NSF grant launches ICT Center at City College

The National Science Foundation (NSF) has awarded a \$3 million Advanced Technological Education (ATE) grant over four years to establish the Mid-Pacific Information and Communications Technologies (MPICT) Regional Center, which will be headquartered at City College of San Francisco.

Congresswoman **Jackie Speier** (D-San Francisco-San Mateo), announces, “This grant from the National Science Foundation will not only benefit the thousands of students in CCSF’s Computer Networking and Information Technology Department, but the entire community by helping to train the next generation of innovators who are so vital to the economy of the greater San Francisco Bay Area.”

MPICT’s mission is to coordinate, promote and improve the quality of ICT education, with an emphasis on two-year colleges, in a region consisting of northern California, northern Nevada, southern Oregon, Hawaii and the Pacific Territories.

“I am very pleased to see the launch of the Mid-Pacific ICT Center at City College of San Francisco,” says CCSF Trustee **John Rizzo**, Chair of the Board’s Technology Committee. “Business is increasingly relying on information technology and network security and needs qualified employees to run the systems.”

“City College of San Francisco is very pleased to host the new Mid-Pacific Center in partnership with Ohlone College, Foothill College, Santa Rosa Junior College and Cabrillo College, as well as other community colleges,” says Dr. **Don Q. Griñon**, Interim Chancellor. “It is great to see community colleges collaborating to realize efficiencies and mutual benefits for our communities,” he adds.

ICT is an umbrella term, widely used outside the U.S. and in the U.N., to encompass all rapidly converging computer, software, networking, telecommunications, Internet, programming and information systems technologies. MPICT will leverage the abundant ICT industry and academic resources of the San Francisco Bay Area and Silicon Valley to enrich educational experiences and outcomes for faculty and students throughout its region.

MPICT Principal Investigator Dr. **Pierre Berry** states, “ICT industry representatives care deeply about ICT educa-

tion and want to contribute toward its improvement and success. However, they cannot or will not interact individually with 100+ community colleges in the State of California alone. MPICT will serve as an efficient vehicle to improve ICT educational programs throughout the region and across the U.S.”

MPICT Executive Director **James Jones** says, “In the 21st Century, we all increasingly depend on information and communications technologies and the increased connectivity and productivity they enable. Improvements to deployed

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Board President Lawrence Wong speaks at CH/NB groundbreaking

Editor's Note: This is the text of the remarks by Board of Trustees President Lawrence Wong, Esq., at the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Chinatown/North Beach Campus held November 1, 2008 at the construction site at Washington and Kearny Streets.

Today we stand here on the "foundation" of the new City College Chinatown/North Beach Campus. A foundation that has been built on the seemingly impossible dreams of thousands who refused to give up the struggle for a better life through education. This campus has been a dream for 30 years and a priority of the CCSF Board of Trustees for the past 13 years — with the support of the voters of San Francisco and the state of California that dream is becoming a reality.

We did not have the influence of the powerful special interest groups that have tried to stop this dream from coming true — but we had something more powerful — we had the power of the people, the power of the Chinese community which rose up like a sleeping dragon. In all my years I have never seen the community so organized or so determined.

There are many we are grateful to, the untold thousands who stood with us from the beginning but special mention and gratitude must be given to groups such as the Friends of Educational Op-

portunities in Chinatown, the We Shall Not Be Moved Coalition, the Chinese American Association of Commerce, the Chinese Christian Union and organized Labor. One who is not here today and should not be forgotten is former Chancellor **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, who fought relentlessly for this campus. We are all indebted to him and his never "losing the faith" against tremendous odds.

So, within two years, at this very spot the Chinatown/North Beach Campus will rise up and will serve as a giant beacon beckoning all to come through its doors and into a world of opportunities for a better life through education.

Today, history is being made because this campus will be the first college campus in any Chinatown in the United States, it will serve countless generations far into this 21st century and because TODAY THE DREAM BEGINS TO COME TRUE.

I. Call to Order

The Academic Senate Executive Council came to order at 2:39 p.m.

II. Adoption of Agenda

Council adopted the agenda as amended.

III. Approval of Minutes: October 8, 2008

Council approved the minutes with corrections.

IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Huntsman reported:

- As recent reports show, a remarkable number of San Francisco High School graduates (approximately forty percent) are coming to City College. We should be aware that we have a major impact on the education of San Francisco residents.

- The survey process used last week to get faculty feedback about ID cards has potential for Academic Senate voting for the future, with a goal of increasing participation. Before the process can be used for Senate voting a plan will be developed for resolving access problems, and work must be done to ensure anonymity and security.

- Jorge Bell was appointed Acting Associate Vice Chancellor, Office of the Vice Chancellor for Student Development by the Board of Trustees at their October 16th meeting.

- Election Commissioners will be needed for the Spring Academic Senate Executive Council elections. Contact Huntsman to recommend Senate members for this function. Commissioners must not be running for Council or continuing on Council. Experience and willingness are desirable.

- Huntsman has received several dozen phone calls and emails uniformly supporting Dr. Griffin for Chancellor. Council advised Huntsman to speak to the Board of Trustees in support of Dr. Griffin's candidacy.

B. 2nd Vice President Yee reported that the Planning and Budgeting Council will be turning its attention to changing the College's vision and mission statements.

They will survey all employees online with a goal of completing a draft for the Board of Trustees to review in December and approve in January. Academic Senate Executive Council should expect to see the final review draft in December.

C. Secretary Saginor reported that the Soccer Field workgroup met again on October 21st to review the responses from Associate Vice Chancellor Blomquist.

The workgroup still has numerous concerns about the flow of pedestrian traffic into and around the field and about the movement of emergency vehicles between the east and west sides of the campus. A request will be sent to Blomquist to supply additional information and maps for a meeting on November 11 at 2:00, at a place to be determined.

VII. New Business

A. Resolution Honoring Masha Zakheim

Resolution 2008.10.22.03 Resolution Honoring Masha Zakheim

Whereas, Masha Zakheim taught in the Humanities program at City College of San Francisco for twenty five years from 1966 to 1991;

Whereas, for many years Masha Zakheim helped keep Pan American Unity, the Diego Rivera mural at City College, in the public's eye by conducting tours and by publishing the book Diego Rivera in San Francisco in 1998;

Whereas, Masha Zakheim in 1983 published the book Coit Tower, San Francisco, Its Art and History on the fiftieth anniversary of the Tower. Her father Bernard Zakheim was one of the original twenty six Coit Tower muralists and in the early 1930's a friend of Rivera's;

Whereas, Volcano Press is issuing a new edition of the Coit Tower book to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Tower, where Masha Zakheim gave weekly tours for over twenty years under the auspices of her company Articulate Art;

Resolved, that the Academic Senate of City College of San Francisco congratulate Masha Zakheim for her professional work, which brought honor to City College in bringing attention to the College's treasure Pan American Unity and for her

scholarly efforts in capturing the stories of her native city, San Francisco.

Moved Teti, seconded Podenski; motion carried unanimously.

B. Report on the progress of the Program Review process – Francine Podenski.

The Program Review committee will meet (for the first time in years) on Tuesday, October 28 from 3-5 pm in E200. The administration is proposing that every department conduct some program review activities annually, and also conduct a more extensive review every six years. The Department Chairperson Council is proposing that there be a pilot annual review process this spring, followed by an assessment of the pilot process. The DCC recommends that the process utilize short, fill-in-the-blank forms, and that the finished annual reports would be reviewed by a Program Review Subcommittee at the Division level and that summary information for the reports would be taken to the planning and budgeting process. There needs to be some agreement in place by the end of the fall semester about what form of Program Review will be started in the Spring semester.

C. Discussion: Draft of the CCSF Technology Plan – David Yee.

Council started a review of the draft CCSF Technology Plan. In its current form it consists of five separate areas. Council expressed the view that this plan is a good first draft, but that it does not yet meet the needs of the College for an integrated plan to optimize resources.

There is no mention of user needs surveys and it contains many redundancies and inefficiencies. This draft will be going back to Academic Policies Committee (AP) and the Technology, Teaching and Learning Roundtable (TLTR).

VIII. Adjournment

Council adjourned at 5:01 p.m.

CCSF Green Corps: The Bikery

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There is a new sight on Ram Plaza these days. Under a banner that reads "The Bikery" Green Corps students are busy helping bicyclists learn bike mechanics as they fix up their two-wheeled machines. The Bikery is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 11 a.m.–2 p.m. and is a pilot project of a student environmental club, the CCSF Green Corps.

The Bikery, modeled after the San Francisco Bike Kitchen, is a cooperatively run, all-volunteer bike shop whose philosophy is that bicycle mechanics shouldn't be limited to a few, but can be learned by all. With the help of CCSF Bikery mechanics, cyclists walk out with both a working bike and the skills to fix future problems.

The students who run the Bikery are enrolled in a brand new credit course called Alternative Transportation: Bicycles. Students learn safe riding practices, bicycle mechanics and the skills necessary to run a successful non-profit bike shop. The mechanics portion of the course is taught hands-on, with students learning as they work on people's bikes.

"The class is much more than what I expected," says **Gus Gordon**. "I'm not only learning bike repair but also learning that through my own advocacy, I'm part of something bigger than myself and my solitary actions. The things we learn at the Bikery and the actions we take not only benefit us but everyone with a bike or an interest in biking. Our work isn't just about bikes or the Bikery. We are adding to the momentum of the snowballing green movement. Change starts with education which leads to action."

The Birth of the Bikery: student-driven, hands-on curriculum

In the Spring of 2008, the CCSF Green Corps student club was formed. Its mission is to empower students to implement City College's Sustainability Plan through hands-on coursework in green technologies. The Sustainability Plan part 1, currently under review, details some of the steps necessary to transform City College from a typical polluting facility to one that teaches by example what a "green" institution can be.

The CCSF Green Corps' newly-launched bike shop addresses the Plan's call for better support for bicycling at CCSF, and they hope to secure funding for a permanent Bikery. The Green Corps also hopes to see the majority of the Sustainability Plan carried out by students as they earn class credit for course work, from solar panel installation to native plant landscaping. The Green Corps sees community colleges as trainers of a vibrant "green collar" work force, believing that students can and should be agents of change. Instead of simply earning units in a text-book-driven classroom, they envision City College students learning skills necessary to land jobs in the emerging green economy through hands-on training greening their own campus.
