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Until recently, the California Postsecondary Education Commission (CPEC) provided the only source of data for City College student transfers. The CPEC data relies on CSU and UC counts of actual numbers of students transferring from community colleges to CSU and UC in the current year.

Now, City College can track student transfers to most post-secondary institutions within and outside the state, both private and public, through the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC). The NSC keeps student records from more than 80 percent of all post-secondary institutions in the nation.

There are many definitions associated with community college student transfer data. Two of the best known include:

1. **Student Right To Know (SRTK):** based on tracking a cohort of fulltime, first-time freshmen over three years past their initial entry into the college system.
2. **State Chancellor's Office:** focuses on cohorts of new students in fall semesters that subsequently completed 12 or more units and attempted either an English or mathematics transfer-level course in a six-year period following the start of their education.

These cohort definitions differ from the one used in this report. For our purposes, the students tracked are CCSF "leavers." Students' ending term, rather than their starting term, defines the cohort. In this case, we tracked leavers between Summer 1997 and Spring 2001 terms, for a total of four full academic years.

Tracking leavers in this way allows for the observation of everyone enrolled. When examining a starting cohort of students, those still enrolled are counted as unsuccessful. Even with a six-year window after the starting date of enrollment for the State's transfer report, nearly 10 percent of CCSF students remain enrolled. This 10 percent is heavily weighted to basic skills-placed students. The SRTK 3-year cohort amplifies this problem.

The timeframe for tracking students starting, rather than leaving, presents another challenge. In the State's tracking of students, it examines 1993, 1994, and 1995 starting cohorts, clearly presenting more dated information than the 1997 through 2001 leaver cohorts examined in this report. Leaver data provides more current information than when using a starter cohort.

Last, our approach examines the success of all students, not just those who have completed a certain number of units, or who have attempted math or English transfer courses (the State's approach) or are new fulltime students to the College (the SRTK approach). Our method focuses more on all students' successful attainment of their desired educational goals and less on a limited cohort, thereby providing an opportunity to identify ways to better support students' educational interests and needs.

As mentioned, this report examines a total of 72,053 CCSF student leavers from Summer 1997 through Spring 2001. Approximately 25 percent of these students already have a bachelor or

higher degree and most likely enrolled at CCSF to attain a specific skill or competency. Approximately 5 percent of leavers received either a certificate or an associate degree; and 30 percent transferred to other post-secondary institutions, both two and four-year schools. The data from the NSC does not provide us with information about the remaining 40 percent of student leavers.

After reviewing the NSC data for student leavers, we found that:

1. The great majority (90 percent) of student transfers remain in California.
2. The most popular public, post-secondary institution in California is San Francisco State University. A significant number of students transfer to California community colleges, including Skyline, Laney, Foothill, Diablo Valley College, and San Mateo.¹
3. Of the students transferring to California schools, 13 percent transferred to a private college.
4. Among the 10 most popular private California institutions are University of San Francisco, Golden Gate University, and the Heald Colleges.
5. Among the 10 most popular out-of-state schools, four are in New York and six are in the West.
6. A slightly higher proportion of African-American and White students transfer to out-of-state institutions than other ethnic groups. Top choices for African-American students are Clark Atlanta University, Howard University, and Tuskegee University.
7. A slightly higher proportion of Filipino students enrolled in private institutions than other ethnic groups.
8. Latino student transfer primarily to California schools; top out-of-state schools are Community College of Southern Nevada and University of Texas at El Paso.
9. Asian/Pacific Islander students transfer to California public institutions in higher proportions than other student groups.

¹ While many CCSF students enroll in other Bay Area community colleges, approximately an equal number from those same colleges enroll at CCSF. It is part of the “free flow” system within the State’s community colleges that enables students to enroll in any college, not just the one in their service area. New studies within California suggest that students “swirl” through many colleges during their undergraduate career; the old model that envisions a student enrolling in one community college and transferring to one baccalaureate institution is now being replaced with multiple enrollments in many schools.
