Basic skills update

The response to City College's Basic Skills Initiative has been very strong, Dr. **Bruce Smith**, Dean of the School of Liberal Arts, reports. More than 150 faculty, staff, students, and administrators have volunteered to participate in four work groups that will make recommendations for strengthening student success across the curriculum and support services.

Smith adds that everyone who expressed interest has been assigned to a work group and every work group has started deliberations. Since the response has been so strong and the work groups are on a very tight timeline, the membership on the work groups has been finalized and no additional applicants are needed. Trustees elect Lawrence Wong President, Dr. Natalie Berg VP

The Board of Trustees of the San Francisco Community College District (City College of San Francisco) has elected **Lawrence Wong**, Esq., as President, and **Dr. Natalie Berg** as Vice President. The vote was unanimous at the Board's January 31 meeting. Wong and Berg will serve through January 2009.

It is the fourth time that Wong has been elected by his fellow Trustees to serve as President of the Board. San Francisco voters first elected Wong to the Board in 1994 and re-elected him in 1998, 2002 and 2006.

Trustee Wong is recognized as a leader in promoting educational programs and services for immigrants and non-native speakers, Minority and Women Business Enterprise Programs (M/WBE) and efforts to diversify the college faculty and staff.

Wong was born and raised in San Francisco. He was educated in the city's public school system and is a graduate of City College of San Francisco, the University of California at Berkeley and the University of Santa Clara School of Law.

Vice President Berg was elected to the Board of Trustees in 1996 and re-elected in 2000 and 2004. Prior to her service on the Board, Dr. Berg had served City College of San Francisco in a number of faculty and administrative capacities spanning 30 years. She is currently Vice President of Forest City Development, a major national development company. Dr. Berg was honored in 2005 and again in 2006 by the *San Francisco Business Times* as one of "The 100 Most Influential Women in the San Francisco Bay Area."

City College debate team among the best in the US

The City College of San Francisco Speech and Debate program began the spring semester much like it ended the fall semester — with a major victory. The debate team of **Alexandra Krakow** and **Kareem Saber** defeated Colorado College in the final round of the Point Loma Sunset Cliffs Invitational in San Diego, February 1-3. Krakow and Saber were undefeated through all six of their preliminary rounds of competition in the junior varsity division. Because the Point Loma invitational is a national caliber tournament, Saber and Krakow had to win four more elimination debates before reaching the final round and placing first out of the 53 teams competing at the tournament.

Saber and Krakow ended the fall semester with a first place finish at the University of the Pacific Tournament in Stockton, held November 9-11, 2007. The UOP invitational is the largest tournament in Northern California, attracting competitive programs from throughout the nation.

In the varsity division, CCSF debate won other awards. **Sarah Hamid** and **Yasir Khan** gained a preliminary round record in San Diego worthy of advancement to the elimination rounds. Hamid and Khan were narrowly defeated in the octo-finals by the top ranked team in the nation. "It was a 2-1 decision and we captured the ballot of a very respected critic," remarked Hamid, a third semester competitor for City College. At the tournament, Hamid received word that she will be offered a full ride debate scholarship to the University of the Pacific.

City College's placement at the tournament has raised the profile of the program. "I had many people remark to me that we were the only community college advancing at these high profile tournaments. We are competing well against teams from Berkeley, Western Kentucky, Texas Tech, and UCLA. We are very happy that City College invests so much in this important program." stated **Kristina Whalen**, Director of Forensics for CCSF. Senior debater Yasir Khan added, "After this weekend, we will be the highest ranked community college debate team in the nation."

I. Call to Order

The Academic Senate Executive Council came to order at 2:43 P.M.

A. President Romano reported:

- On the progress of the Basic Skills Initiative (BSI) meetings. About fifty responses to the call for participation were received; further are expected in the Spring. An independent flex day activity will be held January 10.

- Dr. Anita Grier and Clara Starr announced a college-wide, open forum to seek input from the College community on the chancellor description/profile. The forum will be held on Friday, December 14 from 1-3 p.m. at the Ocean campus, Rosenberg Library, Rm. 305.

- Participated in the 4th annual CCSF Job Fair at the Kabuki Hotel in Japantown. She encouraged department participation with future job fairs.

- Will prepare an article to go out in City Currents to recruit volunteers to participate in the Article X workgroup. Also seeking members from Executive Council who would like to participate.

- Circulated a draft of the Dean of Diversity and Student Equity position for review.

B. 1st Vice President Yee attended Website

Redesign Focus Group, which Beth Cataldo led with recognizable skill. Preparation continues for the Spring Bipartite by submitters of courses for general education approval. At the San Francisco Board of Education meeting, Proposition 92 was discussed but tabled because some members could not understand how the redistribution of funds could not negatively impact K – 12. Officers met with Kristin Charles to discuss the Institutional Review Board (IRB), which the college must form in order to oversee grants which include human testing. Liberal Arts degrees are no longer allowed; thus, new designations must be determined for previous degrees of this type. A Student Payroll glitch occurred during which data were lost; however, the information was re-entered. Some Groupwise patches are causing crashes; other Groupwise errors are occurring but causes have not been identified. Yee has consistently advised that network switch replacements be scheduled only during times when the college is closed; after four months, ITS agreed.

C. 2nd Vice President Hal Huntsman advocated for continuing effort toward helping Prop 92 pass.

V. Committee Appointments

Yee passed out documents with recommended appointments for shared governance committees and subcommittees. Podenski suggested that the areas for the department of each possible appointee be included. Cataldo suggested that interested parties be informed that appointment as a resource member and attendance without voting rights is possible for all committees. Various methods of providing this information were discussed. A document with appointees to the Basic Skills Initiative workgroups and a list of the volunteer steering task force members was included.

Yee reminded Council that past practice is no longer to be used as an argument for inclusion in a GE Area.

VII. New Business

A. Nursing – Amendment to the Lottery Selection Process

The Nursing Department presented a proposal to change the application process procedure. During the presentation, the Nursing Department received a call with information from the State of California Chancellor's Office that rendered the discussion moot because giving special consideration to applicants based on their residency is interpreted to be illegal.

Sagino remarked that the Student Grade and Files subcommittee has encountered inconsistencies in terms of membership versus function. President Romano will assist in finding a solution. Podenski remarked that email among Council members should be respectful and aware of the Brown Act. Continued concern regarding email discussions was expressed by other members. Parenteau announced a push to ban smoking on all campuses except in designated areas, beginning in January 2009; Podenski noted that it is unlikely the SEIU will support it.
