## CCSF celebrates African American History Month

City College of San Francisco will celebrate African American History Month all during February with a series of presentations at several campuses by **Emory Douglas** on the art works he created for the Black Panthers. There also will be an exhibition of Douglas' art in the Louise and Claude Rosenberg, Jr., Library and Learning Resource Center. In addition, the Southeast Campus plans a dance performance by the Fua Dia Congo company and a weekly video/discussion series. All events are free and open to the public.

Last year, Douglas published the book *e Black Panther: e Revolutionary Art of Emory Douglas*, which will form the basis of his lecture and slide presentations to be delivered at the following campuses, dates and times:

Douglas began his association with the Black Panthers in January 1967 when he met co-founders Huey Newton and Bobby Seal who were providing security for Betty Shabazz (Malcolm X's widow) at San Francisco's first annual Malcolm X Grassroots Memorial in Hunter's Point. Douglas, a 22-year-old graphic arts student at City College of San Francisco and a member of CCSF's Black Student Union, created the poster and flyers for that event. Two months later, Douglas found Seal working on the initial issue of the Panther newsletter in Eldridge Cleaver's apartment and began an odyssey which would lead him to become the party's minister of culture, creating a visual history of party's ideology and agenda. At the March 2007 book

release party, Douglas told the *San Francisco Chronicle* that "since the black community at that time weren't by and large readers," he "created an 'everyperson' look everyone could connect with."

Fua Dia Congo (which means Congolese heritage) dance company will perform **ursday, February 21**, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., at the Southeast Campus, 1800 Oakdale Avenue, in the Alex Pitcher Community Room. The group is directed by **Muisi-Kongo Malonga**, daughter of the company's founder the late Malonga Casquelourd. Established in 1977, the company is dedicated to the preservation, promotion and study of traditional Central African culture.

The Southeast Campus Discussion Group will sponsor a video/discussion group at the 1800 Oakdale Avenue campus every ursday in Room 410. The schedule of videos includes:

.. **Dr. Claud Anderson**, *PowerNomics: e National Plan to Empower Black America*, **February 7** from 2 to 4 p.m. According to Anderson's web site, the book "sets forth a five-year national plan in education, economics, politics and outlines a new role for Black religious organizations."

.. **John Henrick Clarke**, "Great and Mighty Walk," **February 7**, from 5 to 8 p.m. Professor Clarke was a faculty member and former chairman of the Department of Black and Puerto Rican Studies at Hunter College. He was a former Distinguished Visiting Professor of African History at the African Studies and Research Center at Cornell University. He was the author or editor of 19 books.

.. **Asa G. Hilliard III**, "Free Your African Mind," **February 14**, from 2 to 4 p.m., and from 5 to 8 p.m. Dr. Hilliard was a Pan-Africanist, educator, historian and psychologist, a lifetime teacher of African and African diaspora history on the faculty of San Francisco State and Georgia State University.

.. **Frances Cress Welsing**, "New Orleans Wake Up Call," **February 21** from 2 to 4 p.m. and from 5 to 8 p.m. A psychiatrist in practice

in Washington, DC, she is the author of *e Isis Papers* and the creator of the Cress-Welsing theory analyzing the nature of white supremacy.

The overall theme of the 2008 City College observance of African American History Month is "Carter G. Woodson and the Origins of Multiculturalism." Woodson, an African American historian, author, and journalist, is the founder of Black History Month. "Taught to read by family members, Woodson worked as a coal miner in West Virginia and put himself through high school. He graduated from Berea College in Kentucky in 1903. Hired to teach English in the Philippines, Woodson studied Romance languages through correspondence courses," according to infoplease.com, which continued, "Woodson was an active promoter of black education. In 1926 he began promoting Negro History Week during the second week of February to celebrate the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. In the 1960s it became Black History Month."

## The merits of a student book loan program

For many college students the beginning of a semester is the most exciting time of year. A world of new knowledge is literally at ones fingertips. After sorting through the catalog and discovering the possibilities for improving our quality of life and developing a deeper understanding of our unique intellectual capabilities, some of us are able to realize our full potential at the affordable price of a community college education, while many others take the plunge fully committing themselves to the rigorous tasks of greater achievement by making use of many resources offered here at City College. One such option is the Associated Student Bookloan Program.

It is a well documented fact that the cost of a college education in California is far exceeding the price of tuition. According to the California Student Public Interest Group, textbooks now cost students 43 percent of the tuition and fees at a community college. CALPRIG is working towards legislation that will give faculty better information about the costs and quality of the textbooks they assign to students. In the mean time, we here at City College are fortunate to have a spirit of activism and social justice stimulating the conversation in a more sustainable direction. In a time of great economic uncertainty and social instability, the Associated Student Bookloan was originally designed to supplement the needs of the most economically disadvantaged students on campus, by giving them the opportunity to use a book for the semester free of charge. As the overall costs of living here in the Bay Area skyrocket, the need for the Associated Student Bookloan is far exceeding the availability of books. Part-time students and non-credit students have not been included into the equation of need. The costs of books truly influence decisions students make regarding their educational choices.

Our hope is to respond to the many voices of students shouting out to us for assistance with tuition and books. We look forward to creating a more intimate partnership between faculty and students by further developing our Bookloan program into a model of sustainability as it relates to student support services.

Coordinators **Michael Calvello** and **Antonio Martinez** and 50 Puente students attended the annual Puente Transfer Motivational Conference last fall at UC Berkeley. Beginning in 1989, the Puente Project is currently completing its successful 18<sup>th</sup> year at City College of San Francisco.

Two of the featured speakers, **Miguel Hernandez**, the Assistant Director of Student Affairs at UC Berkeley, and **Rosa Perez**, Chancellor of Evergreen Valley College, talked of their experiences with the Puente Project at CCSF.

Hernandez was a Puente student in 1993 and during his introduction to the 860 students expressed the important role that the Puente Project played in his

educational development in transferring to UC Berkeley.

Perez expressed how important her experience with the Puente Project was in her life as well. Both of these speakers gave special acknowledgement to past and current Puente Project coordinators.

During the all day conference, the students from community college Puente programs of Northern California had an opportunity to interact with California State University, University of California and private university representatives, including Stanford and Yale.

## Sara Peterson's teaching recognized by peers

**Sara Peterson**, faculty member of the Mathematics Department was awarded the prestigious "Excellence in Teaching Award" by the California Mathematics Council, Community Colleges at the Council's Northern California Conference in Monterey on November 30. "Only a handful of community college mathematics instructors receive the award each year," says **Dennis Piontkowski**, Mathematics Department Chair. He points out, "Sara has been a full-time member of the Mathematics Department at CCSF since 2002. As faculty coordinator for the College's Basic Mathematics program, Sara introduced a new course format that has led to a significant increase in student success by combining individualized study with small group lectures. She is currently leading the department's participation in the Strengthening Pre-collegiate Education in Community Colleges (SPECC) program by working to improve student success in Elementary Algebra.

"Sara earned a BA from Webster University and a Master's from Washington University in St. Louis, Mo. She taught mathematics at the University of Missouri for seven years before embarking on a career in business, software engineering and technical product marketing in industries ranging from scientific and engineering software to real-time stock market information. During this time she earned an MBA from the Olin School of Business at Washington University," Piontkowski continued.

"Five years ago, Sara returned to her real love, teaching mathematics, when she joined the faculty of CCSF. She teaches the full range of courses with a personal emphasis on helping students who have had little previous success in mathematics," Piontkowski said.

## Broadway actor John Earl Jelks praises CCSF theater training

**John Earl Jelks**, a 2007 Tony nominee for his performance on Broadway in August Wilson's last play, *Radio Golf*, told is quoted in the January 2008 issue of *American Theatre*, "I got my first acting experience at City College of San Francisco, under **Gloria Weinstock**, my first teacher." Although he was only at CCSF for six weeks, Jelks notes that that course was "all the 101 stuff: stage right, stage left, relaxation. Right after that I got my first professional role. I just kept working."

**Carlos Perea**, a CCSF student planning to transfer to UC and major in Spanish and Immigration Law, has been awarded a Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship to study abroad in Madrid, Spain, during Spring 2008. The two take different paths: a mer traveling Nicola becomes a successful psychiatrist, while Matteo becomes a policemen intent on catching criminals. # Academic Senate Executive Council seeks volunteers

A Message from Lisa Romano, President

**H**appy New Year and greetings from your Academic Senate President. It appears that I have survived a first semester experience as President that proved to be quite challenging. The controversy and debate regarding Article X of the CCSF Academic Senate Constitution and the formation of the Committee on Committees (COC) was a long, arduous process that took much patience. The Council was often divided and even polarized but eventually managed to find middle ground. The COC was finally formed on November 7 and the first set of faculty appointments to shared governance committees occurred at the December 12 Executive Council meeting. As we are now able to move forward I do not expect there will be any more delays with faculty appointments to shared governance committees. However this issue is far from over, there is more work to be done as the Council prepares for next year's election of Executive Council members. At the November 28 meeting, the Executive Council passed a resolution to convene a workgroup that would review and establish procedures for the future convening of the COC. The resolution also stipulates that the workgroup would consist of current and former Executive Council members as well as interested faculty members at large who might like to work on this issue. The charge of the workgroup is to research and document the history and implementation of Article X and the formation of the COC and make recommendations for a new COC membership selection process. The workgroup will report regularly and make recommendations for the COC membership selection to the Council no later than April 9, 2008. Meetings will be held on Monday afternoons from 1 to 3 p.m. The first meeting will be on **Monday, February 11** in a room to be announced.
