Learning about transfer opportunities

Representatives from more than 40 four-year colleges and universities explained the ins and outs of the transfer process to City College of San Francisco students at the annual Transfer Day held November 2. "This year we were able to utilize the entire cafeteria space and everyone was pleased with having the extra room," noted Larry Damato, Chair of the Transfer Counseling Department. He also thanked the Culinary Arts and Hospitality Studies Department for providing an early morning breakfast for the representatives. "I look forward to having even more colleges and more students participate next year," said Damato.

Fire Science Academy to start in Spring

The City College of San Francisco Fire Science Technology program has received its accreditation from the State Fire Marshal's Training and Educational Advisory Committee, and will offer its first Basic Fire Academy this January. Located at the College's Airport Campus, the Academy will admit 32 students in spring 2008. Four fire engines and a lot of protective gear have been donated to the program in order to give a hands-on training experience to students. After completing the Academy, students will earn the Educational Firefighter I Certificate which meets the National Fire Protection Association Standard #1001. Then the graduates will apply their knowledge to actual work situations in the fire protection field by interning in a support position with a local fire department. Afterward, they can work in any fire department nationally.

Prior to the Academy the program established: 1) Fire Officer Certification courses for current firefighters to help them pass promotional exams; 2) the Certificate of Fire Protection consisting of five core courses for people with college degrees in other disciplines who want to change careers.

To start training at the new Academy, students need to have completed: Introduction to Fire Science Technology, Public Safety 1st Responder or EMT, and the Incident Command System 200 which can be taken online.

All of the firefighting courses are offered by the Administration of Justice and Fire Science Department. For full details, telephone (415) 239-3359.

Shared Governance Update Academic Policies Committee

Minutes of September 24, 2007 – Ocean Campus, Arts 314

We approved the draft minutes from 2007 April 30, and then held these discussions:

A. **Fred Teti** reviewed some of the Title 5 changes approved by the Board in July. These include an explicit prohibition from using CSU and UC transfer patterns for the area-of-emphasis requirement (they can still be used for GE requirements). The CCSF Option B degree is not compliant with this change, nor is paragraph (a) of the Option A Major Requirement. The Committee discussed the possibility of simply eliminating the Option B degree and the aforementioned paragraph (a). We will continue the discussion next meeting.

B. **Cecile Dawydiak**, **Agnes Leong** and **Linda Squires Grohe** disbursed a handout containing the (tabled) Board resolution calling for the RN program to admit S.F. resident students before residents of other cities, a demographic chart of the RN students, an exchange between Dawydiak and S.F. Supervisor **Ross Mirkarimi** (who is responsible in part for the Board resolution), and Senate Bill 139 which (if it becomes law) will forbid exclusionary residence policies. The cover page lists the RN Department's four main reasons for opposing a residency policy.

The Committee agreed that the Board's proposal was *de facto* exclusionary, but that there may be room for options that give S.F. residents some preference. Teti will ask the presenters to draft such options and to present these options both to the Registration and Enrollment Subcommittee and to A. P. in October.

C. **Donna Hayes** presented recommendations from the Transfer Issues Subcommittee.

1. Hayes showed how Pasadena City transcripts display CSU GE and IGETC information for each course. The Transfer Issues Subcommittee recommends that CCSF do so as well. **MaryLou Leyba** will look into whether Banner can produce formats formatted that way, and Deanna Abma will look into the potential workload burden in the Office of Instruction.

2. The Transfer Issues Subcommittee recommends also that the CCSF equivalencies to Advanced Placement Test results be published in the Catalog. Since Abma needs to ask the department chairs to update their Advanced Placement policies with her, she agreed to ask them if there are objections to Catalog publication of these policies.

D. The Committee discussed the history and the current role of the Scholarship Committee. The Committee expressed concern about the way some scholarships are awarded, the Foundation's role, and transparency of the allocation process. Teti will ask the Subcommittee chair to present at our next meeting strategies for addressing our concerns.

E. We did not feel prepared to continue discussing multiple associate degree policies. Abma agreed to research other Bay Area community colleges' policies for multiple degrees and for multiple majors. For reference, here is the proposal still under discussion:

- To earn an additional associate degree, a student must earn at least 18 degree-applicable units that were not applied to a prior CCSF associate degree.
- The additional degree must conform to the graduation requirements as listed in a Catalog published while the student earns those 18 new units. (That is, catalog rights expire with the degree earned.)
- The overall GPA of the new units must be at least 2.0.

I. Call to Order

The Academic Senate Executive Council came to order at 2:46 P.M.

II. Adoption of Agenda

Council adopted the agenda.

III. Approval of Minutes: 2007 October 10

Council approved the minutes with an addition.

IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Romano attended a Basic Skills Initiative Meeting and reported on it. At the September 27 Board of Trustees Meeting, the vote on the EIR, and exemption of the city (SF) planning code regarding the new Chinatown/North Beach Campus was tabled until October 18, 2007. At the Board of Trustees retreat on October 2, the Trustees discussed goals/priorities for the coming year which included the CEO search, diversity, facilities and strengthening the Board. The deadline for the RFPs for hiring a search consultant for the Chancellor's search is due October 19. The Board agreed on an eighteen member configuration for the Chancellor's hiring committee which would be 3 administrators, 3 Board of Trustees, 3 classified, 3 community representatives, 3 faculty, and 3 students.

B. 1st Vice President Yee reported on the Strengthening Student Success Confer-

ence. Some discussion focused on SLOs. He attended the latest Technology Planning Meeting called by Vice-Chancellor Gabriner. Yee has encouraged the ITPC group to provide easier methods for instructors to access the internet in the classroom and also requested that a process be instituted by which students can be informed quickly when difficulties occur with computer access to the College.

V. Unfinished Business

A. Article X of the CCSF Academic Senate Constitution Resolution: "Establish an explicit process for how the Executive Council selects the members of the Committee on Committees"

Karen Saginor proposed an amendment to Edgar Torres's motion above, which was seconded by Jane Sneed. Rodolfo Padilla asked that the record reflect that in the past two years he has never been asked to vote for the fifth member of the Committee on Committees. Pierre Thiry called the question on the amendment, which was seconded by Padilla. Parliamentarian Susan Lopez explained that a 2/3 yes vote is necessary to stop the debate. A role call vote was called for which failed, with ten yes and eleven no votes, and 2 abstentions. The votes were as follows:

Discussion of the amendment continued. Lopez explained that Robert's Rules of Order requires that amendments to a motion are discussed and voted on before returning to the motion and that points of order or information take precedence over the discussion. Discussion ensued on pro and con opinions on the amendment. Hirose called the question and wondered

if a ballot vote could be taken. Sneed made a point of clarification, asking if the President can vote during a ballot; the answer is yes. Lopez was chosen as teller, distributing and counting the ballot votes.

Resolution 2007.10.10.01: Committee on Committees Selection:

Whereas the Executive Council's "Committee on Committees" has been approved for many years under Section X of the Senate's Constitution and, in particular, under Section V of the By-Laws, and

Torres amended his motion, distributing written copies. Discussion ensued, based on the wording and meaning thereof of the amendment. Thiry proposed a friendly amendment which Torres accepted, with added wording explicating the method by which Committee on Committees members would be voted for. The clarity of the motion was questioned and several emendations to the wording occurred. Sneed moved to table the motion to time certain at 4:30pm to give Council time to prepare for next week's Bipartite Meeting; Podenski seconded. Sneed asked for a role call vote. Lopez explained that a 2/3 vote is necessary for passage. The motion to table failed with nine yes and twelve no votes, and two

Discussion continued on concerns about the vague wording. Sneed moved to divide the motion into the original language and the amendment in order that they may be voted upon separately. Thiry agreed to withdraw his amendment. Francisco called the question;

Hirose seconded. It did not pass. Torres's intention with regard to the timing of the nominations and vote on Committee on Committees members was asked. Lopez noted that the Brown Act would not allow a vote for Committee on Committees members today as it has not been agendaized. A role call vote on the motion passed with twelve yes and eight no votes, and two abstentions.
