MINUTES OF THE
DECEMBER 4, 2008 MEETING

I. Minutes

Approval of the minutes from the November 6, meeting.

II. Naming Alemany Campus (Gary Tom)

The Facilities Review Committee adopted the proposal to change the name of the Alemany Campus to Civic Center Campus. The College Advisory Council also approved the proposal with the condition that there will be no additional costs to the district for the name change.

III. Proposed District Naming Policy (Dr. Don Q. Griffin/Hal Huntsman)

This is the second discussion on this topic. There were several changes suggested which Hal Huntsman will take back to the Academic Senate for review and adoption, after which this item will come back again to the CAC for further recommendation(s). As an additional item the Named Gift Opportunities will be presented by Kathleen Alioto to the CAC at their February meeting.

IV. Sustainability Plan Part I. (Dr. Robert Gabriner)

There were several changes recommended by the Classified Senate that need to be incorporated in the Sustainability Plan. The Academic Senate still needs to review it before final recommendation from the CAC. This item will come back to the Council in February.

V. Status Report on Mission/Vision Survey (Dr. Robert Gabriner)

The Mission/Vision Survey has been collected by the Office of Research and Planning. A panel will be created, representing all four constituent groups, after the Winter Break. The discussion about the Vision Statement will start after the Winter Break as well.

VI. Reports from the Committee Chairs

1. College Diversity Committee (Dr. Don Griffin)

• The College Diversity Committee discussed the ongoing stipend payment for the Grow Your Own program and ways to improve the process. The committee

also suggested a larger academic diversity amongst the candidates as well as to establish a website for the program.

• The committee also discussed the need for creating additional programs at CCSF for those high school students who were born abroad and need additional time to qualify for residency requirement at the Higher Educational Institutions.

2. Committee on Information and Public Records (Attila Gabor)

The committee spent their last meeting working with Trustee John Rizzo on the District Sunshine Policy. Dr. Ron Lee, who is also member of the committee, will make the changes and present it to the committee.

3. ITPC (David Yee)

• ITPC presented the Technology Plan, to the CAC members to take back to their constituent groups for final review before further recommendation will be made by the CAC.

• The ITPC presented the approved updated Groupwise Statement. The CAC also approved the Statement with changes.

4. Communication Committee (Francine Podenski)

The committee gave a short report on the Marketing Plan.

Official Minutes CCSF Academic Senate Plenary Session

Friday, January 9, 2009 • Ocean Campus, Diego Rivera Theatre

I. Call to Order

The Spring 2009 Plenary Session came to order at 8:10 A.M.

II. Adoption of Agenda

The CCSF Academic Senate adopted the agenda as amended.

III. Welcome and Introductions

Academic Senate President Hal Huntsman welcomed the attendees.

President Huntsman introduced the 2008–2009 Executive Council members.

IV. Officers' Reports

A. President Huntsman's report included these items:

- The swearing-in for the newly-elected Board of Trustees members occurred on Monday, January 5. City College folks, many elected officials and members of the general community were there to welcome returning Board members Natalie Berg and Milton Marks, along with new members Chris Jackson and Steve Ngo.
- Faculty ID cards are available in the Wellness Center, Room 305. Many thanks to all those in Shared Governance and AFT 2121 for making this a reality.
- The state of California is in serious financial difficulties. Exactly how this will affect community colleges and City College in particular is still to be determined. Here are three things we can do to prepare for the coming difficulties at a time when our community needs us more than ever:

o Attend the March in March on March 16 in Sacramento. Past demonstrations have been credited with lessening the cuts to community colleges and this state-wide demonstration will show Sacramento that we are still here and won't sit quietly as our budgets are slashed. Please consider attending and encourage your students to attend as well. More information about buses and signups is available from AFT2121 (<http://www.aft2121.com/>).

o It is on the entire City College community to look for ways to save, to be more efficient, and to cut costs. This is a time to be asking yourself how you can better

serve the college, its students, and the community as a whole. As we go forward in the new semester and year, let us keep in mind that we are here for our students.

o Karen Saginor is spearheading an idea for voluntary tax-deductible donations back to the general fund of the college. This will put money into the source of funding from which the whole college operates and send a symbolic message about what you want the state to do. There's a simple form available online from the payroll page of the CCSF website: www.ccsf.edu/Offices/Payroll/Payroll%20Deduction%20Authorization%20Form.pdf. Donations can be as small as \$5 per paycheck. It doesn't affect your retirement or your pay in the long-term and it's easily reversible. • This Academic Senate congratulates Dr. Don Griffin on becoming our new Chancellor and joins in supporting him as the right person to lead the college at this time.

V. Other Reports

A. Budget update: David Yee

Yee outlined the process for the California Community College budget. The usual process is that the state chancellor's office prepares a budget proposal in January for the following fiscal year. This initial proposal is revised in May, and then goes to the Assembly for finalization and approval. This year may not follow the usual process, and the news from Sacramento about our budget keeps changing. Statistics were presented in the form of a graph documenting that when unemployment goes up, community college enrollment goes up.

The news from Sacramento about this year's budget keeps changing, but the latest reports contain some possible good news. No student fee increase is currently proposed for 2009-2010, and there is a proposal to increase growth money. On the other hand, there will be no funding for Cost of Living increases, and the state will not supply backfill for decreases in lottery money. If budgets for California Community Colleges are not severely cut, it will be thanks to our early and strong advocacy messages. Sacramento is beginning to realize that we are part of the solution to economic problems. To reinforce that message, continue the advocacy through (1) participating in the March in March on March 16, and (2) supporting the Student Success Stories Project (email: StudentStories@ccsf.edu). B. Student Learning Outcomes: Fabio Saniee

From our last accreditation visitation, City College received a recommendation from The Western Association of Schools and Colleges regarding Student Learning Outcomes. The Department Chairpersons' Council advocated for this process to be decentralized to the department level, and a work group has been formed with representatives from the administration, the Department Chairpersons' Council, the Academic Senate, and AFT2121. Goals include generating as little paperwork as possible, and approaching it in small steps. Spring activities will be a pilot for further development. SLO's relate to shifting the paradigm from teaching to learning. Our steps include creating evaluative methods, applying them, examining the results and revising the process. This creates a loop with which we can check what we are doing in an incremental way, thinking about what we are doing and documenting our process. In the next month, faculty should work together to pilot SLO's by focusing on one course or one program.

Whereas, the Academic Senate Constitution further stipulates that "members of the Senate may attend any meeting of the Council. They may speak on an issue with the consent of the President or with the consent of the majority of the Council members present"; and that "the President must place an item on the agenda of the Council meeting (a) at the request of any Council member or (b) on receipt of a signed, written request to the President by at least 10 members of the Senate";

Be it therefore resolved that, any guest, including but not limited to administrators, classified staff, students, and members of the SFCCD Board of Trustees, wishing to be agendized as a speaker before the CCSF Academic Senate Executive Council should contact the Senate President at least two weeks prior to the

The Senate President in consultation with the other senate officers will attempt to accommodate the request, but may deny the request or postpone it to a future agenda, depending on the amount of other business on the agenda and the appropriateness of the request; and

Be it further resolved that, while retaining the right to set the Council agenda, whenever possible the Senate President will consult the Council about the appropriateness of the request to speak before the Council; and

Be it finally resolved that, candidates for political office will not be allowed to speak on behalf of their campaigns.

Whereas, the Office of Facilities Management met repeatedly with the Academic Senate Soccer Field Work Group and made significant adjustments to the soccer field design including:

- > providing a roadway around the field that can accommodate one-way traffic for movement within the campus, bicycle traffic in both directions and emergency vehicles in either direction;

- > providing restroom facilities at ground level for the soccer field;

- > providing restrictions to field use during class hours;

Resolved that the Academic Senate endorse the plan for the Soccer Field presented to the Board of Trustees on December 18, 2008.

E. First Reading: Proposed Name Change for the Alemany Campus – Gary Tom.
