NSF team to evaluate CCSF proposal for \$3M grant for an ICT regional center

An evaluation team from the National Science Foundation's Advanced Technology Education (ATE) Division will visit City College of San Francisco on **Wednesday, March 19** to assess a \$3 million grant proposal to establish the Mid-Pacific Information and Communications Technology (MPICT) Center at CCSF. Team members include **Gerhard Salinger**, program director of Advanced Technical Education Division; **Steve Cooper**, program officer, ATE; and **Sydney Rogers**, executive director, Alignment Nashville. The grant term would be for four years.

The proposal grew out of the NSF-funded Institute for Convergence of Optical and Network Systems (ICONS) housed in the Computer Networking and Information Technology (CNIT) Department here.

MPICT proposes to build on ICONS' successes by establishing a regional center at CCSF, which would serve some 50 community colleges in Northern California, Northern Nevada, Southern Oregon, Hawaii and the Pacific territories. Information and Communications Technologies (ICT) is an internationally recognized term for converging computer, networking and communications technologies.

"Every college is faced with the same issues in ICT: ever-changing field, updating faculty, contact with industry. So, with the benefit of ICONS we were able to make fantastic progress in alliance with other national centers. This MPICT grant would allow us to coordinate this effort in our region," said **Pierre Thiry**, CNIT instructor and Principal Investigator of ICONS.

ICT is strategically important to the region because of the increasing dependence on ICT for personal and organizational productivity. Improving ICT education in the region has both direct and indirect benefits to the local, state and national economies.

For the first quarter of 2008 ICONS is completing grant-related CNIT curriculum changes and additions. Under the grant, ICONS' goal was to create an AS degree, one new certificate and six new courses. As of Fall 2008, the end of the grant period, CNIT has received approval for and expects to deliver:

- A Computer Networking and Information Technology AS Degree;
- A new certificate in Digital Home Technology Integration (DHTI);
- A new certificate in Convergence Technology;
- A new Fiber Optic Technology course;
- A new Introduction to Network Convergence course;
- A new Ethical Hacking and Network Defense course;
- A new Fundamental of Voice over IP (VoIP) course;
- A new Operating Juniper Networks Routers in the Enterprise course; and
- A new Advanced Juniper Networks Routers in the Enterprise course.

ICONS funded a comprehensive Computer Networking and Information Technology Department curriculum review study, engaging outside expertise from the Convergence Technology Center (CTC), an NSF ATE funded Center in Texas. The study involved numerous working sessions with CNIT leadership

and faculty and a comprehensive knowledge and skills survey with the ICONS Advisory Panel.

That study concluded that demand for metro optical technicians had not developed at anticipated rates, and the community would be better served in the near term with a focus on convergence technologies employed by enterprises. That affected course and certificate development selections delivered by ICONS.

That study also resulted in the identification of gaps in certain existing courses, in course offerings and certifications and in what the CNIT AS degree would consist of. CNIT has an ongoing effort to fill in course and certification content gaps. As a result of its findings, CNIT also developed the following new courses: Cisco Wireless, Windows Vista Technical Support, Managing and Maintaining Windows Server, and Windows Server Infrastructure.

CNIT also significantly revised the following certifications: Fundamentals of Networking, Network Security, Windows Networking and Wireless Networking.

The purpose of the NSF team's March 19 visit is to assess whether it believes the MPICT team can do what it has proposed and whether it has the institutional, government and community support to be successful.

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SHARED GOVERNANCE UPDATE College Advisory Council

Minutes of the December 6, 2007 meeting

I. Approval of Minutes

The Council approved the amended October minutes.

II. Reports from the Committee Chairs

A. College Diversity Committee (Dr. Alice Murillo)

- The issue of Dean of Diversity will be discussed at the Academic Senate Executive Council's meeting on December 12. The scope and responsibility of the position were revised. The Academic Senate and DCC took the position, that there should be not be new hire until the existing dean positions are filled. This item will be brought back to the Council's February meeting.

B. Communication Committee (Francine Podenski)

- There will be at least 16 different focus groups for the web project. It was requested to include an additional student focus group amongst the already existing one.
- The EATV 27 Channel upgrade to the new system is finished and the server was replaced.

C. Committee on Information and Public Record (Attila Gabor)

- Attila Gabor, the Chair of the Committee on Information and Public Records informed the Council that Doug Comstock, who is a member of the San Francisco Sunshine Policy Task Force, is working to combine the various documents associated with the proposed San Francisco City College Public Record Policy. The revised draft document should be available for the district by the first week of January, 2008.
- Attila Gabor, also distributed a copy of the CCSF Annual Shared Governance Report 2006-2007.

D. Information and Technology Policies Committee (David Yee)

- All the dates to switch the Ethernet switches were changed to weekend or school holidays. There are switches on 60 different locations at the Ocean Campus.

- Vice Chancellor Bob Gabriner gave an update on the annual appeal and leadership circle campaign. Dr. Gabriner noted that while employee contribution was rather generous 15 years ago, currently it is curiously low.

C. Sustainability Plan Part 1

Susan Lopez presented the history of the efforts towards creating a sustainability plan. Part 1 deals primarily with facili-

ties, specifically with construction and operations. In the landscaping section, it was noted that planting only native species would not necessarily serve the needs of departments for the purposes of instruction. Concern was expressed regarding the casual destruction of plants used for horticulture and biology instruction without any consultation with the affected departments. The idea that, because we are a teaching institution, all aspects addressed in the report are related to shared governance was put forth. Difficulties with preferable versus practical possibilities and versus legal requirements were identified. Specific incorrect assertions in the Transportation Demand Management section were listed.

Deadline for nominations to Academic Senate Executive Council extended to March 21

All faculty in the College — part-time, full-time and noncredit — are members of the Academic Senate. The Executive Council is 29 faculty members elected by the faculty at large whose primary function is to make recommendations with regard to academic and professional matters that include: 1) curriculum; 2) degree and certificate requirements; 3) grading policies; 4) program development; 5) standards and policies regarding student preparation and success; 6) college governance structures; 7) faculty roles and involvement in accreditation; 8) professional development; 9) program review; 10) institutional planning and budget; 11) other academic and professional matters as mutually agreed upon.
