Major increase tallied in credit students

With the Spring Semester underway, there is an increase of 2,400 more students enrolled as opposed to last Spring Semester 2007, plus these students are taking 17,400 more units than last Spring. As of January 14, the total number of credit students on all of the campuses is 35,443.

City College of San Francisco responded to the all-time high demand for college courses in the San Francisco Bay Area, increasing the number of credit sections

by 120. The College usually offers around 3,500 credit courses per semester.

One reason for the significant increase both in credit students and the number of units they are taking is the recent opening of the new Mission Campus. Credit courses at this campus tripled to 150, which as of January 14 resulted in 1,752 students taking 8,921 units.

This increase in credit enrollment at City College comes during a time when the University of California and California

State University systems are considering turning away thousands of eligible students because of expected cuts in revenue caused by the state's \$14.5 billion budget deficit.

Also contributing to the increase in spring enrollment is the completion of several new buildings on the Ocean Campus, including the Community Health and Wellness Center which offers 20 sections of swimming classes in its new full-sized pool. The Orfalea Family Center also opened this spring semester with an offering of 80 credit sections.

Enrollment of new credit students continues through February 1. Noncredit students can enroll anytime during the semester.

Encourage students to fill out FAFSA

As of January 1, 2008, students have been able to complete the "Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)" to determine the amount of federal funding they might be eligible to receive for the 2008-2009 school year.

We hope you will encourage your students to complete the FAFSA, even if they think they will not qualify for federal aid. They won't receive aid if they don't apply! Moreover, some private scholarships require proof of a completed FAFSA as part of the application process to verify that students did not receive adequate federal aid and are eligible for private funds. Further, the Cal Grant programs (State of California Financial Aid) also require that students complete the FAFSA.

Please promote the completion of the FAFSA to every student interested in financing their college education and the need to complete a Renewal FAFSA to those students who completed a FAFSA last year.

Remember, it's free to apply. Visit www.fafsa.ed.gov for more information and assistance in completing the FAFSA. Students who need help in completing the FAFSA may visit the Financial Aid Information Center in Cloud Hall, Room #331, on the Ocean Campus.

As of January 2008 the Federal Government

has discontinued the FAFSA paper application, therefore, all students must complete the FAFSA on-line. It's also important to remember that the deadline for the Cal Grant programs is March 2, 2008.

After the rush of the beginning of the semester is over the Financial Aid Office will be conducting additional financial aid workshops across the College's campuses. We will send an update with the schedule of workshops shortly.

New centers to treat work-related injuries

City College recently was notified that effective March 14, 2008, UCSF and San Francisco General Hospital (SFGH) will cease operations and provision of workers' compensation medical services at the Occupational Health Service (OHS), located in Building 9 on the SFGH campus.

In preparation for closure of the workers' compensation clinic, after 5 P.M. on Friday, February 1, 2008, if you sustain a new work-related injury, you should seek medical care at an alternate location. **Do not seek care at OHS for any new work-related injury after 5 P.M. on Friday, February 1, 2008.**

If you were previously treated at OHS and already have a scheduled appointment at OHS, or need an appointment for an existing work-related injury, you

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may continue treating at OHS until 5 P.M. March 14, 2008, by reporting to, or calling OHS for treatment.

Do not report to OHS after 5 P.M. on March 14, 2008 for any medical service.

Information competency research skills workshops help students succeed

Does your course challenge students to go beyond the textbook to find other suitable information sources, or do you require a writing assignment that includes some research? If you answered “yes” to either question, you will want your students to take advantage of the library’s three major instructional and orientation support services:

- Drop-in research skills workshops and/or the online versions of the workshops (see schedule below) that teach students how to access, find, interpret screen displays and critically evaluate good quality information from the web, periodical databases and collections of books and audio-visual materials;
- Customized workshop presentations for specific classes that help prepare students for a class assignment; librarians will also work with faculty to revise or design an assignment that takes advantage of the variety of online information sources or addresses other learning objectives;
- Interactive walking tour of the Rosenberg Library that reveals through discovery and engagement the important library services and resources, (see a copy at www.ccsf.edu/Library/instruct/wlkngr.pdf); other campus libraries offer orientation tours or similar self-guided learning activities.

Who assigns these workshops and for what purposes? An analysis conducted during Fall 2007 reveals that the largest number of faculty who require/recommend the drop-in workshops or schedule customized workshops for their classes teach ESL, English, Health or Speech courses. Other courses at the Ocean campus whose students take advantage of these drop-in (or online version) research skills workshops include sections of Anthro 2 and 3, Art 101, Biology 32, BCST 100, Econ 1, 3 and 25, Health 53, LERN/IDST 50, Music 26, Nutrition 12, Psych 1, and Soc 1.

The primary purposes that faculty refer students to these workshops or schedule a customized class session is to help stu-

dents do research for writing or speech assignments or to find and select good quality journal articles in a specific discipline/technical field. Information competency research and computer skills, like writing, oral communication, reading and mathematical skills, are part of CCSF’s general education. Information competency is also a graduation requirement at CCSF, which is satisfied by successful completion of Eng 96, Eng 1A or ESL 170 — all courses that require research-based essays and papers. However, these research and evaluation skills are developmental and require practice and application in more than one course.

Review the content of each workshop listed below in relation to your course ob-

Library research information skills workshops – Spring 2008 schedule

All workshops conducted in the Rosenberg Library, Room 414. All are first come, first served — no sign-up.

- **A Workshop** covers the use of the library online catalog to find books, videos and more. 50 minutes *
- **B Workshop** teaches the use of several periodical databases to find, print, or e-mail magazines and newspaper articles. 50 minutes
- **C Workshop** covers basic Internet concepts and basic search techniques using Web subject directories and search engines. 50 minutes
- **W Workshop** emphasizes more advanced search features for search engines and evaluating and citing Web pages. 50 minutes
- **D Workshop** teaches research paper skills, including narrowing a topic, finding suitable sources, citing sources and preparing the bibliography. Only for student who have required papers/projects. 90 minutes. Prerequisite: Workshop B, C or W completed BEFORE D.
