NUTRITION ASSISTANT PROGRAM

The Nutrition Assistant Program trains students in the delivery of nutrition-related services, including nutrition education, in public health nutrition programs and hospitals. The two-semester program consists of 15 units of course work and 2 units of field experience equivalent to 160 hours. The field experience consists of assignment at public health nutrition programs or hospitals where students learn and practice required skills and competencies under the supervision of a registered dietitian. UPON SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF THE PROGRAM, THE STUDENT WILL BE:

1. Issued a Nutrition Assistant certificate.
2. Eligible to take the test for WIC Nutrition Assistant (WNA) certification from the State of California WIC Program, if applicable.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

1. Graduation from an accredited high school or have passed GED test or a high school proficiency exam.
2. Submission of a written application.
3. Completion of HOEC 98, Introduction to Nutrition Assistant Program, with a grade of C or higher. (Acceptance to the program occurs AFTER successful completion of HOEC 98; the other courses are added after acceptance.)

PREFERRED COMPLETED COURSES / EXPERIENCE:

1. Recommended English proficiency level: placement in ENGL 90 or ESL 160, or completion of ESL 150 with a grade of C or higher.
2. High school chemistry and biology
3. Basic computer skills; basic math skills
4. Experience working in health or nutrition in a community or hospital setting

UPON ACCEPTANCE INTO THE PROGRAM:

A physical exam and a negative TB test or chest X-ray are required

COURSE WORK AND FIELD EXPERIENCE:

Fall Semester

HOEC 98 (pre-req) 1 unit
HOEC 99 and 100 6 units
Group Discussion 1 hour/week

Spring Semester

HOEC 104 and 105 8 units
Field Experience 2 units
Group Discussion 1 hour/week

APPLICATION FORMS: Application forms will be available from the Administrative Offices at the John Adams Campus (1860 Hayes St.) or DeAvila campus (1351 Haight), from March 1, 2009. Forms can also be downloaded from our website at www.ccsf.edu/lyamashi from March 1st.

\$20.00 per semester unit for California residents

\$144.00 per semester unit for non-California residents (plus \$20.00 enrollment fee per unit)

If you are looking for a career that is exciting, challenging, and allows you to succeed, excel, and feel good about what you do, then consider the Nutrition Assistant (NA) Program. The NA Program is a two-semester certificate program designed to develop competency in the delivery of nutrition-related services for paraprofessionals. The program consists of an integrated curriculum of course work (15 units) and field experience (2 units, 160 hours). Classes are offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays during daytime hours at the DeAvila /John Adams Campus starting Fall 2009 semester. For ten weeks during the second semester, students are placed at one of a variety of field experience sites in the Bay Area, such as public health nutrition programs or health care settings, where they gain hands-on experience to acquire marketable, job-specific skills under the supervision of a registered dietitian.

Health care trends toward preventative care in community settings, cost containment, as well as the growing ethnically diverse, overweight, and aging population have created an increased demand for well-trained, bilingual nutrition paraprofessionals. These changes and trends mean increased opportunities for the nutrition assistant. Many of our graduates are gainfully employed at WIC Supplemental Nutrition Programs, senior nutrition programs, public health agencies, University of California Cooperative Extension, hospitals, and long-term care facilities.

The Nutrition Assistant Program is limited to a maximum of 30 students. We will start accepting applications for Fall 2009 from March 1, 2009.
