Data include FTES and headcount analyses, course success rates, degrees and certificates awarded, employee demographics, labor market trends, and considerations for enrollment growth, including survey data. The EMP Update also includes qualitative data collected through listening sessions, town halls, interviews, and feedback forums.
- The instructional and student services areas participate in program review annually. The
 program review process includes an assessment currency, review of data trends, and a
 section to make resource requests.
- To improve, the college should make data, college plans, and college initiatives linked to the mission webpage and generally easier to search.
