## Dr. Veronica Hunnicutt earns Unsung Hero award

Dr. Veronica Hunnicutt, Dean of the Southeast Campus, was presented with the 2007 Unsung Hero of the African American Community Award by the San Francisco Public Library. The award for Dr. Hunnicutt's work as Dean and her collaboration with of community-based organizations that empower students was presented at a ceremony November 18 in the Koret Auditorium at the Main Library.

Among the citations in the nomination for the award were Dr. Hunnicutt's work at the Southeast Campus to introduce a Hospitality Management/Culinary Arts High School Mentoring Program in conjunction with San Francisco State University, and initiating a Weekend College program to serve 11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> grade San Francisco Unified School District students who want to earn credit classes, as well as Working Adults and Working Mothers.

## Board of Trustees selects ACCT to lead search for new Chancellor

The Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District has engaged the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) to head up the search for a new Chancellor. The contract with ACCT approved unanimously at a November 15 meeting is not to exceed \$75,000. A timetable for the process is under development, and ACCT is expected to brief the Board at least monthly. Dr. Philip R. Day, Jr., has indicated to the Board that he plans to resign with the intention to retire no later than August 2008.

In its proposal describing its qualifications, the ACCT noted, "Founded in 1972, ACCT is the nonprofit educational organization of Boards of Trustees of community, technical and junior colleges dedicated to effective Board of Trustees leadership through education, advocacy and service at local, state and national levels. ACCT has the built-in capacity to conduct a comprehensive national effort to recruit the best leaders for our colleges.

"ACCT has over 30 years of experience working with Governing Boards in California and providing expertise in the selection of chancellors and presidents/superintendents through comprehensive search assistance. This includes recruitment of a diverse and quality pool of candidates, preparation of search materials, guidance to the board of trustees and the search committee, facilitating involvement and buy-in by all internal

# Re-Entry Program at forefront of health and education

The California Endowment has funded a unique program that addresses and promotes broad-based wellness for San Francisco's formerly incarcerated communities. Known as the Post-Release Wellness Project (PRWP), a unique partnership has been created between three organizations: City College of San Francisco's Health Education and Community Health Studies Department; Transitions Clinic, one of the first clinics to be dedicated exclusively to meeting the health care needs of formerly incarcerated individuals and Legal Services for Prisoners with Children (LSPC), a non-profit advocacy group. The \$368,963 grant is for two years, from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2009.

CCSF's Health Education and Community Health Studies Department will develop new courses and a proposal for a specialty vocational certificate designed to train front-line public health and social service providers to work with formerly incarcerated clients transitioning back to local communities. The specialty certificate will build on core competencies from the department's nationally-recognized Community Health Worker certificate, such as outreach, case management, and motivational interviewing. Several courses focusing specifically on working with incarcerated and formerly incarcerated populations will also be created. The first course to be developed and piloted in Spring 2008 will be Health 66: Health Education and Chronic Disease Management. This course will focus on the role of Community Health Workers (CHWs) in team-based management of chronic conditions and it has been developed in collaboration with CCSF Health Care Technology Department, CHW graduate and physicians from the Transitions Clinic.

Transitions Clinic, co-founded by Emily Wang, M.D., is a post-release medical clinic located in the San Francisco Department of Public Health's Southeast Health Center, in the San Francisco Bay View District. The Clinic is a unique patient-centered program that strives to meet both the medical and social needs of its clients. Transitions Clinic received a grant from the California Policy Research Center at the University of California, to conduct an evaluation that will track client services and patient outcomes. Additionally, Transitions Clinic has hired a CHW, Ronald Sanders, who outreaches to parolees by attending weekly Parole and Community Team (PACT) meetings. The CHW provides case management services including home visits, assessment, referrals to mental health, nutrition, employment, and peer-based support services. The CHW also acts as a bridge between physicians and patients and helps communicate immediate health needs to the providers.

Legal Services for Prisoners with Children has a long and successful track record of advocating for systemic changes benefiting formerly incarcerated communities. Ms. Donna Willmott, MPH and Ms. Sekeenah Robinson will take the lead in conducting formative research including focus groups to evaluate post-release prisoner needs. The research will inform the PRWP as to how the experience of prison shapes attitudes about health and education, former prisoners' specific health and educational needs; and barriers to health care access. LSPC will also convene a community advisory board (CAB) which will examine research outcomes and help guide the PRWP in developing and refining its services.

constituencies (faculty, staff, students and administrators). We have the flexibility and built-in capacity to conduct a search from November to February (four to five months) without sacrificing campus involvement and the quality of the candidate pool."

The ACCT proposal went on to state, "ACCT's record of placement of CEO's is among the highest in the higher education executive recruitment industry. For example, of the 26 searches ACCT conducted for community colleges for presidents and chancellors in 2003 and 2004 only four are no longer leading their institutions, with two of those leaving for career advancement purposes. This gives ACCT a 100% successful placement rate, with a 92% successful retention rate after three years of service."
