**Lindy McKnight** has been appointed Dean of Student Support by the Board of Trustees of City College of San Francisco. McKnight, currently Chair of the Continuing Student Counseling Department, will assume her new duties on July 1. She will report to the Vice Chancellor of Student Development.

Among the strengths Lindy brings to her new position are:

- Developed and provided Flex workshops to the campus community on Student Learning Outcomes;
- Contributed to the authoring of a new Student Development mission statement;
- Served as Grievance Officer and Executive Board member of AFT 2121;
- Introduced, promoted and implemented SarsGrid electronic appointment into the delivery of counseling services across the Student Development Division,

increasing student access to appointments and improving counselor accountability

- Served as Student Development Technology Office Coordinator, where she originated and co-directed the office which centralized technology issues and implemented staff training across Student Development;
- Oversaw implementation of the title III grant through participation on the Steering Committee and Activity One Task Force;
- Was Ocean Avenue Campus Coordinator in General Counseling;
- Worked as Site Supervisor of the Castro Valencia Campus where she advocated and procured funding for and provided evening counseling services to students;
- Taught in the IDST, GLST and Women's Studies Departments, helping to develop new courses as well as conduct diversity workshops and flex day presentations on homophobia, understanding gay/lesbian culture and student/faculty boundaries and issues.

Lindy earned her MA in Psychology from Sonoma State College, Rohnert Park; and her BA in Psychology from Lewis and Clark College, Portland, Ore. She is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist.

Lindy and her partner, **Erin Cunningham**, an instructor in the Registered Nursing Program, have been together for 21 years. They have two daughters, ages 11 and 15.

## Register now for College for Teens

For two consecutive years, City College of San Francisco (CCSF) worked collaboratively with the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) to provide high school credit classes through the College for Teens Program. Through this joint partnership, the College for Teens Program is able to provide a comprehensive summer program to meet the needs of high school students.

In addition to forty-seven (47) high school classes, College for Teens continues to offer Mathematics and English camps that are designed for middle school students. New offerings are English Fundamentals and Academic Reading targeted for ESL students and four new School-to-Career programs that will enable students to earn ten (10) high school elective credits. They are Culinary Arts and Food Preparation, Auto Shop and Auto Tune Up, Fashion Design and Production, and Construction.

Upon successful completion of the courses, students will receive SFUSD high

school credits. Classes are open to public and private school students.

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## Sexual harassment prevention topic for Fall Flex

Dr. **Philip R. Day, Jr.**, Chancellor, emailed the following memo concerning training for Sexual Harassment Prevention. It was dated April 19, 2005

On September 30, 2004, the Governor signed into law AB1825 which requires employers to provide a minimum of two hours of interactive training and education regarding sexual harassment prevention, identification, and correction training to all supervisory employees in a classroom environment. AB1825 specified that training be initiated by January 2006, and thereafter for all new supervisory employees within six months of their assignments. After January 1, 2006, all supervisory employees will be required, per AB1825, to attend a two-hour training session every two years.

All Administrators, Department Chairs, and Classified Supervisors must attend a training session prior to the first of the year. Therefore, we are planning to provide a session during the Fall Flex Day (August 16, 2005). We will also devote a College Council meeting to this training in early Fall 2005. We also will provide an

additional session for those unable to attend the Flex Day or College Council sessions.

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## Change benefits until May 13 during 'Open Enrollment' through HSS

Open Enrollment is the time of year when you may change health plans and/or add or delete dependents. It is also the time of year to enroll in the Health Care and Dependent Care Flexible Spending

Accounts for out-of-pocket expenses for health, dental, optical, psychological and daycare expenses you incur.

City College of San Francisco benefits are managed by the Health Service System of the City and County of San Francisco. This is the time of year that HSS announces the rate increases which become effective July 1, 2005. The new rates and plan changes are noted in the Open Enrollment package which you should have received in the mail. If you have not received your copy, telephone the HSS at (415) 554-1750.

If you are making changes and if you are planning to continue your deductions for a Flexible Spending account and/or a Dependent Care account, you must complete the Open Enrollment materials and follow the instructions for turning in your forms. It is highly recommended that you keep a copy of our open Enrollment form as proof of your enrollment and/or changes. You may hand deliver your materials in person to the HSS office located at 1145 Market St., 2nd floor.

Please remember, after May 13, 2005, you will not be allowed to make any changes to your benefits until the next open enrollment period.

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## Workshop will discuss 'How To Do Business with City of San Francisco'

San Francisco Mayor **Gavin Newsom** and City College of San Francisco's Small Business Development Center will host a workshop on "How To Do Business with the City and County of San Francisco" during National Small Business Week April 25-30.

The workshop will be held **Wednesday, April 27** from 1 to 2 P.M. in the Center, which is located at the U.S. Small business Administration facility at 455 Market St.

Joining Mayor Newsom in the effort are the Office of Contracts Administration, Small Business Commission, Public Utilities Commission and the offices that govern contractor compliance, specifically the Office of Labor Standards Enforcement, Human Rights Commission, Treasurer/Tax Collector's Office and the first Source Hiring Administration. The City's Surety bond Program representatives will be on hand to provide insurance and bonding information as well.

Joining with City College and the Mayor's Office are the City's Small Business commission, the Federal Small Business Administration, Wells Fargo Bank and other community partners, The week-long celebration is intended to bring national and regional attention to the collaborative relationships between governments, non-profits, corporations and the small business community.

This pilot effort during National Small Business Week will serve as the introductory seminar to a larger workshop and curriculum scheduled for the summer, which plans to include a broader line-up of departments that have authority to issue contracts, like the Department of Public Works, the Port, the Airport, Muni, and others to provide forecasted lists of upcoming contracting opportunities for distribution at the workshops.

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# CCSF Grading Policies Subcommittee

March 15, 2005 — Approved Minutes

## SUBCOMMITTEE BUSINESS Repeats

Patty Chong-Delon suggested that Grading Policies request the Academic Policies Committee to request the senate to advocate allowing second repeats (third attempt at a course) be allowed to count towards GPA and allow community colleges to use intervention strategies (such as having students take a particular course before reenrolling in the class).

All committee members agreed to the above recommendation which will be brought to the Academic Policies committee.

## Web Grading

Bob Balestreri discussed the two systems currently in place to track final grades submitted by instructors. This was explained in the November 9, 2004 meeting.

The proposal is to move the college to web grading. Workshops can be scheduled for instructors in the Fall 2005, brochures detailing how to submit grades using the web can also be made available, and Admissions and Records staff can coordinate the use of the TLC to assist instructors in submitting grades using web grading.

It is anticipated that there may be complaints from some instructors and these concerns can be discussed at the Academic Policies Committee.

Committee members unanimously agreed to bring this forward to the Academic Policies committee in support of moving all instructors to submit grades online. Bob Balestreri will bring this to the Academic Policies Committee.

The schedule for the Flex calendar for fall 2005 is nearly complete, much earlier than usual. Currently, there is basically no funding for staff development at CCSF. We are able to have flex workshops because of volunteer workshops by faculty members who are willing to share their knowledge and expertise. Glenn reported that other community college districts are setting aside 1% to 2% of the general budget into Staff development.

#### Resolution 2005.03.16.02: Funding for Staff Development

Be it Resolved that the CCSF Academic Senate encourage Council member Glenn Nance to work with our administrators to pursue funding for Staff Development.

##### D. College Advisory Council (C.A.C.)

The C.A.C. met the day after the last Council meeting Downtown. Francine Podenski reported that there has been a significant increase in the number of Shared Governance minutes submitted for publication to *City Currents*.

The Council also recommended that *City Currents* feature a periodic column dedicated to reports from the Office of Research, Planning and Grants, with one sentence per report and a URL for the electronic version of the report.

##### E. Planning and Budgeting Council (PBC)

The PBC "volunteered" Fred as note taker. Fred distributed draft minutes from the last PBC meeting. PBC received both an FPAC and a Budget report.

F. Facilities Review. There will be a special meeting of the Board, hosted by the Facilities Committee. Questions arose about the Board's compliance with the Brown Act since no agenda was posted.

#### X. Open Forum

A. Pablo Rodriguez asked Council members to encourage their students to approve the donation of \$1.00 "Student action fee". Discussion ensued regarding potential Political Action Committee restrictions; Pablo was encouraged to research the issue with the California Student Association of Community Colleges.

B. Ophelia Clark asked that we further discuss the College Performance Indicators. Council discussed the report's definition of pre-collegiate/basic skills and noted that the Title 5 definition is different, and that the State Academic Senate has not yet defined pre-collegiate/basic skills. Fred Teti invited Susan Lopez to present to Council on how to use the College Performance Indicators and she responded that she would be delighted to do so.

C. Karen Saginor reported that the CalWORKs Director Diana Verdugo invited faculty interested in participating on the CalWORKs Advisory Committee to please call Diana at the CalWORKs office for information regarding the work of the committee.

D. Faculty were encouraged to attend the AFT2121 meeting to vote their choice for paycheck calendar.
