Instruction/Curriculum/Tenure Review/Faculty Evaluation effective close of business October 16, 2007.

# Shared Governance Update

## Registration/Enrollment Committee

Minutes of October 26, 2007

The meeting was called to order by Chair **Darlene Alioto** on Friday, October 26, 2007 at 1:10 P.M.

### 1. ELECTION OF COMMITTEE

**CHAIR: Darlene Alioto** was re-elected as Chair of the Registration/Enrollment Committee.

### 2. NURSING DEPARTMENT

**ADMISSION PROCESS:** The Registration/Enrollment Committee has ascertained that the Board of Trustees proposal for a residency requirement for the CCSF Nursing program is now illegal per SB 139, which makes it illegal to exclude students based on residency. Nursing Department Chair, **Cecile Dawydiak**, explained that to change the current lottery system could result in a less diverse program and more time spent in policing activities to verify residency.

The committee entertained several suggestions, at which time the Registration/Enrollment Committee requested that the Nursing Department discuss the issues fully at their November 5<sup>th</sup> faculty meeting and return to a special meeting of the Registration Committee on November 16 with a proposal that addresses the concerns expressed by the Board of Trustees.

### 3. FALL 2006 REGISTRATION UPDATE:

Dean **MaryLou Leyba** and Associate Registrar **Patricia Gant** reported that Fall 2007 registration went well with no major glitches. We handled the extended registration well and saw to it that faculty received their class lists. With the extended registration, 2500 more students had registered by the first day of class, lessening the number of students who had to go through the add process. The Office of Admissions and Records extended their hours for the last 2 weeks of registration to accommodate students.

**4. ADD/DROP UPDATE:** Dean Leyba reported that the Fall 2007 add/drop process also went well with no problems. There was a minimal number of in-person adds, since most students are now adding via the web. Dean Leyba is working with ITS to get more clear "error messages"

when the system refuses to accept an add-code.

**5. ANTICIPATED CHANGES:** No changes are expected for Spring 2008 or Summer 2008. Dean Leyba and Vice Chancellor **Mark Robinson** have updated the e-mail registration tickets. The new design is easy to read and links directly to registration. The Committee reminded Dean Leyba that the Ram "athletic" logo was to be used only for t-shirts, mugs, athletic uniforms, and other retail items. Any official communication must still carry the CCSF seal.

Dean Leyba informed the Committee that the College is pursuing a new on-line application through CCCApply.org, a system which gives more features and is currently used by 70 community colleges.

### 6. BRIDGE TO BIO-TECHNOLOGY:

The Committee agreed to grant priority registration for the first semester for the 35 or so at-risk students in the Bridge to Bio-technology program. The program is an intense 2 semester only program where at risk students must take 3 classes (Math, English, Biology). If they are successful, then they start the Bio-technology sequence of courses.

### 7. REGISTRATION CALENDARS:

Registration calendar for Spring 2008 was distributed.

### 8. INSTRUCTIONAL CALENDARS:

Instructional calendar for Spring 2008 was distributed. Calendars for Summer

2008 and Fall 2008 were not yet available as dates have not yet been negotiated.

**9. NEW LATE ADD FORM:** The new (and improved) late add form will be used starting in Spring 2008.

**10. FTES COMPARISON:** Dean Leyba reported that she did not yet have FTES figures for the current Fall 2007 semester. FTES went from 10,258 in Fall 2006 to 10,769 in Spring 2007.

**11. VOTER REGISTRATION UPDATE:** **Tim Killikelly** reported that the Mobilizing Democracy Project is going strong. This project, whereby students can request a voter registration application at the time they register for classes, has been a statewide program since 2003. The Governor has just signed SB 854 which mandates this process for all of the CSUs and the community colleges. At the time they register for classes, students must be asked if they wish to also receive a voter registration form and the colleges must coordinate with the Office of the Secretary of State to have the form sent to the students. This new law significantly changes the role that colleges and universities will play in engaging their students in civic life and public service.

**12. OTHER:** a) On-Line Census Reporting: Dean **MaryLou Leyba** announced that Census Sheets and Withdrawal sheets will be on-line beginning in Spring 2008. Faculty are encouraged to utilize this on-line service.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:20 P.M.

## I. Call to Order

The Academic Senate Executive Council came to order at 2:34 P.M.

## II. Adoption of Agenda

Council adopted the agenda.

## III. Approval of Minutes: 2007 September 12

Council approved the minutes with a few corrections.

## IV. Officers' Reports

**A. President Romano** distributed a written report. She reviewed several meetings she attended and encouraged faculty participation at the Basics Skills Initiative Meeting.

**B. 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Yee** reported on the meeting called by Vice-Chancellor Gabriner on a college technology plan. The plan would include incorporating the technology plans from ITS, the Library, and the Educational Technology Office (ETO).

**C. 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President Huntsman** provided copies of the first draft of the proposed goals from the Senate Retreat on September 19.

## V. Unfinished Business

Article X of the CCSF Academic Senate Constitution:

The question was called by Edgar Torres and seconded by Rodolfo Padilla on the amendment to Torres's resolution proposed by Francine Podenski on September 12; it did not pass. Discussion ensued on the amendment in which consideration focused on the methods of and reasons for the previous selection of Committee on Committees. The minutes of September 2, 1992 were introduced in which a resolution was passed regarding the constitution of the Committee on Committees. A vote on the amendment was taken; it failed to pass. Discussion on Torres's resolution ensued.

## Resolution 2007.09.26.01: Committee on Committees Selection:

**Resolved**, that the Academic Senate Executive Council move to postpone the continued discussion of Article X until after the Chancellor leaves the meeting. Moved: Hal Huntsman; seconded: Lynda Hirose; motion carried.

**B. Proposed New Administrative Positions:** Special Guest, Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr. Documents from Chancellor Day on his 2007 – 08 Personnel Issues/Plans were distributed. Dr. Day mentioned that action will also need to be taken on positions now or upcoming vacated by the Dean of Diversity, the Interim Dean of Instruction, two academic deans and others. The exempt Associate Senior Counsel for Policy Review and Analysis new position will be funded by monies that previously supported Dean Judy Teng's position. Dean Steven Glick will assume Dean Teng's responsibilities; her position is not intended to be refilled. Kit Dai will continue to run the Contract Education Office. It is expected that this Associate Senior Counsel position is in the line of succession for Senior Counsel Ron Lee. The Director of Alumni Relations and Annual Giving, a new position, is intended to finance a position presently held by a consultant. Dr. Day noted that the Foundation pledges have increased from one to 26 million dollars during his tenure at the college. The Dean of the School for International Education and ESL and Chinatown/North Beach Campus will be upgraded to Associate

Vice Chancellor, partially to stimulate an increase in international students. The Associate Dean of Grants and Resource Development will be upgraded to Dean, following exemplary service; the Associate Dean position will not be backfilled. The administrative position of Vice Chancellor for Student Development (VCSD) will be re-opened. Concern was expressed regarding this focus on administrative increases to the detriment of faculty needs was expressed. Dr. Day reminded us that there is now an unprecedented 800 full-time faculty positions at the college. Concern was expressed regarding the phrase "or the equivalent" in minimum qualifications requirement of "[t]hree years of direct instructional and/or student services experience (or the equivalent)." Dr. Day agreed to remove the phrase "or equivalent" from all the present administrative position announcements. He requested that it be on the record that faculty had previously requested that he "move the Tech Roundtable to an Office of Educational Technology headed by a Dean" and he complied. Thus, he finds reason to support the proposed Associate Dean of Distance education position.

## C. Discussion: New position of Associate Dean of Distance Education

Dean Mamie How presented a history of the development of educational technology at the college, and an explanation of the duties in Janet Willett's present position as Coordinator. She exerted that both College growth in this area and the policies of other schools suggest that the time has come to prepare for continued growth with an Associate Dean of Distance Education position. The Coordinator position will be removed. It was noted that this position is year-round whereas department chair positions are not. Suggestions were made for further inclusions in the job description. Information will be posted on a website that faculty members can access.

Jack Wilde reported on the urgency of complying with disabled access requirements, including mobility, vision and hearing issues, which the present Chinatown campus does not. Agnes Chan explained the reasons to urge the Board of Trustees to vote for an exemption from the City Planning Department height restrictions. The question on the motion was called by Karen Saginor and seconded by Suzanne Lo; it carried.

### Resolution 2007.09.26.02: Support for the Chinatown/North Beach Campus Exemption

Whereas, the Academic Senate Executive Council passed Resolution (2007.02.14.06) asking the Board to move the Chinatown/North Beach building forward, and

Whereas, California Government Code (CGC) Section 53094 allows the SFCCD to declare local zoning ordinances inapplicable to a San Francisco Community College District (SFCCD) project, and

Whereas, the Academic Senate recognizes that our students and the people in the Chinatown community deserve to have an adequate, quality education facility where students can focus on their learning, and thrive;

Therefore be it resolved that the Executive Council of the Academic Senate express our strong appreciation for and support of the plan to build a new Chinatown campus facility at the Corner of Kearny and Washington;

Further be it resolved that the Academic Senate urge the Board of Trustees to vote yes on the CGC Section 53094 (Exemption) as applied to the new Chinatown/North Beach campus; and Finally be it resolved that this resolution be presented to the Board of Trustees.

Moved: Hal Huntsman; seconded: Suzanne Lo; motion carried.

### Resolution 2007.09.26.03: Further Support for the Chinatown/North Beach Campus

Resolved, that the Academic Senate Executive Council be added as a City College organization to the list of Chinatown/North Beach Campus supporters of an open letter to the Board of Trustees requesting a vote to exempt the District from the City Planning Department requirements.
